

EIPB Duties

- Issue variances, determinations, exemptions (SED, PAD, reagents), approximately 400 letters annually
- Issue Rulings, Rulemakings
- Conduct special studies / projects
- Open letters / Interpretation Letters
- Explosives publications and newsletters
- Liaison with the industry to . . .
 - Identify areas of weakness and vulnerability in security
 - Ensure public safety with minimal disruption to the industry
 - Protect the general public from explosives accidents



Variance Requests

- Good cause must be shown for the use of the alternate method or procedure
- Must be consistent with the effect intended by the specifically prescribed method or procedure
- Must be substantially equivalent to that specifically prescribed method or procedure
- Must not be contrary to any provision of law
- May not result in an increase in cost to the Government
- Must not hinder the effective administration of Part 555



Thefts of Explosives

Reported to ATF U.S. Bomb Data Center





Theft or Loss of Explosives

- Report theft or loss within 24 hours of discovery
- Call ATF and submit Theft/Loss Report
- Notify local authorities
- Penalties for failure to report theft
- Updated form will be forthcoming
- Contact the U.S. Bomb Data Center at 1-800-461-8841 or at USBDC@atf.gov for assistance with any questions regarding the reporting of theft or loss of explosive materials



Suspicious Activity

- Notify ATF
 - e.g. (Attempted magazine break-ins, Delivery vehicles being followed.)
- Call 1-888-ATF-BOMB

- Immediately notify local authorities if witnessing criminal activity.

Do not need to obtain a separate variance





ATF Ruling 2012-5 Type 4 Wood Floors

555.210(a) requires exterior construction (including underside) to be masonry, metal-covered wood, fabricated metal or combination.



Approved July, 2012

- Ground under magazine must consist of nonflammable material.
- All gaps between magazine and ground must be covered (e.g. gravel, metal skirting).
- Skirting and/or gravel must remain intact to prevent exposure or access to magazine underside.



ATF Ruling 2012-2 Fireworks Storage Bins

555.214(c) requires containers of explosive materials to be closed while stored.





Approved May, 2012

 If a bin contains all salutes the bin is considered a bulk salute container.



Ruling 2011-3, Alternate Locks

- Approves use of additional locks under certain conditions
- Puck locks (Die-cast bodies not allowed – only hardened steel)
- Padlocks with boron-alloy shackles
- Recessed locks
 (Jobsite boxes
 must have two
 recessed
 padlocks)











ATF Ruling 2010-2

Explosives Label Visibility

- 555.214(b) Explosives must be stored so marks are visible
- Clarifies how this section applies to specific scenarios
 - Pallets of like material
 - Rows stacked together
- Proprietor may maintain a list of explosives in a pallet or stacked group (List must be updated when materials are removed)



IOI has discretion to count entire stack/pallet

file.



Licensing

Synchronizing multiple license expiration dates: Submit original licenses to FELC. Keep a copy on file Submit cover letter detailing the date requested.
Employee Possessors and Responsible Persons: The same individual can be listed on multiple licenses/permits.
 New form required for each FEL/FEP. Fingerprints and photo not required if already on

Individual types of licenses/permits (e.g. Type 20, 21, etc) are no longer on the explosives application.



Display Fireworks Clarification

- Aerial shells containing more than 40 grams of pyrotechnic composition
- Salutes containing more than
 130 milligrams of flash powder
- Weight limit for aerial shells does not include lift charge
- Open letter is posted on website





Fireworks and Pyrotechnic Materials

- ATF Classification is not dependent on DOT classification (1.3 vs. 1.4).
 - ✓ Verify UN codes for exemption
- Stars, quickmatch, time fuse, igniters - commonly shipped as 1.4 but ATF regulated items.
- Aerial shells over 10-inch shipped as 1.1 but ATF considers them low explosive display fireworks.







Bulk Salute Cakes

- 100% of the tubes must contain only salute effects to qualify as bulk salutes.
- External tails do not change the classification.
- A consumer shell placed inside a display cake tube does not change the classification





Exemption Indian Agencies and Tribes

Tribal Law and Order Act of 2010

- Authorized employees acting on behalf of agency or tribe
- Display Fireworks Materials only
- Does not exempt the manufacturing of fireworks
- Must still comply with storage requirements
- Must report theft or loss of explosives

Indoor Magazines Inside Trailers and Containers



Mobile trailers require variance to store an indoor magazine within; portable containers do not.

No other explosives may be stored outside the indoor magazine and within the container/trailer.





Are These Acceptable?





Hoods must be positioned to prevent the sawing or lever action on the locks, hasps, and staples.

The theft resistance of a hood will be determined on its diameter and depth.



Are These Acceptable?





"Shrouded" padlocks (left) and disc padlocks (right) do not prevent the sawing or lever action on the locks, hasps or staples. Therefore, they must be protected with ¼-inch steel hoods



Are These Acceptable?



The locks above (from a common container/trailer) are not in compliance. The right door (looking at magazine) is only locked with one padlock.

The photo below shows the best way to affix hoods/locks.





Be Prepared for Inspection

- Ensure records are available for examination
- Expect that inventory and records examinations will be time-consuming and thorough
- Ensure that a knowledgeable (responsible) person is available to answer questions and provide assistance, if necessary



If you have any questions on what to expect, ASK!



Good Advice

Prioritize safety and security

- Take frequent inventories
- Review security at your premises
- Consider internal controls (key accountability, records review)
- Upgrade padlocks

Develop a relationship with your local ATF office

- Educate them about your business
- Call if you have any questions or problems
- Invite ATF to talk with your employees about requirements and inspections

Think of inspections as opportunities for improvement




Fireworks Hobbyists

- If transporting must have license/permit
- Everyone must comply with storage regulations
- User's Permit
 - -3 year renewal period
 - \$100 (1st 3 years) \$50 (Subsequent 3 years)
 - Avg. \$25/year for first 6 years




