THREE-TIME CONVICTED FELON SENTENCED TO ELEVEN YEARS AND EIGHT MONTHS ON FEDERAL NARCOTICS AND FIREARMS VIOLATIONS

- Louisville Man admits to possessing \$16,000 in crack cocaine, gun

LOUISVILLE, KY - Steven Gene Miller, age 27, of 2000 Standard Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky, in Jefferson County, was sentenced to 11 years and 8 months imprisonment in United States District Court on charges of possessing crack cocaine with the intent to distribute and being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm, U.S. Attorney David L. Huber of the Western District of Kentucky, and Paul Vido, Special Agent in Charge of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), Louisville Field Division, jointly announced today. Joseph McKinley, Judge, United States District Court, Western District of Kentucky also sentenced Miller to 5 years supervised release following incarceration. **There is no parole in the federal judicial system.**

Miller had pled guilty to possessing a .357 Magnum revolver on January 24, 2007. Previously, Miller had been convicted in Jefferson County, Kentucky Circuit Court, in three separate indictments, of illegal possession of a controlled substance, first degree; tampering with physical evidence; receiving stolen property over \$300; assault, 2nd degree; and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, all felony offenses. Miller further admitted to possessing with the intent to distribute over 5 grams of crack cocaine on February 27, 2007 and over 50 grams of crack cocaine on May 18, 2007. The total street value of the drugs seized was approximately

\$16,000.00.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Robert B. Bonar. The Louisville Field Office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) conducted the investigation in partnership with Louisville Metro Police Department, as part of ATF's ongoing commitment to reduce violent crime and other threats to public safety.

This was a Project Backfire prosecution. Project Backfire is a cooperative effort by the Jefferson County Attorney's Office, the Jefferson County Commonwealth's Attorneys Office, the Louisville Metro Police Department, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and the United States Attorney's Office to ensure that firearm offenses are prosecuted to the fullest extent of the state and federal law.
