LOUISVILLE WOMAN FOUND GUILTY OF DISTRIBUTING CRACK COCAINE

LOUISVILLE, KY - **Chrishaundra Murray**, age 24, of 5211 Broadmoor Boulevard, Louisville, Kentucky, in Jefferson County, was found guilty on June 13, 2007, by a federal jury in United States District Court, Louisville, Kentucky, of aiding and abetting the possession with the intent to distribute crack cocaine, David L. Huber, United States Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky, and Paul Vido, Special Agent in Charge of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), Louisville Field Division, jointly announced today.

The jury's verdict of guilty was returned following a two-day trial before Charles R. Simpson, III, Judge, United States District Court.

At trial, the testimony revealed that Murray possessed and had agreed to sell approximately 32 grams of crack cocaine to other unidentified individuals. Prior to her arrest, Murray was found in a hotel room located at the Red Carpet Inn in Louisville, Kentucky, along with two baggies of crack cocaine and a digital scale. Although Murray denied any knowledge of the crack cocaine that was found in the hotel room, the jury believed otherwise. The street value of the crack cocaine was estimated to be valued at approximately \$3,200.

Antoine L. Goodloe, Zephaniah L. Goodloe, Ashley P. Graves, Roanay L. Gray, Sr., and Tiffaney Jones, all co-defendants in this case, pled guilty to the charges against them on June 8, 2007, and are awaiting sentencing.

The maximum potential penalties are 40 years imprisonment, a \$2,000,000 fine, and

supervised release for a period of at least 4 years; and the minimum potential penalties are 5 years imprisonment.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Daniel P. Kinnicutt. The Louisville Field Office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) conducted the investigation in partnership with the Louisville Metro Police Department , as part of ATF's mandated mission to reduce violent crime and other threats to public safety.

Murray is scheduled to be sentenced before Judge Charles R. Simpson, III on November 19, 2007, at 3:45 p.m., in Louisville, Kentucky.
