IACP AUGUST VOLLMER AWARD TO HOUSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) recognizes the significant impact that forensic science has on the criminal justice system. The August Vollmer **Excellence** in Forensic Science Award has been created to honor the proactive, innovative use of forensic technologies by law enforcement. Presented yearly at the IACP conference, awards are given in the following categories: Current or Past Contribution to Forensic Science by Police Agency. · Current or Past Contribution to Forensic Science by an Individual Current or Past Collaboration in Forensic Science Innovation in Forensic Technology. • Enhancement of Forensic Capability by a Forensic Science Provider. This year, the Houston PD (HPD) Crime Laboratory Division received the August Vollmer Award for Significant Investigative Value in a Major Crime. The Firearms Section of the Houston Police Department Crime Laboratory Division Utilized IBIS to link firearms evidence in twelve different investigations, including several capital murders and aggravated assaults, involving members of the La Tercera Crips (LTC)

gang over a ten month period. There diligent efforts resulted in the arrest of eight gang members and a recovery of some of the murder weapons.

The success of the arrest of LTC gang members underscores the importance of providing timely investigative information to detectives. Additionally, it highlights the necessity of constructive teamwork. The outcome of the investigations would not have been possible without the open communications and dialogue between forensic scientists and detectives. Working hand in hand both entities openly shared key information to solve the cases. Law enforcement agencies should not overlook the valuable information that their crime laboratories can provide them to assist in solving cases and saving time in manpower resources.

IBIS Training: ATF and Forensic Technology (FT) are collaborating to remove the "bullet" portion of FT's IBIS Data Acquisitions Course to create TWO IBIS Data Acquisitions Course (casings only) per month, as opposed to the previous schedule of just one course per month. If implemented, the classes will be held in the same week, with each course lasting 2 1/2 days. All students will continue to be responsible for funding all travel expenses. (This will tentatively take effect March 2010).

U.S.- Mexico IBIS Exchange During the week of December 7, 2009, ATF met with FT in Montreal, Canada regarding the US- Mexico exchange. The main issue of discussion was the sanitization of information to ensure that the users in Mexico could not determine what site or user in the US entered the information. Procedures for the sanitization are still under discussion. Detailed plans for the testing of 1 IBIS data correlation international server are underway along with the testing of the 13 US IBIS data correlation servers all to be deployed in the US. The US IBIS servers will be refreshed and the current US IBIS software will be upgraded prior to deploying the US IBIS International server.

DOJ - Office of Justice Programs - Byrne/JAG Local Grant Application

Description: Overview of the JAG Program

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program (42 U.S.C. 3751(a)) is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. JAG funds support all components of the criminal justice system, from multijurisdictional drug and gang task forces to crime prevention and domestic violence programs, courts, corrections, treatment, and justice information sharing initiatives. JAG funded projects may address crime through the provision of services directly to individuals and/or communities and by improving the effectiveness and efficiency of criminal justice systems, processes, and procedures.

Deadline: Registration

Applicants must register with the Office of Justice Programs' (OJP) <u>Grants Management System</u> (GMS) prior to applying.

Deadline: Applications

The due date for applying for funding is estimated in July 2010.

Eligibility

Applicants are limited to units of local government. For reference you can view the 2009 list, go to <u>www.ojp.usdoj.gov/BJA/grant/09jagallocations.html</u>. For JAG program purposes, a unit of local government is: a town, township, village, parish, city, county, borough, or other general purpose political subdivision of a state; or, it may also be a federally recognized Indian tribe or Alaskan Native organization that performs law enforcement functions as determined by the Secretary of the Interior. Otherwise a unit of local government may be any law enforcement district or judicial enforcement district established under state law with authority to independently establish a budget and impose taxes. In the District of Columbia or any United States Trust Territory, a unit of local government is any agency of the District of Columbia or Federal government performing law enforcement functions for the District of Columbia or Trust Territories of the United States. Purpose Areas

JAG funds may be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, PERSONNEL,

EQUIPMENT, supplies, contractual support, information systems for criminal justice, and criminal justice related research and evaluation activities that will improve or enhance:

- Law enforcement programs.
- Prosecution and court programs.
- Prevention and education programs.
- · Corrections and community corrections programs.
- · Drug treatment and enforcement programs.
- Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs.

• Crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation).
