

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Use of Deadly Force Policy

General Principles

- 1. Law enforcement officers of the Department of Justice may use deadly force only when necessary, that is, when the officer has a reasonable belief that the subject of such force poses an imminent danger of death or serious physical injury to the officer or to another person.
 - A. Deadly force may not be used solely to prevent the escape of a fleeing suspect.
 - B. Firearms may not be fired solely to disable moving vehicles.
 - C. If feasible and if to do so would not increase the danger to the officer or others, a verbal warning to submit to the authority of the officer shall be given prior to the use of deadly force.
 - D. Warning shots are not permitted outside of the prison context.
 - E. Officers will be trained in alternative methods and tactics for handling resisting subjects which must be used when the use of deadly force is not authorized by this policy.

Emergency Driving and Pusuit Driving Policy

Except under extraordinary circumstances, HIGH SPEED PURSUITS are expressly prohibited. Circumstances that may necessitate a hig-speed pursuit or emergency response may include, but are not limited to, the threat of serious bodily injury or death to an agent or other party.

The following factors should be considered before driving at high speed or engaging in maneuvers that place anyone at risk of death or injury.

- 1. Severity of the offense or emergency
- 2. Probability of apprehending the violator (s) at a later time.
- 3. Weather and road conditions.
- 4. Availability of emergency equipment.

If the potential outweighs the benefits, the pursuit or response will not be initiated or will be terminated.

The use of roadblocks or ramming to stop a vehicle is a seizure under the fourth amendment, and must also be considered the potential use of deadly force, and therefore, should only be attempted when the use of such force is justified.

In any type of driving, agents must have the utmost regard and respect for the safety of others.

Stop putting guns into hands of 'narco-terrorists'

The United States/Mexico border is a lawless warzone controlled by violent drug cartels. More than 34,000 people have been murdered in Mexico since the narco-terrorists began their reign of terror in 2006. Drugs and people are smuggled north into the United States and guns and money are flowing south, enabling the drug cartels to continue to wage their violent war.

Weapons from the United States reach the outlaws in Mexico, mostly because Mexico does not protect its own border any better than we do. Recent whistleblower allegations claim that tactics of the United States government, through the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), may be contributing to the problem of delivering weapons to the criminals in Mexico, rather than trying to fix it. I am deeply concerned about this.

Part of ATF's mission is to protect American communities from "the illegal use and trafficking of firearms." Put simply, part of ATF's duty is to make sure guns don't end up in the hands of the bad guys. Through the program "Project Gunrunner," ATF uses electronic tags to trace gun movements on both sides of the border. What has been alleged, however, is that while the program has been successful in apprehending weapons and criminals, too many guns have been intentionally let go into the hands of Mexican drug lords when it is almost guaranteed that the guns will be used in violent crimes.

We know about these allegations through a whistleblower, an ATF agent who recently came forward with troubling allegations that he was ordered by his superiors not to intercept weapons that were sold to "suspicious characters," including well-known gun suppliers for Mexican drug cartels. And that's not all — the whistleblower alleges that ATF's Phoenix Field office knowingly allowed and facilitated the sale of over 2,500 firearms in 'straw man purchases' destined for Mexico. According to these allegations, one well-known trafficker, Jaime Avila, was allowed to purchase 3 assault weapons in Glendale, Arizona on January 16, 2010. It is also alleged that at least one of the gun dealers tried to stop selling to Avila; however, ATF asked him to continue selling guns to this criminal.

What happened next is deeply troubling. Avila went back to Mexico with the guns he had purchased and sold them to the drug cartels. The weapons travelled freely through the streets of Mexico for nearly a year. During that time, Avila continued to purchase more weapons, sending them from the United States into Mexico. We have since learned that 2 of the 3 weapons purchased by Avila were recovered at the murder scene of U.S. Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry. Apparently ATF let 2 guns get sent down into Mexico, and as a result an American citizen and federal government employee was murdered.

The murder of Brian Terry is concrete proof that ATF's system is flawed and dangerous. While Jaime Avila was arrested the day after Brian Terry's murder, the question is, why wasn't he apprehended during the 11 months before when we knew he was up to no good? Project Gunrunner is a sting operation with no sting. Guns are handed to the criminals when we know they will be used for harm. It seems that the ATF just sits back and waits to see what happens.


If these allegations are true, we have much cause for concern. It is my understanding that ATF has denied these allegations. Senator Grassley of Iowa has requested more information from the various agencies involved in investigating Agent Terry's murder. I've been told that one letter that the Senator received back denied that ATF "knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons to a straw purchaser" and stated that ATF makes "every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation into Mexico." However, the documentation provided to Senator Grassley, including copies of ATF's national tracing center records, seem to tell a different story.

As this investigation continues, we are left with a murdered Border Patrol Agent and his grieving family who is searching for answers. Carolyn Terry, mother of Brian Terry said, "I truly feel that our son's death is a cover-up and they hope that we will go away. That will not happen. We want to know who allowed the sale of that gun that murdered our son." The Terry family deserves to know the truth. As members of Congress, it is our job to demand a full investigation of this murder since the Department of Justice is blissfully silent about whether or not they will investigate the ATF. Agent Terry is one of many unsolved American murders in the ongoing Drug War along the Third Front, the border.

The Judiciary Committee should look into this matter to see if the ATF is contributing to the gunrunning problem in Mexico or not. Congress needs some answers. One murdered agent is one too many. In my opinion, the ATF is playing with fire.

And that's just the way it is.





Dear Attorney General Holder:

At approximately 1:30 p.m. yesterday, my staff learned that the Justice Department was making four documents available at 2:00 pm for Chairman Darrell Issa's staff to review regarding the controversy over ATF's Project Gunrunner, Operation Fast and Furious, and the death of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry. These documents are among those I requested in February of this year. Yet, the Justice Department refused to make them available for my staff to review. In fact, the Justice Department has produced not one single page of documents in response to my inquiries.

Thus far, I have not requested that Chairman Leahy join in any document requests, consider any subpoenas, or schedule any hearings into this matter in the Senate Judiciary Committee. Any such request would be unnecessary and duplicative of the process on the House side, so long as any documents provided there are also provided to the Senate Judiciary Committee at the same time.

The Department's failure to cooperate with my requests is especially troubling in light of the February 4, 2011, reply to my initial letter. In that reply, the Justice Department took the position that those allegations were "false" and specifically denied "that ATF 'sanctioned' or otherwise knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons" to straw purchasers. The letter further claimed that "ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico."

I already provided evidence contradicting that denial in my February 9 and March 3 letters. In addition, attached you will find further documentation undermining the Department's assertion. Specifically, the documents are emails between ATF officials and a Federal Firearms Licensee (FFL) in Arizona. These emails demonstrate that ATF instructed gun dealers to engage in suspicious sales despite the dealers'

concerns. The emails refer to meetings between the FFL and the U.S. Attorney's office to address the concerns being raised by the FFL. ATF supervisor David Voth wrote on April 13, 2010:

I understand that the frequency with which some individuals under investigation by our office have been purchasing firearms from your business has caused concerns for you. ... However, if it helps put you at ease we (ATF) are continually monitoring these suspects using a variety of investigative techniques which I cannot go into [in] detail.¹

In response, the gun dealer expresses concern about potential future liability and sought something in writing to address the issue explicitly:

For us, we were hoping to put together something like a letter of understanding to alleviate concerns of some type of recourse against us down the road for selling these items. We just want to make sure we are cooperating with ATF and that we are not viewed as selling to bad guys.²

Following this email, the ATF arranged a meeting between the FFL and the U.S. Attorney's office. According to the FFL, the U.S. Attorney's office scheduled a follow-up meeting with the FFL, but asked that the FFL's attorney not be present.³

At the meeting on May 13, 2010, the U.S. Attorney's office declined to provide anything in writing but assured the gun dealer in even stronger terms that there were safeguards in place to prevent further distribution of the weapons after being purchased from his business.⁴ As we now know, those assurances proved to be untrue. On June 17, 2010, the gun dealer wrote to the ATF to again express concerns after seeing a report on Fox News about firearms and the border:

The segment, if the information was correct, is disturbing to me. When you, [the Assistant U.S. Attorney], and I met on May 13th, I shared my concerns with you guys that I wanted to make sure that none of the firearms that were sold per our conversation with you and various ATF agents could or would ever end up south of the border or in the hands of the bad guys. ... I want to help ATF with its investigation but not at the risk of agents' safety because I have some very close friends that are U.S. Border Patrol agents in southern AZ[.]⁵

Incredibly, the FFL sent this email six months before guns from the same ATF operation were found at the scene of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry's murder. So, not only were the ATF agents who later blew the whistle predicting that this operation would end in tragedy, so were the gun dealers—even as ATF urged them to make the sales.

Furthermore, according to the FFL, there were "one or two" occasions on which his employees actually witnessed and recorded with surveillance cameras an exchange of money between the straw purchaser and another individual on the premises.⁶ Despite this actual knowledge of a straw purchase, the dealer said ATF officials wanted him to proceed with the transaction.⁷ However, his employees refused to process the sale.⁸

In light of this new evidence, the Justice Department's claim that the ATF never knowingly sanctioned or allowed the sale of assault weapons to straw purchasers is simply not credible. As you know, I have multiple document and information requests pending with various components of the Justice Department. Unfortunately, however, it appears that senior Department officials are not allowing the components to respond fully and directly.

Please provide written answers to the following questions by no later than April 20, 2011:

- 1. Do you stand by the assertion in the Department's reply that the ATF whistleblower allegations are "false" and specifically that ATF did not sanction or otherwise knowingly allow the sale of assault weapons to straw purchasers? If so, please explain why in light of the mounting evidence to the contrary.
- 2. Will you commit to providing the Senate Judiciary Committee with documents, or access to documents, simultaneously with the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform? If not, please explain why not.

As per our discussion about over communicating I wanted to share some concerns that came up. Tuesday night I watched a segment of a Fox News report about firearms and the border. The segment, if the information was correct, is disturbing to me. When you, Emory and I met on May 13th I shared my concerns with you guys that I wanted to make sure that none of the firearms that were sold per our conversation with you and various ATF agents could or would ever end up south of the border or in the hands of the bad guys. I guess I am looking for a bit of reassurance that the guns are not getting south or in the wrong hands. I know it is an ongoing investigation so there is limited information you can share with me. But as I said in our meeting, I want to help ATF with its investigation but not at the risk of agents safety because I have some very close friends that are US Border Patrol agents in southern AZ as well as my concern for all the agents safety that protect our country. If possible please email me back and share with me any reassurances that you can.



Floor Statement of Senator Chuck Grassley

Justice Department and ATF need to come clean

Thursday, April 14, 2011

Since January, I have been investigating allegations from whistleblowers at the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. The allegations that I had received are shocking, but sadly they appear to be true. And, praise the Lord for whistleblowers in this government, because we don't know where the skeletons are buried, and they help us to do our constitutional role of oversight checks and balances of government.

The ATF is supposed to stop criminals from trafficking guns to Mexican drug cartels, was actually making that trafficking of arms easier for them. That would be bad enough if it happened because of incompetence or turf battles, but it looks like the agency was doing this on purpose.

The government actually encouraged gun dealers to sell multiple firearms to known and suspected traffickers. Two of those guns ended up at the scene of a murder of U.S. Border Patrol agent in Arizona.

His name was Brian Terry, and his family deserves answers from their very own government.

I have been fighting for those answers. I have written eight letters to the justice Department. I have asked for documents. I've asked that specific questions be answered. At first, the Justice Department simply denied the charges. Then one of the whistleblowers went on television. He risked his career to tell the truth on "CBS Evening News."

He had a sense of duty to Agent Terry's family, and in turn to the entire population of this great country. He could not believe that his own government refused to come clean and to tell the truth when questioned by this United States Senator.

And so he went public to set the record straight. Other whistleblowers confirmed what this other whistleblower had said. In fact, I received internal government documents that confirmed what he said. Anonymous patriots tried to ensure that the truth would come out.

That's about the only crime that whistleblowers commit - committing truth. Isn't that sad?

I forwarded many of those documents that I've received clandestinely to Attorney General Holder and Acting Director Melson, and I asked them how to square the denials from that department with the evidence that I have received both orally and on paper.

At Attorney General Holder's confirmation hearing, now two years ago, I told him, and I quote myself, "I expect that you will be responsive to my oversight

work and that my questions and document requests will be taken seriously. I hope that I have your assurance that if you are confirmed, you will assist me with oversight activities, be responsive to my requests and help me make the Justice Department accountable."

The Attorney General, who was a nominee at that time responded, and I quote — this is before his confirmation — "I will try to do all that I can to make sure that we respond fully and in a timely fashion to the very legitimate questions that I know that you have propounded to the department."

Now, ironically, I have provided more internal documents to the Justice Department in this investigation than the Justice Department has provided to me. Now, instead of issuing denials, do you know what happens?

It happens all the time when you're doing oversight work, with almost any agency, but in this case, the Justice Department has circled the wagons. They have clammed up. The President of the United States admitted on Spanish Language television that "certain mistakes" may have been made here in this instance of this investigation.

He and Attorney General Holder say that they didn't authorize a policy change that allowed criminals to walk away with guns, but there was a change in policy that went tragically wrong.

The prophecy of a lot of whistleblowers turned out to be fact, sadly. So Congress needs to find out what did the highest senior officials know and when did they know it?

The purpose of the policy change was to go after leaders high up in the chain of command and bring down a drug cartel. Nobody can find fault with that, but prosecutors didn't want to just go after criminals that just lie on federal forums to buy guns to go after trafficking. They wanted to go after the really big fish.

The problem is this: they let so many little fish keep operating that between 1,300 and 1,700 guns got away, and that's just in this one case in Arizona that I can document. Hundreds of these guns have in turn turned up in crimes on both sides of the border, some in Mexico, some in the United States.

Federal agents often have to walk a fine line in trying to catch the bad guy. They sometimes have to allow a crime to progress to make sure that everyone

involved in the conspiracy gets caught. I understand that, and that can be legitimate, but you've got to look at it this way. It's a very serious business. It's quite a gamble, you might say. There have to be careful controls in an operation like I just described.

Law enforcement should not cross the line into actually assisting criminals just for the simple process of gathering information. Operations should be carefully focused on stopping crime without risking public safety.

Seizing contraband and making arrests are the most important goals. Big headline-grabbing cases to advance some prosecutor's career should take a back seat in any of these gambles.

Yesterday, I sent a letter to Attorney General Holder with some more documents. So I'm sending the department documents that I'd like to have them send me. These are documents that maybe the Attorney General himself didn't know about. They're emails between a federally licensed firearms dealer and the supervisor in this Arizona case known as Fast and Furious. In one email, the dealer raises for a third time now his concerns about how the case is being handled. This time he was prompted by a story on Fox News about the growing firearms problem on our border with Mexico.

The dealer wrote "the segment...is disturbing to me...I shared my concerns with you guys that I wanted to make sure that none of the firearms that were sold per our conversation with you and various ATF agents could or would ever end up south of the border and in the hands of the bad guys...I want to help ATF with its investigation, but not at the risk of agents' safety because I have some very close friends that are U.S. border patrol agents in southern Arizona."

Now, maybe one of those friends, for all I know, is Agent Terry, and he got murdered - or at least we think he got murdered with one of these guns. These guns were at the scene, at least.

That email that I just quoted was sent to the supervisor of the case six months before guns from that case were found at the scene of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry's murder.

The government put these firearms dealers in a completely unfair position, and let me explain that. On the one hand, these gun dealers rely upon the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms for their license to even be able to be in business. So, of course, these agents (Federal Firearms Licensees) want to cooperate with the government. When you have got this big club hanging over your head, will you be licensed or not licensed.

On the other hand, the government asks these gun dealers to keep selling to the bad guys even after the dealers warned that it might end in tragedy.

Now, I'm going to do whatever it takes to get to the bottom of this. The House Oversight Committee has joined in my effort and issued a subpoena for documents. Because it might duplicate the process in the House, I have not sought any subpoenas or hearings in the Senate Judiciary Committee - yet. I have not exercised my right to object to any unanimous consent requests on nominations because of this issue - yet.

However, I want my colleagues and officials at the Justice Department to hear this loud and clear. If that's what it takes, then I will take those actions.

I hope it doesn't have to come to that. I hope that the Justice Department will decide to cooperate and provide the information we need, doing our constitutional responsibility of oversight to make sure the checks and balances of the system of government under our constitution is working.

It's been nearly three months since I first raised this issue. It's past time for the Justice Department to come clean.

Dear Attorney General Holder:

At approximately 1:30 p.m. yesterday, my staff learned that the Justice Department was making four documents available at 2:00 pm for Chairman Darrell Issa's staff to review regarding the controversy over ATF's Project Gunrunner, Operation Fast and Furious, and the death of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry. These documents are among those I requested in February of this year. Yet, the Justice Department refused to make them available for my staff to review. In fact, the Justice Department has produced not one single page of documents in response to my inquiries.

Thus far, I have not requested that Chairman Leahy join in any document requests, consider any subpoenas, or schedule any hearings into this matter in the Senate Judiciary Committee. Any such request would be unnecessary and duplicative of the process on the House side, so long as any documents provided there are also provided to the Senate Judiciary Committee at the same time.

The Department's failure to cooperate with my requests is especially troubling in light of the February 4, 2011, reply to my initial letter. In that reply, the Justice Department took the position that those allegations were "false" and specifically denied "that ATF 'sanctioned' or otherwise knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons" to straw purchasers. The letter further claimed that "ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico."

I already provided evidence contradicting that denial in my February 9 and March 3 letters. In addition, attached you will find further documentation undermining the Department's assertion. Specifically, the documents are emails between ATF officials and a Federal Firearms Licensee (FFL) in Arizona. These emails demonstrate that ATF instructed gun dealers to engage in suspicious sales despite the dealers'

concerns. The emails refer to meetings between the FFL and the U.S. Attorney's office to address the concerns being raised by the FFL. ATF supervisor David Voth wrote on April 13, 2010:

I understand that the frequency with which some individuals under investigation by our office have been purchasing firearms from your business has caused concerns for you. ... However, if it helps put you at ease we (ATF) are continually monitoring these suspects using a variety of investigative techniques which I cannot go into [in] detail.¹

In response, the gun dealer expresses concern about potential future liability and sought something in writing to address the issue explicitly:

For us, we were hoping to put together something like a letter of understanding to alleviate concerns of some type of recourse against us down the road for selling these items. We just want to make sure we are cooperating with ATF and that we are not viewed as selling to bad guys.²

Following this email, the ATF arranged a meeting between the FFL and the U.S. Attorney's office. According to the FFL, the U.S. Attorney's office scheduled a follow-up meeting with the FFL, but asked that the FFL's attorney not be present.³

At the meeting on May 13, 2010, the U.S. Attorney's office declined to provide anything in writing but assured the gun dealer in even stronger terms that there were safeguards in place to prevent further distribution of the weapons after being purchased from his business.⁴ As we now know, those assurances proved to be untrue. On June 17, 2010, the gun dealer wrote to the ATF to again express concerns after seeing a report on Fox News about firearms and the border:

The segment, if the information was correct, is disturbing to me. When you, [the Assistant U.S. Attorney], and I met on May 13th, I shared my concerns with you guys that I wanted to make sure that none of the firearms that were sold per our conversation with you and various ATF agents could or would ever end up south of the border or in the hands of the bad guys. ... I want to help ATF with its investigation but not at the risk of agents' safety because I have some very close friends that are U.S. Border Patrol agents in southern AZ[.]⁵

Incredibly, the FFL sent this email six months before guns from the same ATF operation were found at the scene of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry's murder. So, not only were the ATF agents who later blew the whistle predicting that this operation would end in tragedy, so were the gun dealers—even as ATF urged them to make the sales.

Furthermore, according to the FFL, there were "one or two" occasions on which his employees actually witnessed and recorded with surveillance cameras an exchange of money between the straw purchaser and another individual on the premises.⁶ Despite this actual knowledge of a straw purchase, the dealer said ATF officials wanted him to proceed with the transaction.⁷ However, his employees refused to process the sale.⁸

In light of this new evidence, the Justice Department's claim that the ATF never knowingly sanctioned or allowed the sale of assault weapons to straw purchasers is simply not credible. As you know, I have multiple document and information requests pending with various components of the Justice Department. Unfortunately, however, it appears that senior Department officials are not allowing the components to respond fully and directly.

Please provide written answers to the following questions by no later than April 20, 2011:

- 1. Do you stand by the assertion in the Department's reply that the ATF whistleblower allegations are "false" and specifically that ATF did not sanction or otherwise knowingly allow the sale of assault weapons to straw purchasers? If so, please explain why in light of the mounting evidence to the contrary.
- 2. Will you commit to providing the Senate Judiciary Committee with documents, or access to documents, simultaneously with the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform? If not, please explain why not.

- ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE. The Electronic Surveillance folder keeps a record of each subject monitored during an ATF investigation. This critical information is used not only for investigative purposes, but also so that ATF can respond to Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests as required by law. Multiple surveillance subjects can be entered into one Electronic Surveillance Event using the relationship tab feature. Identify the primary subject of the intercept and then choose additional subjects from the Persons folder to relate to the event as a person under surveillance.
 - a. The ATF approval authority for consensual monitoring is delegated to the respective RAC/GS. The approval may be made verbally and remains in effect for the life of the investigation. RAC/GS approval of electronic surveillance must be noted in the Management Log and should be entered by the supervisor.
 - b. Notification of consensual monitoring should be made to the United States (U.S.) Attorney's Office for the Federal judicial district having jurisdiction over the investigation prior to monitoring any subject. The notification may be made verbally and remains in effect for the life of the investigation.
 - c. Non-consensual monitoring shall be handled in accordance with ATF orders and Federal laws governing such conduct. Non-consensual monitoring is also required to be reported in the Electronic Surveillance folder.
 - d. The RAC/GS shall ensure that all electronic interceptions are entered into N-Force within 5 business days. An ROI is also required to document the event in which the electronic monitoring occurred. All tapes, disks, or other media used to monitor the surveillance shall be entered as Electronic Intercept property into the Property in ATF Custody folder.



MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE OF THE UNITED MEXICAN STATES AND THE BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA FOR ACCESS TO THE FIREARMS TRACKING SYSTEM ETRACE

The Attorney General's Office (PGR) of the United Mexican States and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) of the United States of America, hereinafter "the Participants",

WHEREAS, PGR is the Mexican Government body which is, inter alia, in charge of the investigation and prosecution of federal crimes, and empowered to sign agreements with foreign government agencies to strengthen mutual cooperation against firearms trafficking;

CONSIDERING that ATF is an agency of the Department of Justice of the United States of America dedicated to protect the nation from, among other things, violent crimes, organized crime, illegal use and trafficking of firearms, and illegal use of explosives; and

IN ORDER TO establish the basis for coordination, cooperation and leadership in their respective jurisdictions of law enforcement activities and research related to eTrace system,

Have reached the following understanding:

Section I. Objective

The objective of this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is to establish the terms and conditions under which PGR may access and use the eTrace system.

ETrace is an electronic firearm trace submission system, which has a trace analysis computer module that is readily accessible through a connection to the World Wide Web (Internet). This internet application provides the necessary utilities for submitting, retrieving, storing and querying firearms trace related information relative to particular jurisdictions, thereby allowing for the systematic tracing of firearms that may have been recovered by law enforcement authorities. The eTrace system is intended solely for the use of law enforcement officials to combat illicit trafficking in firearms.

By submitting and obtaining firearms information through the eTrace system, PGR may better identify firearms trafficking patterns and geographic profiling for criminal hot spots and possible sources of illicit firearms.

Section II. General Provisions

- 1. The tracking referred by this MOU is limited to firearms seized by Mexican authorities.
- 2. ATF's National Tracking Center (NTC) will be the receiving and central repository of all information entered into the eTrace system.
- 3. PGR intend to enter into the eTrace system complete and accurate information related with firearms

tracking in Mexico. To this end, PGR will coordinate and administer, through the National Center of Planning, Analysis and Information Against Delinquency (CENAPI) the information generated by all the Mexican authorities involved in the seizure of firearms.

 Through the eTrace system, PGR will have access to all data generated by tracking of firearms seized in Mexico, whether it was submitted by users designated by the PGR or by users of US agencies.

Section III. Procedures

To meet the objective of this MOU:

A. PGR will:

- Appoint a primary and alternate point of contact within PGR. The above appointed individuals are
 to be responsible for providing and maintaining a list of all personnel within PGR that will require
 access to eTrace.
- Complete "Attachment A" (PGR Approved eTrace Users) of this MOU. Only the persons listed in Attachment A will have access to the eTrace system, as PGR's authorized users.
- 3. Immediately notify the ATF National Tracing Center (NTC) in the event that an individual's eTrace account needs to be suspended or revoked. Such suspension or revocation might be necessary for any number of reasons, to include but not be limited to: employee transfer, retirement, or release from employment. Initial notification for account revocation can be made by contacting the eTrace Customer Support Group at telephone number (304) 260.
- 4. Refer to the eTrace Customer Support Group of the NTC any technical questions related to the use, operation or solution of technical difficulties related to eTrace contacting the phone number (304) 260 fax number (800) 578 email address edward.stely@atf.gov, or postal address:

- B. ATF, through the National Tracing Center will:
 - 1. Appoint a primary and alternate point of contact.
 - Provide to PGR, upon entry into force of this MOU, detailed instructions about the procedure to request and receive an eTrace user account.
 - Process all applications for eTrace access in a timely manner and facilitate the provisioning of accounts to include relative user identifiers and passwords. Once accounts are activated, a representative from the NTC is to contact each individual user and provide them with their account information.



- Upon receipt of a PGR's request for account revocation, immediately deactivate the pertinent user account.
- Provide the PGR's and ATF's designated POC with an annual (or upon request) listing of PGR's approved eTrace users for review purposes.

Section IV. Points of Contact

The Participants will designate primary and alternate points of contact for coordinating all communications and issues related to this MOU.

Section V. Information Management and Protection

- The information obtained under this MOU may be used in judicial or administrative proceedings only in accordance with the respective Participants' laws, regulations and legal procedures.
- Consistent with their respective laws, the Participants acknowledge that premature disclosure of certain firearms trace information can reasonably be expected to interfere with pending or prospective proceedings related to illicit firearms trafficking. This sensitive information includes data that can link a

traced firearm to: the location of a crime; the Federal firearms licensee; retail purchaser or possessor of a traced firearm; or to firearms trafficking patterns involving a traced firearm. Therefore, neither PGR nor ATF may disclose law enforcement sensitive firearms trace information generated pursuant to this MOU to a non-law enforcement entity without the consent of the other Participant, unless otherwise obligated by law.

The Participants acknowledge that traces are restricted to firearms that are illegally possessed, used in a crime, taken into custody by public security authorities, or suspected by public security officials of having been used in a crime or act of terrorism.

Section VI. Monitoring Mechanism

Each Participant intends to designate a representative to evaluate and monitor the implementation of this MOU.

Designated representatives intend to make regular reports to the Participants about the results obtained in the framework of this MOU. Likewise, these representatives will solve any aspect derived from its application or interpretation, through consultations.

Section VII. Final Provisions

- This MOU will enter into force from its date of signature and will remain in effect until either Participant decides to terminate it by written communication addressed to the other Participant thirty (30) days in advance.
- 2. The termination of this MOU will entail the revocation of all eTrace accounts provided under this MOU.
- 3. This MOU may be amended by mutual agreement of the Participants in writing.

As I mentioned on the phone this morning, the House Foreign Affairs Committee is interested in learning more about ATF international trafficking issues generally regarding Latin America and more specifically, to the extent possible, ATF efforts regarding the trafficking of illegally purchased firearms into Mexico. Although our interest was spurred by recent reports regarding Project Gunrunner, we would not expect ATF to divulge information that would interfere with criminal investigations that are open or ongoing. I understand that ATF testified a few years ago before our Western Hemisphere subcommittee Members. At this point, we are just interested in a staff briefing due to our obvious foreign policy interests in the matter. We also plan to seek a briefing from the Department of State regarding the impact of these reports on the US relationship with the government of Mexico. Below is a copy of a news article that caught our attention:

Mexican legislators demand US talks on gun scandal

Mexico nabs alleged head of 'Resistance' drug gang

Mexican police have captured the alleged leader of a drug gang that calls itself "The Resistance," a group that operates in western Mexico, officials said Monday.

MEXICO CITY -- Legislators from all of Mexico's three major parties in congress are calling for a joint U.S.-Mexico working group to examine accusations that U.S. federal agents allowed hundreds of guns to flow into Mexico. Congressman Humberto Trevino estimated Tuesday that 150 shooting injuries or deaths have been linked to guns that were allowed to proceed into Mexico as part of a U.S. effort to build cases against traffickers.

Two of those weapons were involved in the killing of a U.S. Customs and Border Protection agent in December in southeastern Arizona.

Mexican drug cartels frequently pay straw purchasers to buy weapons at U.S. gun stores and smuggle them south to avoid stringent gun-control laws in Mexico.

DRAFT RESPONSES TO QUESTIONS/COMMENTS IN GRASSLEY LETTER OF 2/9/11

Page 1, Para 1: "ATF agents told my staff that the agency allowed the sale of assault rifles to known and suspected straw purchasers for an illegal trafficking ring near the southwest border."

ATF has an open criminal investigation involving a large, illegal firearms trafficking organization associated with Mexican based drug traffickers. As part of the investigative process, ATF has identified numerous purchasers and other persons potentially and/or suspected of being engaged in the criminal activity. During the course of the investigation, non-prohibited individuals being investigated as suspected straw purchasers continued to periodically purchase firearms from federally licensed firearms dealers. Some of these purchases became known to ATF through reported multiple sales, information from licensed dealers, information from cooperating individuals, surveillances conducted by ATF, interdictions and/or gun traces by other US law enforcement agencies, and in some cases, gun recoveries and/or traces in Mexico.

Page 1, Para 2: "In that letter, the Department categorically denied that the ATF "knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons to a straw purchaser...." The Department said that the ATF makes "every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico."

The omitted portion of the first statement by DOJ referenced above is "...who then transported them to Mexico – is false." As noted by DOJ, ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico. Again, we have to note that all of these purchases involve non-prohibited persons following the federal firearms procedures. The fact that such persons may have made numerous purchases, including purchases of firearms identifiable as weapons of choice in Mexico or purchases involving multiple firearms, does not in itself establish a federal violation. Even if the individuals subsequently sold these firearms to another person, or if some of the firearms were recovered in crimes in the US or Mexico, additional evidence would be required to establish a violation. ATF used every available tool and every effort was made to interdict firearms in this case going south to Mexico. The number of seizures made by ATF and other US law enforcement officials reflect that.

ATF in Phoenix, prior to, during and after the GRIT operation that initiated in May 2010, conducted extensive surveillance on source FFL locations, suspect purchasers and other trafficking suspects. ATF detailed numerous agents from out-of-town and out-of-state to assist in surveillances during this case prior to the arrival of the GRIT participants, from approximately March 14 to May 3, 2010. These detailed agents worked exclusive surveillance for 7 weeks, 7 days a week, for nearly 4,000 hours of surveillance. In addition, the Phoenix Group VII personnel also conducted numerous surveillance operations prior to the arrival and after the

departure of these detailees, including during the GRIT operations. ATF Phoenix developed and maintained a detailed surveillance assignment list. In addition to physical, mobile surveillance, ATF utilized a variety of electronic surveillance methods, including but not limited to pole cameras and interceptions. Also, the Phoenix Police Department Air Wing was utilized on numerous occasions to conduct aerial surveillance. During all of these surveillance operations, at no time did ATF knowingly conduct surveillance of any person or vehicles in which firearms "walked" into Mexico.

As should be noted, even with the detailees and the additional manpower derived from the GRIT operation, ATF Phoenix could not surveil every "suspected" residence, purchaser and dealer premises on a non-stop, 24/7 basis. This was not, and is not today, the only firearms trafficking case we are working in the Phoenix area. We utilized personnel and other tools as much as possible, but when a "suspected straw purchaser" goes into their home with firearms and nothing happens for days, we must make judgments as to how to best proceed with the investigation. In this case, we were dealing with in excess of "suspected straw" purchasers and other suspects. This ATF office has at least that many active cases. In addition, even if we were to approach a suspected straw purchaser, we have no ability to force the person to tell us where or to whom the guns may be going. If such interviews are conducted and lead to legally acceptable responses, we must continue our investigative efforts, despite having alerted the suspect to our efforts.

Page 1, Para 3: "The ATF had been tracking purchases because was a suspected trafficker since at least November 2009."

Page 2, Para 1: "The dealer who sold the weapons... met with ATF representatives and Assistant US Attorneys as early as December 17, 2009..."

Page 2, Para 1: "By January 13, ATF added to a suspect person database for the investigation."

Page 2, Para 2: "On January 16, 2010, bought three AK-47 variant, Romanian WASR-10 assault rifles... ATF entered these weapons into the...Suspect Gun Database three days later."

In conjunction with the Fast and Furious investigation, a group of individuals were entered into the Suspect Gun database. A total of 372 firearms (including 37 recovered in the Tohono O'Odom Indian Reservation) in the database were recovered/seized in the US. The number of firearms recovered in Mexico was 195. In addition, through ATF surveillances and enforcement operations, another 230 firearms were recovered prior to being entered into the database. Therefore, 602 firearms were interdicted in the US, and 195 were recovered in Mexico, for a total of 797 firearms recovered.

You have also asked for information about eTrace, an important tool in ATF's work to dismantle gun trafficking. eTrace is an Internet-based system that allows participating law enforcement agencies to submit firearm traces to the ATF National Tracing Center. Authorized users can receive firearm trace results electronically, search a database of all firearm traces submitted by their individual agency, and perform analytical functions. In the last year, eTrace has gained strong new features. eTrace now accommodates data in Spanish, gives translations, and allows users to better sort and search additional data elements and images to improve weapons tracing. In the next 24 months, planned enhancements to eTrace will improve ATF's ability to monitor and map gun tracing data in real time and to share information with other federal agencies, as well as with state and local law enforcement.



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

Dear Acting Director Melson:

Recent media reports have raised grave questions about your department's handling of operations involving gun trafficking into Mexico. In the aftermath of the tragic killings of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry and Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agent Jaime Zapata, it is imperative that you act decisively to assuage the public's deep suspicions that the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) has a policy of permitting - and even encouraging - the movement of guns into Mexico by straw purchasers. The presence of these guns may have subsequently led to the deaths of hundreds of people on both sides of the border, including Agents Terry and Zapata.1

It has been brought to my attention that you are not cooperating with congressional inquiries about Project Gunrunner and Operation Fast and Furious. Last week, Senator Charles Grassley expressed frustration at ATF's responsiveness in a letter to the Department of Justice (DOJ): "I'm still asking questions and we're getting the runaround from the Justice Department, [t]hey're stonewalling. And the longer the wait, the more they fight, the more egg that they're going to have on their face."2

Operation Fast and Furious is part of ATF's Project Gunrunner program designed to prevent illegal guns from crossing the border into Mexico. ATF implemented the plan in June 2007 and outlined four key areas of Gunrunner: expansion of gun tracing in Mexico, international coordination, domestic activities, and intelligence.

A November 2010 DOJ Office of the Inspector General (OIG) report detailed many shortcomings with the program, especially its inability to find and arrest higher-level traffickers. With direct approval from ATF headquarters in Washington, a special ATF strike force let federally licensed gun shops sell about 1765 firearms to straw buyers for the drug cartels over a 15 month span beginning in October 2009. Some 797 of the guns were recovered as a result of criminal activity on both sides of the border, including two at the site of the killing of Agent Terry.

At the same time of the release of the OIG report – and perhaps influenced by it – ATF formalized its policy of letting American guns reach the drug cartels. Field agents vociferously objected, aghast at the prospect of high-caliber weapons being allowed to enter Mexico. Senior Agent John Dodson was one of those agents who came forward to complain that the ATF had allowed the guns to be "walked" into Mexico. ATF even videotaped suspected drug cartel suppliers as they loaded AK-47 type assault rifles into their cars and permitted them to transport those firearms across the border. ATF officials failed to report this to Mexican authorities and eventually lost track of hundreds of these guns. Unsurprisingly, these weapons began showing up at crime scenes both in Mexico and the U.S. Notably on December 14, 2010, two "walked" rifles turned up at Agent Terry's murder site.

Senator Grassley requested specific documents about this policy but, thus far, has received nothing from ATF or DOJ. In fact, Special Agent In Charge (SAC) William D. Newell has steadfastly denied that this policy even exists, as has DOJ. When confronted by documentary evidence from Senator Grassley's office, however, Attorney General Holder asked the Justice Department's Office of Inspector General (DOJ-OIG) to conduct a review. Such a review by the Acting Inspector General, however, is inadequate. As Senator Grassley wrote to Kevin Perkins, Chair of the Integrity Committee of the Council of Inspectors General on Integrity and Efficiency, "the DOJ-OIG does not appear to be completely disinterested in the outcome of its review. Without a greater level of independence, it will be difficult for the public to have faith in the impartiality and integrity of the result." ¹²

I wholeheartedly agree with this sentiment. Given the entanglement of the DOJ-OIG report with the policy change, it has become clear that the Acting Inspector General cannot conduct an objective and independent inquiry sufficient to foster public confidence. Only a full congressional investigation can achieve this result and restore the public's faith in the workings of the ATF. Therefore, I am requesting that you provide the following documents and information:

- Documents and communications relating to the genesis of Project Gunner and Operation Fast and Furious, and any memoranda or reports involving any changes to either program at or near the time of the release of the DOJ-OIG report about Project Gunrumer in November 2010.
- 2. A list of individuals responsible for authorizing the decision to "walk" guns to Mexico in order to follow them and capture a "bigger fish."
- 3. Following the fatal shooting of Agent Brian Terry, did ATF conduct an investigation of the circumstances of his killing? Did you determine whether the two guns found at the crime scene were permitted to cross into Mexico?
- 4. Is ATF aware what weapon was responsible for the death of Agent Brian Terry?
- 5. All documents, including e-mails, relating to communications between the ATF and the Federal Firearms Licensee (FFL) who sold weapons to Jaime Avila, including any Report of Investigation (ROI) or other records relating to a December 17, 2009 meeting "to discuss his role as an FFL during this investigation."
- A copy of the presentation, approximately 200 pages long, that the Group 7 Supervisor made to officials at ATF headquarters in the spring of 2010.
- 7. All documents, including e-mails, relating to communications regarding Operation Fast and Furious between ATF headquarters and Special Agent in Charge (SAC) William D. Newell, Assistant Special Agents in Charge Jim Needles and George Gillette, Group Supervisor David Voth, or any Case Agent from November 1, 2009 to the present. The response to this request should include a memorandum, approximately 30 pages long, from SAC Newell to ATF headquarters following the arrest of Jaime Avila and the death of Agent Brian Terry.
- 8. All documents and communications related to complaints or objections by ATF agents in Phoenix about letting straw buyers with American guns enter Mexico.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight Committee of the House of Representatives and may at "any time" investigate "any matter" as set forth in House Rule X.

- 13. If any document responsive to this request was, but no longer is, in your possession, custody, or control, identify the document (stating its date, author, subject and recipients) and explain the circumstances under which the document ceased to be in your possession, custody, or control.
- 14. If a date or other descriptive detail set forth in this request referring to a document is inaccurate, but the actual date or other descriptive detail is known to you or is otherwise apparent from the context of the request, you should produce all documents which would be responsive as if the date or other descriptive detail were correct.
- 15. The time period covered by this request is included in the attached request. To the extent a time period is not specified, produce relevant documents from January 1, 2009 to the present.
- 16. This request is continuing in nature and applies to any newly-discovered information. Any record, document, compilation of data or information, not produced because it has not been located or discovered by the return date, shall be produced immediately upon subsequent location or discovery.

- 17. All documents shall be Bates-stamped sequentially and produced sequentially.
- 18. Two sets of documents shall be delivered, one set to the Majority Staff and one set to the Minority Staff. When documents are produced to the Committee, production sets shall be delivered to the Majority Staff in Room 2157of the Rayburn House Office Building and the Minority Staff in Room 2471of the Rayburn House Office Building.
- 19. Upon completion of the document production, you should submit a written certification, signed by you or your counsel, stating that: (1) a diligent search has been completed of all documents in your possession, custody, or control which reasonably could contain responsive documents; and (2) all documents located during the search that are responsive have been produced to the Committee.

Definitions

- 1. - The term "communication" means each manner or means of disclosure or exchange
 of information, regardless of means utilized, whether oral, electronic, by document or
 otherwise, and whether in a meeting, by telephone, facsimile, email, regular mail,
 telexes, releases, or otherwise.
- 3. The terms "and" and "or" shall be construed broadly and either conjunctively or disjunctively to bring within the scope of this request any information which might

otherwise be construed to be outside its scope. The singular includes plural number, and vice versa. The masculine includes the feminine and neuter genders.

- 4. The terms "person" or "persons" mean natural persons, firms, partnerships, associations, corporations, subsidiaries, divisions, departments, joint ventures, proprietorships, syndicates, or other legal, business or government entities, and all subsidiaries, affiliates, divisions, departments, branches, or other units thereof.
- 5. The term "identify," when used in a question about individuals, means to provide the following information: (a) the individual's complete name and title; and (b) the individual's business address and phone number.
- 6. The term "referring or relating," with respect to any given subject, means anything that constitutes, contains, embodies, reflects, identifies, states, refers to, deals with or is pertinent to that subject in any manner whatsoever.



Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing to memorialize my serious concerns with the unilateral subpoena you issued last night to the Department of Justice, despite my objection. I am providing copies of this letter to all Members of the Committee because they were not informed about the objections raised by the Department of Justice before you issued the subpoena and were not provided an opportunity to deliberate on this significant action by the Committee.

On March 16, 2011, you sent a letter to the Department of Justice requesting a wide range of documents relating to operations by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives involving gun trafficking into Mexico. You requested the production of all of these documents in two weeks. 1

Yesterday, the Department of Justice notified the Committee that it was working rapidly to comply with this request and was collecting responsive documents to be produced to the Committee. The Department raised serious concerns, however, about producing certain documents relating to two active, ongoing criminal investigations, one of which has already resulted in a 53 count indictment of at least 20 individuals alleged to have "conspired to purchase hundreds of firearms, including AK-47s, to be illegally exported to Mexico."2

The Department also raised concerns about producing documents relating to the ongoing criminal investigation into the death of U.S. Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry on December 14, 2010.

Previous Committee chairmen have handled such concerns with great care. For example, during the Department's criminal investigation into fatal shootings by Blackwater contractors in Nisoor Square, Iraq, the Committee worked very carefully with the Department to obtain the information it needed without negatively impacting ongoing prosecutions.³

Last night, however, you issued a unilateral subpoena over the Department's objection, over my objection, and without any knowledge or debate by other Members of our Committee. You took this step without meeting with the Department to determine whether an accommodation might have satisfied both the Committee's legitimate interest in conducting appropriate oversight and the Department's legitimate interest in achieving successful prosecutions.

Today, the Justice Department wrote a letter to you with the following statement:

Yesterday, we informed Committee staff that we intended to produce a number of responsive documents within the next week. As we explained, there are some documents that we would be unable to provide without compromising the Department's ongoing criminal investigation into the death of Agent Brian Terry as well as other investigations and prosecutions, but we would seek to work productively with the Committee to find other ways to be responsive to its needs.⁴

This type of intrusion into ongoing criminal investigations is exactly what I hoped to avoid when I wrote you on January 24, 2011, to request that you honor the historical practice of both Republican and Democratic chairmen of this Committee to obtain (1) the concurrence of the Ranking Minority Member or (2) a Committee vote when issuing controversial subpoenas. ⁵

ATF gunwalking: Who knew, and how high up?

Since <u>our first report</u> in which ATF agents told us they allowed thousands of weapons to cross into Mexico, one crucial question has been: Who knew -- how high up? This week for the first time, <u>President Obama addressed the controversy</u>. It was in an interview

Tuesday evening with the Spanish language network Univision.

Watch: Obama on "gunwalking"

"Well first of all I did not authorize it. Eric Holder the Attorney General did not authorize it. He's been very clear that our policy is to catch gun runners and put 'em into jail," Mr. Obama said of the controversial ATF operation called "Fast and Furious."

"You were not even informed about it?" asked Univision reporter Jorge Ramos.

"Absolutely not," said Mr. Obama. "There may be a situation here which a serious mistake was made and if that's the case then we'll find out and well hold somebody accountable."

But who? In an exclusive interview with CBS News, the lead ATF official in Mexico at the time Darren Gil says somebody in the Justice Department did know about the case. Gil says his supervisor at ATF's Washington D.C. headquarters told him point-blank the operation was approved even higher than ATF Director Kenneth Melson.

Gunrunning scandal uncovered at the ATF

"Is the director aware of this," Gil asked the supervisor. Gil says his supervisor answered "Yes, the director's aware of it. Not only is the director aware of it, D.O.J.'s aware of it... Department of Justice was aware of it."

Gil goes on to say senior Justice official Lanny Breuer and several of his deputies visited Mexico amid the controversy last summer, and spoke to ATF staff generally about a big trafficking case that they claimed was "getting good results." Gil says Melson, ATF's Acting Director, also visited Mexico City. Gil's Deputy Attache and his Analyst questioned Melson about the case that surrounding all the weapons showing up in Mexico. "His response was 'it's a good case, it's still going on," recalls Gil, "and we'll close it down as soon as we possibly can."

AK47s vs. bean bags in border drug war

As to what Melson, Breuer and the other officials knew, Senator Charles Grassley (R-Iowa) has been asking. Among other things, he has told the State Department to turn over notes and records from any Breuer visits to Mexico City in summer of 2010. But his repeated requests have so far been denied. And the officials mentioned would not speak with CBS News.

The whole controversy was <u>exposed last month</u> when ATF agent John Dodson and others blew the whistle to CBS News. They told us they were ordered to let assault rifles and other weapons "walk" into the hands of Mexican drug cartels in a failed attempt to take down a cartel.

Agent: I was ordered to let U.S. guns into Mexico

But if Justice Department officials knew, it's even more incredible when you find out who didn't: ATF's own agents in Mexico.

Gil first found out something was amiss in early 2010 when serial numbers from a flood of guns used in cartel crimes were all tracing back to the same case in Phoenix: "Fast and Furious." But when Gil's analyst checked ATF's computer files to find out more, he hit a brick wall.

"Not only did he not have access, I as the attache, the head agent in Mexico for ATF operations, did not have access," says Gil. He was locked out.

That was a red flag because Gil says as the senior ATF official in Mexico, it was his job to approve any ATF operation involving Mexico; and he didn't approve this one. In fact, Gil specifically emailed his staff on Jan. 25, 2010 that no firearms would be

allowed to cross into Mexico for a case without his approval. The email also stated that if he ever approved such an operation, he'd make sure the weapons were "stopped on the Mexican side of the border." They'd never be allowed to "walk" or reach the streets. Gil didn't know it but even as he wrote that email, ATF agents in Phoenix have told CBS News they were already letting traffickers move weapons to Mexican drug cartels without stopping them. The idea was apparently to see where the guns would end up and try to build a big case.

Faced with the flow of guns and the serial number evidence tracing to Phoenix, but locked out of the computer case files, Gil says he repeatedly questioned his supervisor in Washington. He says some of the conversations became screaming and shouting matches. He says he was instructed not to tell his Mexican counterparts about the case. Gil said he inquired, "when is this case gonna shut down? The Mexicans are gonna have a fit when they find out about it." Gil says he also noted "at some point, these guns are gonna end up killing either a government of Mexico official, a police officer or military folks, and then what are we gonna do?"

Gil is the second ATF agent to tell CBS News that he specifically warned of such an outcome. Agent John Dodson says he told his superiors in Phoenix much the same. "I specifically asked one time, 'are you prepared to go to the funeral of a Border Patrol agent...are you prepared for that fact because it's only a matter of time before that happens," Dodson told CBS News.

That's exactly what happened. Two of the weapons, AK-47 variant assault rifles, were eventually found at the murder of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry last December. Officials are looking into possible connections to the murder of Customs Agent Jaime Zapata in February.

Gil retired from ATF in December, in part over his objections to Fast and Furious and the way it was handled. He says he's speaking out because nobody else in charge has stepped up to explain that ATF agents in Mexico were never part of it. Yet they're now facing threats of prosecution from some Mexican politicians.

"The (Mexican) government's looking at (ATF agents) potentially bringing weapons into their country, which in many cases is an act of war." Gil says by not explaining that ATF agents in Mexico weren't part of Fast and Furious, ATF executives are putting the agents in danger. "They're leaving my guys out in Mexico alone, and they're not doing the right thing."

Purpose: Indictment and arrest of approximately nineteen individuals involved in firearms trafficking to Mexican Drug Trafficking Organizations/Cartels.

Date of Operation: January 25, 2011.

Background: Since October 2009, ATF, and other partners, have been investigating a firearm trafficking organization that is being funded by a drug trafficking organization (DTO) that is involved in violent criminal activity in Mexico, Southern Arizona and many other regions of the United States. These acts contribute to violations of Federal Laws to include Firearms, Narcotics, Money Laundering, and Conspiracy Laws.

Agents believe that the Phoenix-based firearm trafficking group is actively purchasing firearms through straw purchasers using bulk narcotics proceeds. From October 2009 to October 2010 agents have documented that this organization has spent approximately 1.25 million dollars in cash at various Phoenix area FFLs to acquire in excess of 1,900 firearms. The firearms are then being trafficked into Mexico.

Through these investigative techniques, agents have been able to identify additional co-conspirators and disrupt the firearms trafficking organization by seizing numerous firearms and narcotics. To date, 278 firearms and over fifty (50) pounds of marijuana have been recovered by ATF agents in addition to the numerous firearms and narcotic seizures in Mexico related to this investigation. An additional 72 firearms have been seized by U.S. law enforcement agencies in response to information received from ATF.

Evidence in ATF Custody: 278 firearms, 250 "drum" magazines, thousands of rounds of various caliber ammunition.

I am pleased to provide you with a copy of the Department of Justice Strategy for Combating the Mexican Cartels (the "Cartel Strategy"), which was approved by the Attorney General earlier this week.

The Cartel Strategy is a product of the Department's Southwest Border Strategy Group, which I chair, and which has been meeting for the last several months. The Strategy Group is vice-chaired by the Assistant Attorney General for the Criminal Division, and includes the heads of: ATF, BOP, DEA, EOUSA, FBI, OCDETF, USMS, as well as the Chair of the AGAC and the U.S. Attorneys from the five Southwest Border Districts. The Cartel Strategy resulted from an active dialogue among, and significant input from, the components represented on the Strategy Group.

The Cartel Strategy is premised on the notion that a large share of the violence, drugtrafficking, corruption, and other criminal activity occurring along the Southwest Border is perpetrated by a relatively small number of hierarchical criminal organizations. The Strategy Group believes that the most effective mechanism to attack those organizations is the use of intelligence-based, prosecutor-led multi-agency task forces, that simultaneously attack all levels of, and all criminal activities of, the operations of the organizations. The Cartel Strategy sets forth a blueprint for accomplishing this with the resources of the Department of Justice. By design, the Cartel Strategy is consistent with the National Drug Control Strategy and the National Southwest Border Counternarcotics Strategy, both of which guide the larger interagency efforts, and both of which DOJ played a significant role in drafting.

The Cartel Strategy is not a radical departure from efforts that are already underway in the Department. To the contrary, the Cartel Strategy articulates those basic principles that already inform the Department's most successful efforts against the cartels. It is anticipated that the Cartel Strategy will serve as a guidepost toward what types of activities the Department should

pursue going forward. The Department will measure future initiatives in this area by reference to their ability to further the principles and objectives set forth in the Strategy. Furthermore, the document will help advise those outside the Department – our non-DOJ partners in federal law enforcement, our state and local partners, and policy-makers at all levels of government – how it is that the Department of Justice intends to confront this pervasive challenge.

It is important to note that, although the Cartel Strategy was developed under the auspices of the Southwest Border Strategy Group, the Strategy contemplates vigorous enforcement activity by law enforcement agents and prosecutors, not just at the Southwest Border, but in every jurisdiction. As you are all well aware, the criminal activities perpetrated by the Mexican cartels are not confined to the Southwest Border, but rather extend throughout our country, and internationally. Effective implementation of our strategy to attack all elements of the cartels comprehensively and simultaneously requires that we attack them vigorously in whatever locale they may be found.

I would like to express my deep appreciation for the active involvement of all the components of the Department in the effort against the Mexican drug cartels. As a result of your hard work, talent, and dedication, we have already struck many hard blows against them. I am confident that, going forward, and with the courageous assistance of our partners in Mexico, we will be on the proper path toward achieving even greater successes in disrupting and dismantling these dangerous criminal enterprises.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE STRATEGY FOR COMBATING THE MEXICAN CARTELS

It is a priority of the Department of Justice to disrupt and dismantle the Mexican drug cartels, bring to justice their leadership, and stem the growing violence and associated criminal activity perpetrated by the cartels, both along the Southwest Border and throughout the Nation. In order to maximize the efficacy of its limited resources, which are spread through numerous components of the Department, it is necessary that the Department deploy those resources pursuant to a single, coherent strategic plan, under a single coordinating body, the Southwest Border Strategy Group.

An essential aspect of the DOJ plan must be ensuring a productive partnership with the government of Mexico, as well as with our state, local, and tribal law enforcement counterparts. Equally important, we must avoid wasteful overlap and duplication of efforts with the activities of our other federal partners, particularly the law enforcement agencies at the Department of Homeland Security.

The following document sets forth the policy considerations that will guide the Department in this process.

The Strategy

The Department will implement its Strategy for Combating the Mexican Cartels under the supervision of the newly-created Southwest Border Strategy Group. The Strategy is intended to be consistent with the Administration's overarching National Southwest Border Counternarcotics Strategy.

The Department's strategy will be executed through the proven mechanism of prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven multi-agency task forces, with the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces (OCDETF) Program serving the primary coordinating function. Multiple OCDETF investigations should continue to be linked together at a national level in coordination with the Special Operations Division (SOD), resulting in nationwide takedowns coordinated by SOD, on the model of Project Reckoning, Operation Xcellerator, and Project Coronado.

The DOJ Strategy's key objectives are to:

- Increase the safety and security of U.S. citizens throughout the United States by enforcing violations of federal law that have a particular nexus to the threats posed by the Mexican Cartels, i.e. drug trafficking, money laundering and bulk cash smuggling, firearms trafficking, and corruption.
- Reduce the flow of narcotics and other contraband entering the United States.
- Reduce the flow of illegal weapons, ammunition, explosives, and currency exiting the United States and entering Mexico.

- Strengthen Mexico's operational capacities and enhance its law enforcement institutions.
- Increase bilateral cooperation between Mexico and the United States on fugitive capture and extradition activities.
- Increase intelligence and information sharing among law enforcement agencies in the United States and with Mexico to achieve focused targeting of the most significant criminal organizations.
- Improve case building through interagency coordination, leveraging the expertise and authority of each investigative and prosecutorial agency.
- Maximize the effectiveness of prosecution by locating, arresting, extraditing, and trying all levels, including most importantly the leadership, of these criminal organizations, and disrupting and dismantling the organizations' domestic transportation and distribution cells.
- Coordinate enhanced enforcement initiatives to address "downstream" impacts on judicial security, court and detention operations, prison management and fugitive apprehension.

Division of Responsibilities with DHS

Addressing the Southwest Border threat has two basic elements: policing the actual border to interdict and deter the illegal crossing of undocumented persons or contraband goods, and confronting the large criminal organizations operating simultaneously on both sides of the border.

Given its statutory mission and the resources it can bring to bear at the border, DHS clearly bears primary responsibility for the policing function at the border. DOJ fully supports DHS in that endeavor by sharing relevant intelligence and by prosecuting the most egregious offenders DHS arrests in the course of its policing function. The Department of Justice prosecutes tens of thousands of these reactive law enforcement cases in federal court every year.

However, the root cause of the explosion of violence just south of our border is the conflicts within and among a limited number of sophisticated, transnational criminal organizations. These hierarchical, Mexico-based cartels are responsible for smuggling into the United States most of our nation's illegal drug supply. While the cartels' primary business is drug trafficking, they also sponsor a panoply of other crimes that support their illegal operations. These other crimes include extortion, torture, murder, corruption of public officials, sheltering of wanted fugitives, kidnapping and human smuggling, laundering of illicit criminal proceeds through the existing financial system

and through bulk cash smuggling, and the illegal acquisition, trafficking, and use of firearms and explosives.

It is in taking down these organized, multi-faceted criminal enterprises that DOJ plays the primary role and brings to bear its special expertise. DOJ's success in this endeavor assists, in turn, DHS in the performance of its policing and enforcement function, by disrupting the operations of the cartels, thereby decreasing the pressure on the border. For its part, DHS, and in particular ICE, provides invaluable assistance to the attack on these criminal organizations, by bringing to bear its unique expertise on cross-border transit of contraband.

Border policing and interdiction, and the resulting prosecutions, are key elements of the U.S. government's overall border security strategy. However, the investigation, apprehension, extradition, and prosecution of key cartel leaders and their associates, and the deprivation through forfeiture of their ill-gotten gains, is the most effective means by which we can move past merely addressing the symptoms of our problems along the Southwest Border and attack, instead, the underlying causes.

Deployment of Resources

The Department's view – based on its decades of experience in investigating, prosecuting, and dismantling organized criminal groups, such as the Mafia, international terrorist groups, and domestic and transnational gangs – is that the best way to fight large scale criminal organizations is through prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven, multi-agency task forces that blend the strengths, resources, and expertise of the complete spectrum of federal, state, local, and international investigative and prosecutorial agencies. Through their participation in such task forces, the Department's prosecutors, together with its component law enforcement agencies – DEA, ATF, FBI, and USMS – give the Department the capacity to carry out the full range of activities necessary to succeed against these organizations.

The Department has embraced a model to achieve these comprehensive goals that is proactive, in which we develop priority targets through the extensive use of intelligence. This intelligence is obtained from law enforcement sources, as well as through the careful and disciplined use of classified information from intelligence community agencies to provide unclassified leads. Sharing information, we build cases, coordinating long-term, extensive investigations to identify all the tentacles of a particular organization. Through sustained coordination of these operations, we are able to execute a coordinated enforcement action, arresting as many high-level members of the organization as possible, disrupting and dismantling the domestic transportation and distribution cells of the organization, and seizing as many of the organization's assets as possible, whether those assets be in the form of bank accounts, real property, cash, drugs, or weapons. Finally, we prosecute the leaders of the cartels and their principal facilitators, locating, arresting, and extraditing them from abroad as necessary. In this effort, we coordinate closely with our Mexican counterparts to achieve the goal: destruction or weakening of the drug cartels to the point that they no longer pose a viable

threat to U.S. interests and can be dealt with by Mexican law enforcement in conjunction with a strengthened judicial system and an improved legal framework for fighting organized crime.

In most places, along the border and throughout the country, OCDETF provides an effective mechanism for law enforcement agencies from within DOJ, from elsewhere in the federal government (including DHS and Treasury), and state and local law enforcement, to combine with federal prosecutors to form a "virtual task force" for the purpose of investigating and prosecuting a particular high-value drug trafficking organization. In certain key locales, OCDETF has established actual, brick-and-mortar Co-Located Strike Forces, for the pursuit of the highest level traffickers of drugs, guns, and money. For instance, the San Diego Major Mexican Traffickers Task Force has been responsible for coordinating the U.S. government's successful efforts against the Arellano-Felix Organization. The Houston OCDETF Strike Force has directed our most damaging blows against the Gulf Cartel. And in the first several months of its existence, the Arizona OCDETF Strike Force has been responsible for the indictment of a leader and other members of a major Mexican cartel and the seizure of millions of dollars in cartel assets.

The Department will use the OCDETF Strike Force concept to target <u>all</u> the organized crime activities of the drug cartels – not just those crimes directly related to the drug trade. By further leveraging and coordinating the investigative expertise and jurisdiction of law enforcement agencies outside the drug enforcement area, the Department will task the Strike Forces to disrupt and dismantle every area of the cartels' infrastructure and undermine their ability to operate successfully in any illegal activity.

On a local level, each Strike Force co-locates law enforcement resources that are supplemented by one or more on-site Assistant United States Attorneys. Retaining the current Strike Force structure, specifically the co-location and intensive and early prosecutorial involvement, ensures that the Department capitalizes upon the proven synergy of these Strike Forces to maximize the effectiveness of long-term investigations of these organizations. The synergy created by co-locating the diverse expertise of federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies with prosecutors from the U.S. Attorney's Office, has had demonstrable success against major criminal organizations operating throughout the country. It is for this reason that the Attorney General and Deputy Attorney General should have the flexibility to call upon and leverage the resources of the already successful multi-agency task forces around the country, including the OCDETF Strike Forces, HIDTA Task Forces, DEA task force groups, FBI Safe Streets Task Forces, and VCITs, drawing upon the expertise of all of the agencies that contribute to them.

In those locations where they currently exist, DOJ will make the OCDETF Co-Located Strike Forces the focal point for interagency efforts against the Mexican criminal organizations.¹ Elsewhere along the border, and throughout the nation, DOJ will seek to

replicate, to the extent possible, the OCDETF Strike Force model, in particular the characteristics of interagency cooperation, information sharing, and strategic, intelligence-based targeting that have been embodied in these Strike Forces.

Supplementing the regional operations of the prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven multi-agency task forces with a comprehensive national policy and coordination body, the Southwest Border Strategy Group, run out of the Office of the Deputy Attorney General, will give the Department a unified and comprehensive vehicle through which the United States government can disrupt the influence of the cartels. This unified and coordinated approach to law enforcement is not only the best way to use the formidable resources of the United States government, but also the most effective way to decrease the influence of these violent criminal enterprises while enhancing the public safety.

While the prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven, multi-agency task force model is a key component of the Department's strategy, it will not be the only component. We must also recognize and support the important daily work performed by our investigators and prosecutors in stopping and seizing the massive amounts of narcotics, firearms, and bulk cash that flow across the border in both directions. These more reactive narcotics cases are important to the overall cartel strategy, because in the process we are seizing millions of pounds of drugs, thousands of firearms, and millions of dollars in bulk cash as they enter and exit the country. In addition, these commodity-focused cases yield significant intelligence that is then fed into the Special Operations Division (SOD), the OCDETF Fusion Center (OFC), and the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC) for use in supporting more proactive, intelligence-driven investigations that are designed to attack <u>all</u> of the cartels' diverse lines of illegal business. Therefore, the Department's Strategy for Combating the Mexican Cartels must include an assessment of the resource needs of all our components, and a plan for how they intend to achieve the stated goals of the Strategy in light of the specific cartel activity impacting their jurisdictions.

Intelligence

Law enforcement agencies must have the ability to access, link, and interpret voluminous intelligence information from as wide a community as possible. We use this shared information to identify and target the most significant organizations, so that we can achieve the greatest impact with our finite resources. We also use shared information to develop coordinated, multi-jurisdictional investigations of those high-impact targets, making sure that investigations are mutually reinforcing, without duplicating or jeopardizing other investigations targeting overlapping organizations.

Several multi-agency endeavors are particularly important to the provision of tactical intelligence and operational support in targeting the largest and most dangerous Mexican cartels.

The Attorney General's Consolidated Priority Organization Target (CPOT) List

The CPOT list of international "Most Wanted" drug kingpins will be used to help focus our critical resources on the greatest threats from the Mexican cartels. Of the 59 worldwide organizations currently on the list, 25 of them are Mexico-based. DOJ will also work in partnership with the Secretary of the Treasury to impose sanctions against Mexican drug trafficking organizations pursuant to the President's authority under the Foreign Narcotics Kingpin Designation Act.

The El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC)

EPIC is a DEA-led multi-agency organization that provides case-specific tactical intelligence, focusing specifically on the Southwest Border. The ATF Firearms Intelligence Analysis Team is a specialized component of EPIC that serves as a central point of analysis and repository for all Southwest Border firearms-related intelligence. FBI recently created the Southwest Intelligence Group (SWIG), a clearinghouse of all FBI activities involving Mexico, and it is in the process of moving that clearinghouse to EPIC. EPIC houses the National Seizure System, which collects and maintains data on seizures of drugs, guns, and money by law enforcement agencies throughout the nation.

The Special Operations Division (SOD)

SOD is a DEA-led multi-agency coordination center that targets the communication devices the criminal organizations' leaders use to communicate with each other. SOD actively supports multi-jurisdictional, multi-national, and multi-agency electronic surveillance investigations, coordinating overlapping investigations and ensuring that tactical and operational intelligence is shared between law enforcement agencies.

The OCDETF Fusion Center (OFC)

The OFC is a comprehensive, multi-agency data center containing drug and related financial data from DEA, ATF, FBI, ICE, CBP, IRS, USMS, EPIC, the U.S. Coast Guard, the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network, the State Department's Bureau of Consular Affairs, and other key agencies. It conducts cross-agency and cross-jurisdictional integration and analyses to create comprehensive pictures of targeted organizations and to pass usable leads through SOD to participants in the field.

Current Areas of Focus

Pursuant to the principles articulated above, DOJ is pursuing initiatives in the following areas:

1. Ramping up Establishment and Use of Vetted Units in Mexico

An important aspect of case building in Mexico involves U.S. cooperation with specially vetted Mexican law enforcement units. DOJ law enforcement agents work in an advisory capacity to develop elite vetted units of Mexican federal police officers,

training them to conduct law enforcement operations that lead to the discovery and seizure of drugs, guns, explosives, money, and documentary evidence to support bilateral investigations and prosecutions. The Mexican units also arrest active members of the cartels, who may eventually become either cooperating witnesses, defendants, or both. These units are essential to our operations. In order to properly leverage and support these crucial operations, the Department must expand their number, to include more drug trafficking units, a firearms trafficking unit, a money-laundering/financial unit, and a fugitive apprehension unit.

2. Continued Focus on Attacking Cartel Finances

A particular point of emphasis in recent years has been the dismantlement of the financial infrastructure of the drug trafficking organizations. These efforts have been hampered by the fact that financial cases are complex and time-consuming, and the pool of experienced financial investigators is finite. Since the curtailment of IRS involvement in drug investigations in 2005, ATF, DEA, FBI, and USMS have hired additional financial investigators and forfeiture specialists. OCDETF has established the Financial Investigative Contractor (FIC) Program to bring additional experienced financial investigators to bear on the largest cartels, and has buttressed the analytical and document exploitation capabilities of its Co-Located Strike Forces in San Diego, Phoenix, El Paso, Houston, and Atlanta. DEA has implemented Financial Investigation Teams (FITs) in its field divisions to target the financial assets of drug traffickers. Analysts and attorneys in the U.S. Attorney's Offices and in the Department's Asset Forfeiture and Money Laundering Section have also stepped up their efforts to assist in prosecuting money laundering activities of all types. In addition, Southwest Region federal agencies are working with state and local law enforcement agencies on an OCDETF bulk currency initiative that targets the highest level drug cartels and their transportation routes in the Southwest. These efforts must be supported and expanded.

3. Attacking the Southbound Flow of Firearms

Addressing the flow of weapons into Mexico from the United States is also a primary focus of our efforts. ATF's intelligence has shown that the prevalence of firearms and explosives trafficking into Mexico has a direct nexus to the cartels' national domestic drug distribution network. Thus, given the national scope of this issue, merely seizing firearms through interdiction will not stop firearms trafficking to Mexico. We must identify, investigate, and eliminate the sources of illegally trafficked firearms and the networks that transport them. Since 2006, Project Gunrunner has been ATF's comprehensive strategy to combat firearms-related violence perpetrated by the drug cartels along the Southwest Border. Increasingly close collaboration between ATF and the efforts of the multi-agency drug task forces along the border, including, most particularly, the OCDETF co-located Strike Forces, ensures that scarce ATF resources are directed at the most important targets. Additionally, DOJ is sponsoring and hosting U.S./Mexico bilateral working groups focusing on joint efforts to combat arms trafficking, and is ensuring that U.S. Attorneys Offices around the country are coordinating on firearms trafficking cases.

Dear Acting Director Melson:

It is my understanding that the ATF is continually conducting operations along the southwestern United States border to thwart illegal firearm trafficking. I am specifically writing you concerning an ATF operation called "Project Gunrunner." There are serious concerns that the ATF may have become careless, if not negligent, in implementing the Gunrunner strategy.

Members of the Judiciary Committee have received numerous allegations that the ATF sanctioned the sale of hundreds of assault weapons to suspected straw purchasers, who then allegedly transported these weapons throughout the southwestern border area and into Mexico. According to the allegations, one of these individuals purchased three assault rifles with cash in Glendale, Arizona on January 16, 2010. Two of the weapons were then allegedly used in a firefight on December 14, 2010 against Customs and Border Protection (CBP) agents, killing CBP Agent Brian Terry. These extremely serious allegations were accompanied by detailed documentation which appears to lend credibility to the claims and partially corroborates them.

On Tuesday, according to press reports, the ATF arrested 17 suspects in a Project Gunrunner bust. William Newell, the Special Agent in Charge of the ATF's Phoenix Field Office was quoted as saying, "We strongly believe we took down the entire organization from top to bottom that operated out of the Phoenix area." However, if the 17 individuals were merely straw purchasers of whom the ATF had been previously aware before Agent Terry's death, then that raises a host of serious questions that the ATF needs to address immediately.

As you know, the Department of Justice Office of Inspector General (OIG) released a review of ATF's Project Gunrunner in November of 2010, in which the OIG concluded that Project Gunrunner has been unsuccessful, in large part because:

Project Gunrunner's investigative focus has largely remained on gun dealer inspections and straw purchaser investigations, rather than targeting higher-level traffickers and smugglers. As a result, ATF has not made full use of the

intelligence, technological, and prosecutorial resources that can help ATF's investigations reach into the higher levels of trafficking rings.¹

Therefore, in order to gain a more complete understanding of ATF activities in Project Gunrunner, I request that you arrange for my staff to be briefed by knowledgeable ATF supervisors no later than February 3, 2011. Dear Senator Grassley:

This responds to your letters, dated January 27, 2011 and January 31, 2011, to Acting Director Kenneth Melson of the Department's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), regarding Project Gunrunner. We appreciate your strong support for the Department's law enforcement mission.

At the outset, the allegation described in your January 27 letter—that ATF "sanctioned" or otherwise knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons to a straw purchaser who then transported them into Mexico—is false. ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico. Indeed, an important goal of Project Gunrunner is to stop the flow of weapons from the United States to drug cartels in Mexico. Since its inception in 2006, Project Gunrunner investigations have seized in excess of 10,000 firearms and 1.1 million rounds of ammunition destined for Mexico. Flundreds of individuals have been convicted of criminal offenses arising from these investigations and many others are on-going. ATF remains committed to investigating and dismantling firearms trafficking organizations, and will continue to pursue those cases vigorously with all available investigative resources.

In this vein, the suggestion that Project Gunrunner focuses simply on straw purchasers is incorrect. The defendants named in the indictments referenced in your January 27 letter include leaders of a sophisticated gun trafficking organization. One of the goals of the investigation that led to those indictments is to dismantle the entire trafficking organization, not merely to arrest straw purchasers.

I also want to assure you that ATF has made no attempt to retaliate against any of its agents regarding this matter. We recognize the importance of protecting employees from retaliation relating to their disclosures of waste, fraud, and abuse. ATF employees receive annual training on their rights under the Whistleblower Protection Act, and those with knowledge of waste, fraud, or abuse are encouraged to communicate directly with the

Department's Office of Inspector General. These protections do not negate the Department's legitimate interest in protecting confidential information about pending criminal investigations.

We also want to protect investigations and the law enforcement personnel who directly conduct them from inappropriate political influence. For this reason, we respectfully request that Committee staff not contact law enforcement personnel seeking information about pending criminal investigations, including the investigation into the death of Customs and Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry. Like you, we are deeply concerned by his murder, and we are actively investigating the matter. Please direct any inquiry into his killing to this office.

The Department would be pleased to provide a briefing to Committee staff about Project Gunrunner and ATF's efforts to work with its law enforcement partners to build cases that will disrupt and dismantle criminal organizations. That briefing would not address the on-going criminal investigation referenced in your letter. As you know, the Department has a long-standing policy against the disclosure of non-public information about pending criminal investigations, which protects the independence and effectiveness of our law enforcement efforts as well as the privacy and due process interests of individuals who may or may not ever be charged with criminal offenses.

We hope that this information is helpful and look forward to briefing Committee staff about Project Gunrunner. Please do not hesitate to contact this office if we may provide additional assistance about this or any other matter.

Specifically, I am seeking information on whether CBP officials had an opportunity to seize weapons from straw purchasers on two specific occasions.

First, on March 8, 2011, federal authorities indicted 11 defendants, including the Mayor and the Police Chief of a small town in New Mexico, for conspiring to smuggle weapons from the United States into Mexico. According to the indictment, on January 14, 2010, Blas Gutierrez and Miguel Carrillo were pulled over near the border and were found in possession of eight weapons, including three AK-47-type pistols. Also according to the indictment, two of the weapons were later smuggled to Mexico, where they were found this month, March 2011.³ I understand that CBP may have been the agency that conducted the vehicle stop referenced in the indictment and that some of the weapons may have been connected to Operation Fast and Furious. However, CBP allegedly let the individuals go, perhaps because it failed to determine that the weapons or individuals were connected to ATF operation at the time of the vehicle stop.

Second, CBP officials allegedly stopped Jaime Avila near the border in the spring or summer of 2010. He allegedly had the two WASR-10 rifles in his possession that were later found at the scene of Agent Brian Terry's murder, along with over thirty additional weapons. CBP officials contacted ATF or an Assistant United States Attorney who allegedly instructed CBP to allow Avila proceed without seizing the weapons.

This is in reference to the House of Representatives Committee on Oversight and Government Reform's review of ATF's firearms trafficking enforcement strategy known as Project Gunrunner. The requirements of this preservation directive are *in addition* to the requirements of the Preservation Directive issued on March 28, 2011 related to Operation Fast and Furious.

Pursuant to ATF Order 1340.4, <u>please identify and preserve any relevant documents and</u> <u>materials within your custody which may be relevant to this matter</u>. Relevant documents and materials include all records and evidence, <u>including electronic files and email</u>, relating in any way to Project Gunrunner. This requires a search of relevant documents and materials under your control that may include, but are not limited to, the following: Reports, any formal and informal documents (*e.g.*, memoranda, hand written notes), correspondence, telephone log entries, e-mail, word processing documents, internet usage files, systems manuals, and network access information. Please note that your preservation of Project Gunrunner documents should include any information related to the fatal shooting of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry, this includes any property (*i.e.*, firearms and ammunition) in ATF custody relating to this incident.

Relevant documents and materials may include not only hard-copy documents, but all electronically-stored information ("ESI") created, received, and/or maintained by ATF on computer systems and elsewhere. Sources of information may include hard-copy files, computer hard drives, removable media (*e.g.* CDs, DVDs), laptop computers, PDAs, BlackBerry devices, telephones and pagers. All ESI should be preserved in its originally-created or "native" format. Please keep in mind that this is not an exhaustive list of date types or sources.

At this time, please –

• Identify and preserve all documents and materials which may be relevant to Project Gunrunner. The relevant time period would begin July 1, 2009 until the present.

If you have any documents or materials that fall within this directive, please place the hard copies in a separate file marked "PRESERVATION OF DOCUMENTS FOR PROJECT GUNRUNNER." Retain the file in a place where you can readily locate it upon request. E-mails should be retained in a PRESERVATION folder on Outlook, and Word and other documents in electronic format (*e.g.*, PowerPoint, Excel, Adobe Acrobat) should be identified and moved to a separate PRESERVATION folder in your personal library.

- Assign a point of contact (POC) from the following Field Divisions in order to coordinate the preservation of relevant documents and materials:
 - o Houston Field Division
 - Dallas Field Division
 - Los Angeles Field Division

Please provide the POC's name to Assistant Director Melanie Stinnett by COB on Friday April 15, 2011.

o In connection with the IG's review of Operation Fast and Furious, Assistant Director Stinnett has already established POCs in the other necessary Divisions and Offices. Unless you provide a second POC to Assistant Director Stinnett by April 15, 2011, she will assume that the same POC will be used for both the IG review and the House of Representatives Committee review.

The POC is to ensure that all persons who may have information or a need to know about this directive are appropriately notified and instructed on their responsibility in a timely fashion. Also, the POC has the responsibility to notify Assistant Director Stinnett if (1) any additional ESI related to Project Gunrunner is discovered; (2) personnel involved in this directive are leaving the division, office or directorate will perform imminent data destruction; (4) the directorate will replace or discard equipment preserving ESI in this matter.

Of particular importance will be ensuring that no ESI is erased through routine destruction. If any ESI relating to Project Gunrunner has been purged as a result of routine destruction (*i.e.*, the aging process, separation from employment, etc) please, to the extent possible, find the dates of such purge and the information which would have been subject to destruction.

Please note that the failure to comply with this directive and/or the failure to maintain records, documents and information could negatively impact the Bureau, therefore please err on the side of retaining documents and information. Employees who fail to comply with their duties as outlined above will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including removal. Please note that this directive is in effect until you are notified that the hold has been terminated.

On March 8, 2011, ATF executed four search warrants and recovered 7 firearms, including an NFA rifle, 49 .223 caliber receivers, 3,000+ rounds of ammo, numerous un-milled receivers, drills, and 4 computers. Coinciding with Houston's search warrants, the Colombians conducted controlled deliveries, which resulted in three firearms recovered and \$10,000 (b) (7)(C) has been identified as the facilitator for the Urbenos, a paramilitary/drug trafficking organization operating in Colombia.

During the two day event, IOIs provided information, publications and responded to questions concerning applications, the National Firearms Act, the Gun Control Act and other topics to more than 500 licensees and the general public.

Significant Mexican Media Highlights This Period:

Federal Police Arrest Marcos Carmona Hernandez, Zeta Turf Boss in Oaxaca - The Secretariat of Public Security website reported in bulletin 161 on 7 March that the federal police arrested Marcos Carmona Hernandez, a.k.a. El Cabrito, while doing follow-up to investigations into the arrest of Flavio Mendez Santiago, a.k.a. El Amarillo, on 17 January. Carmona, 29 years old, is originally from Piedras Negras, Veracruz, and he joined the Zetas in 2006 as a security guard and spy. In 2009 he was made turf boss in Oaxaca and reported directly to Heriberto Lazcano Lazcano, a.k.a. El Lazca. He told authorities that the Zetas have a collaboration and non-aggression pact with the Beltran Leyva brothers' organization; Vicente Carrillo Fuentes, a.k.a. El Viceroy; and Fernando Sanchez Arellano, a.k.a. El Ingeniero, of the Arellano Felix Cartel. At the time of his arrest, he was in possession of two almost-new vehicles; a fragmentation grenade; an M-16 assault rifle; a small arm; two loaded clips for a long arm; a loaded clip for a small arm; two plastic containers with cocaine; and documents.

Grenade Thrown at PGJE Building in Ciudad Victoria - Monterrey *El Norte* in a late-night update on 7 March reported that a grenade blast at the State Attorney General's Office (PGJE) building late the previous night caused structural damage but no injuries or deaths. The building is located on the city's highway to Matamoros.

Mexico: Security Experts Blame Corruption for Weapons Flow into Mexico – According to Mexico city Reforma.com on March 7, 2011, security specialists considered that while it is true that the United States has failed to prevent indiscriminate arms sales, the Mexican Government must admit that their proliferation in national territory is due to corruption in customs and the lack of surveillance on the border. The experts affirmed that there is an urgent need to take measures to stop the flow of the close to 2,000 weapons that the Brookings Institution has estimated are introduced into the country every day. Otherwise, they say, the violence will increase even further.

Federal Authorities Arrest Acapulco Cartel Leader - The Secretariat of Public Security (SSP) reported in press bulletin 160 on 7 March that federal agents arrested Benjamin Flores Reyes, a.k.a. "El Padrino," one of the leaders of the Independent Cartel of Acapulco (CIDA). Allegedly, "El Padrino" was in charge of controlling drug distribution and managing lookout groups. He is also believed to have ordered and coordinated extortion ops, kidnappings, and hits on the members of rival groups in Acapulco. He reported directly to Moises Montero Alvarez, a.k.a. "El Koreano," one of the cartel's other leaders. Flores Reyes lived in the United States for more than 15 years. While there he studied criminal psychology. Three years ago he returned to Mexico and began working for Edgar Valdez Villarreal, a.k.a. "La Barbie."

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Gunmen Open Fire, Throw Grenade at Police Station in Guadalupe - On 3/9/11, Monterrey *El Norte* reported that a group of gunmen fired several gunshots and threw a grenade early that morning at a local police station located on the corner of Guadalajara Avenue and Helechos Street in the Fuentes de San Miguel neighborhood on the north side of Guadalupe. No injuries or deaths have been reported. The building sustained damage to the facade and windows.

Shooting in Juarez Sparks Roadblocks in 3 Municipalities - On 3/9/11, Monterrey *El Norte* reported that a gunfight between rival gangs the previous night at the San Roque junction on the highway to Reynosa in the Juarez municipality sparked a series of "narco-roadblocks" in the municipalities of Juarez, Guadalupe, and Apodaca. According to witnesses, at least three grenades were detonated during the 20-minute clash. One person was wounded and kidnapped during the incident. The subsequent roadblocks impeded the response of law enforcement officials to the scene of the shootout.

Underground Border Tunnel Found in Mexicali – On 3/9/11, Mexicali *La Cronica.com* reported that the previous afternoon, Army soldiers found a tunnel about five meters underground and crossing more than 100 meters into U.S. territory from Mexicali. The entrance had been excavated less than two meters from border wall. The tunnel was located near the All-American Canal and used now-confiscated hose to steal water from the canal. Three packets of marijuana and five oxygen tanks were also seized from inside the tunnel.

Federal Police Arrest Zeta Financial Operator, 16 Others, in San Luis Potosi - The Secretariat of Public Security website reports in bulletin 164 on 9 March that intelligence work and citizen reports clued authorities in to a heavily armed group that protected Zeta leaders and extorted, kidnapped, and murdered in San Luis Potosi. Federal police arrested Mario Jimenez Perez, a.k.a. Mayito, who was in charge of payroll for the paid assassins and responsible for handling the financing of drug sales and renting real estate and telephones. Along with Jimenez, authorities arrested 14 suspected Zeta members. During the arrests, authorities seized the following: two 38 Super small arms; a 10-mm small arm; a 9-mm small arm; a 40-caliber small arm; a 45-caliber small arm; 114 plastic bags of cocaine; 15 plastic bags of marijuana; 12 cellular phones; 11 communication radios; two frequency radios; a grey Honda CVR, no plates; a 2008 sand-colored Chevrolet Silverado, no plates; a 2003 yellow Hummer H2, no plates; a 1997 brown Ford Explorer, San Luis Potosi plates VAK5506; and a variety of documents.

Car Bomb in Ciudad Victoria - On March 16, 2011, Mexico City Cadena 3 reported that a car bomb exploded outside the local Public Security Secretariat (SSP) headquarters in Ciudad Victoria, Tamaulipas State. Although the explosion damaged homes and cars, no one was injured. The incident caused a massive mobilization of soldiers, Federal Police officers, and state policemen. This is the second attack against these headquarters in less than a week. The last time, armed men wearing ski masks opened fire on the facade of the building.

Six Gunmen Killed During Attempt on State AG's Life in Monterrey - On 3/18/11, Monterrey *El Norte* reported that a group of gunmen allegedly tried to kill State Attorney General Adrian de la Garza Santos at 0130 hours (local time) that morning in the Valle Verde neighborhood on the west side of Monterrey. The official's bodyguards engaged the attackers in a 10-minute shootout on Nogal Street between Abedul and Cerval streets, leaving six of the gunmen dead. One suspect was also arrested. One of the vehicles used by the gunmen was a white Nissan Tiida with plates SGY5965.

Investigative Assistance:

From March 4-8, 2011, the ATF Ciudad Juarez office coordinated with the El Paso Field Office on an investigation of a Ciudad Juarez resident who was trying to purchase AR-15 type rifles in El Paso, Texas. On March 7, 2011, the suspect went from Juarez to El Paso and picked up one of the rifles from the gun store and tried to cross back with it into Mexico. The vehicle/suspect was stopped and the rifle seized by Customs and Border Protection (CBP). Further investigation revealed that the suspect was acquiring the firearm(s) for three individuals that described themselves as "Zetas." The ATF Ciudad Juarez Field Office coordinated with the Mexican Federal Police (SSP) and provided maps of relevant addresses. The SSP investigated and corroborated some of the information provided. The investigation is ongoing.

On March 7, 2011, personnel from the ATF Ciudad Juarez office were given access to 19 seized firearms at the Chihuahua State Lab in Ciudad Juarez. These firearms were seized in various cases and several were identified as suspected guns involved in two cases in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

During this reporting period, the ATF Ciudad Juarez office worked very closely with the SSP in Chihuahua and gained access to (b)(3)(P.L. 111-117) of which have been traced back to a firearms trafficking case out of the Las Cruces Field Office. Personnel from the U.S. Consulate office in Ciudad Juarez have been assisting ATF Las Cruces and the U.S. Attorney's Office in preparing for the indictment of several people by examining and providing photographs of the firearms tied to their investigation. (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

(b)(3)(P.L. 111-117), have been traced back to a major firearms trafficking investigation in Phoenix, Arizona, where several suspects have been arrested in the past month. Two other firearms have come up on the suspect gun database and as part of a multiple purchase in Deming, New Mexico. Most of the previously mentioned firearms have been used in various violent crimes such as kidnapping and murder in connection with organized crime in Chihuahua.

The ATF agents have examined and photographed at least 15 Mexico seized firearms connected to the New Mexico firearms

trafficking investigation. They also coordinated the exchange of information regarding 10 addresses in Palomas, Chihuahua and Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua to ensure that all leads in Mexico are followed by the Mexican Federal Police in Chihuahua. ATF continues to investigate the information provided and will report any findings as they become available.

OFFICE OF TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

ATF conducted a five-day course in Mexico City from March 14-18, 2011. The course included a day of basic firearms ID training, a day of Explosive ID (Mexico specific) training and three days of E-trace and tracing training. Approximately 30 students participated in this course. The final list of students will be submitted next reporting period.

ATF conducted an International Post Blast course for Mexican officials during March 14-18, 2011, at the Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, AL. Approximately 30 Mexican officials received training in conducting bomb scene investigations and gained experience using the latest equipment and following standard safety procedures. This course also provided participants with hands-on training by requiring them to reconstruct components of an explosive device recovered through various investigative techniques. In addition, the course required students to participate in a practical exercise during which instructors guide the students through one of three bombing scenarios. The final practical exercise involved the processing of a crime scene caused by the detonation of a bomb inside a vehicle. The practical exercises are designed to analyze the specific duties of each team member.

Upon completion of the course, participants will have a valid foundation for conducting post blast scene investigation. The course was presented by six instructors from ATF to include, Special Agent CESs and Forensic lab personnel. The trainees attending this course are Government of Mexico law enforcement officers, military grade officers, and lab technicians.

ENFORCEMENT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Operation Fallen Hero – Phase 2

Objective:

In an effort to sustain the whole of government pressure on Los Zetas and to increase efforts against the transnational criminal organizations operating in Mexico, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), in partnership with Customs and Border Protection (CBP) will continue to investigate the illegal acquisition, staging, and movement of weapons from the United States to Mexico by attacking individuals and organizations engaged in the organized procurement and illicit investments to obtain weapons, explosives, and related components used to perpetuate cross-border criminal activity.

Operational Plan:

Recognizing each region along the Southwest Border is a unique operating environment with regards to the means and methods used by individuals and organizations to procure weapons, explosives, and related components, ICE and ATF Special Agents in Charge (SACs) will collaborate to design investigative operation(s) for their specific area of operation (AOR) to identify, disrupt, and dismantle individuals and organizations operating in their regions. The respective SACs will have the latitude to collaborate and subsequently implement joint operations under existing operational platforms; such as the Border Enforcement Security Task Forces (BESTs), Gun Runner Impact Teams (GRITs), Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) Strike Forces, by incorporating the individual agencies expertise in conducting controlled deliveries, undercover operations, tracing, etc. These operations can include, but not be limited to:

- Gun Show Operations
- Gang Surge Operations
- Intelligence Driven Outbound Operations with CBP
- Undercover Buy/Bust Surge Operations
- Immigration / 922(g) Operations to Target Foreign Nationals by leveraging

Cognizant that these operations will result in criminal and administrative arrests, ICE and ATF will advise their local United States Attorney's Office and ICE Chief Counsel (for immigration matters) of their operational activities.

Timeframe for Operation:

By April 1, 2011, the ICE and ATF Southwest Border SACs, in conjunction with their CBP counterparts, will submit an operational plan to the ICE, ATF, and CBP headquarters coordinators listed below and initiate their operations no later than May 1, 2011.

Metrics:

ICE and CBP personnel will report all statistics for this operation using project codes 1AY (Operation Fallen Hero) and 4DA (Firearms/Explosives Smuggling) on reports of investigation, case reports, and search, arrest, and seizure (SAS) reports.

ATF personnel will report all statistics using....





BACKGROUND

Firearms and explosives violence has escalated to unprecedented levels in Mexico, particularly along the border with the United States. Recent car bombings, increased grenade attacks, and record highs in cartel related killings have further reinforced that the Mexican drug cartels are a threat to Mexico's national security. Power struggles within and among the cartels and between the cartels and the Mexican police and military continue to fuel the demand for increasingly lethal firepower. Organized crime related murders in Mexico more than doubled from 2007 to 2008, and the decade ended with a record breaking 6,587 murders in 2009. During the first week of November 2010, the number of reported organized crime related murders in Mexico surpassed 10,000.^[1]

Securing the Southwest Border is a top priority of the United States. The 2010 Emergency Border Security Supplemental Appropriations Bill (HR 6080) recently allocated \$600 million for numerous security projects and to bolster the work of Federal law enforcement officials along the border. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) received \$37.5 million of the supplemental funds to expand its personnel and operations dedicated to investigating, disrupting, and dismantling the organizations and networks responsible for trafficking firearms to Mexican cartels and to reduce cartel related border violence.

Since 2006, Project Gunrunner has been ATF's comprehensive strategy to combat firearms related violence by the cartels along the Southwest Border. The strategy aims to reduce firearms and explosives related violent crime associated with Mexican criminal enterprises operating in the U.S. and Mexico by preventing these organizations from acquiring and trafficking firearms and explosives. ATF works toward this goal with an integrated approach that uses all appropriate agency capabilities and by working collaboratively with domestic and international partners.

In April 2009, ATF developed the Gun Runner Impact Team (GRIT) initiative as a supplement to Project Gunrunner to aggressively target and disrupt groups and organizations responsible for the trafficking of firearms to Mexico. The GRIT initiative, designed to be intelligence driven and investigative in nature, focuses on investigating a large number of firearms trafficking leads based on trace information from firearms recovered in Mexico and information obtained from the inspection of Federal firearms licensees (FFLs).

The first GRIT was deployed in ATF's Houston Field Division area, where a majority of firearms recovered in Mexico are sourced. In support of GRIT, ATF deployed an estimated 100 law enforcement, industry operations, intelligence, legal, technical, and administrative support personnel to the Houston Field Division for 120 days. The Houston GRIT was an unprecedented operation that achieved significant success. ATF conducted an extensive post-GRIT assessment to identify lessons learned and applied these lessons in a proposal for a second GRIT operation to be conducted in the Phoenix Field Division.

According to Grupo Reforma's "ejecutómetro" (execution meter), a running tally of cartel-related killings, in 2010 there were 10,095 such killings as of November 8, 2010.

PHOENIX GRIT

In May 2010, ATF deployed approximately 80 special agents, industry operations investigators (IOIs), intelligence research specialists (IRS), and support personnel to the Phoenix Field Division for a 100-day GRIT operation. The goal of this deployment was to have a focused impact on individuals and groups trafficking firearms from the Phoenix Field Division area into Mexico. The GRIT personnel, combined with Phoenix Field Division personnel, reinforced ATF's unique ability to bring together its firearms trafficking investigative expertise with its regulatory authority and strategic partnerships to combat firearms trafficking to Mexico.

The initiative was conducted under the operational control of the Phoenix Field Division's Special Agent in Charge and received assistance from other ATF components as needed. Special agents and support personnel were detailed to six existing criminal enforcement groups. Two Industry Operations groups consisting of area supervisors, industry operations investigators, and support personnel were created and detailed to Phoenix and Tucson. Additionally, three industry operations investigators were detailed to the Albuquerque II office, and nine special agents, two intelligence research specialists, and one industry operations investigator were detailed to support the Field Intelligence Group.

The Special Agent in Charge, Phoenix Field Division, recommended the specific human resource requirements (number, type, and locations of assignments) needed to support the initiative, and the Assistant Director of Field Operations approved the recommendation. (See the chart below.) Phoenix Field Division leadership, group supervisors, special agents, industry operations investigators, and intelligence and support personnel provided leadership, guidance, and intelligence and administrative support to the GRIT detailees.

GRIT GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The overarching goal of the GRIT initiative was to aggressively target and disrupt groups and organizations responsible for trafficking firearms to Mexico. The Phoenix GRIT focused its resources on three main components: an Industry Operations Initiative, a Firearms Trafficking Investigation Initiative, and a Home Invasion Initiative.

The goal of the Industry Operations Initiative was to complete as many inspections as possible of identified high risk FFLs, develop firearms trafficking leads for follow up investigative action, educate FFLs regarding straw purchaser indicators, improve licensees' internal controls, and provide FFLs with a point of contact for reporting suspicious activity.

The Firearms Trafficking Investigation Initiative focused on the two largest metropolitan areas in Arizona; Phoenix and Tucson. These two metropolitan areas are the primary sources of firearms purchased in Arizona and recovered in Mexico. Enforcement groups targeted individuals responsible for illicit firearms trafficking to Mexico in these areas, including illegal firearms suppliers of violent gangs and criminal enterprises that have a direct nexus to Mexico.

Another goal of the Firearms Trafficking Investigation Initiative was to assign a backlog of National Instant Check System (NICS) standard denials for investigative follow up action, with special emphasis on foreign born purchasers who were the subject of a NICS denial. A standard denial is one in which a prohibited person attempts to purchase a firearm, but based on a NICS denial, no firearms transfer takes place.

The Home Invasion Initiative focused on dismantling several home invasion crews in the Phoenix and Tucson areas. The Phoenix Field Division has found that these crews often target drug stash houses, have significant connections to the Mexican drug cartels, and are often engaged in trafficking firearms to Mexico.

GRIT SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Criminal Enforcement

As a result of the GRIT initiative, the Phoenix Field Division opened 174 new investigations. A total of 27 cases and 66 defendants were forwarded for prosecution during the GRIT initiative and approximately 70 percent of backlogged NICS referrals in the Phoenix Field Division were successfully completed during the GRIT operational period.

ATF seized 1,285 firearms, 71,774 rounds of ammunition, two blasting caps, 11 silencers, \$7,763 in currency, 676.2 grams of powder or crack cocaine, 457.7 grams of methamphetamine, and 363.2 grams of marijuana during GRIT operations.

Although all participating Phoenix Field Division field offices completed significant criminal enforcement actions that will be highlighted throughout this assessment, some field offices achieved particularly noteworthy accomplishments during the GRIT operational period. The Tucson II Field Office initiated "Operation Vaquero" and uncovered an ammunition smuggling

ring associated with the Sinaloa criminal enterprise in Mexico suspected of trafficking over 300,000 rounds of ammunition across the border. The operation disrupted this ammunition pipeline and seized 30,000 rounds of ammunition. The Tucson I Field Office discovered an emerging trend in which criminal enterprises now use white, employed males with no criminal histories to conduct straw purchases in an attempt to elude law enforcement attention.

The Phoenix VII Field Office seized over 230 firearms, including a .50 caliber rifle with an obliterated serial number. In addition, this office, working with the Phoenix Police Department on a joint home invasion investigation, identified a 14-member straw purchasing organization and seized 49 AK-47 style rifles, two pistols, hundreds of magazines, and a Barrett .50 caliber rifle. Four illegal aliens who were arrested as result of this investigation admitted that the guns were headed to Mexico.

Additionally, the GRIT initiative contributed to the discovery of a previously unknown firearms trafficking pattern within the United States. Firearms purchased in the Phoenix area are increasingly being recovered in crimes committed in Texas. This pattern is unusual because both Arizona and Texas have an abundance of FFLs and both are considered source States for firearms.

The GRIT initiative has also led to the identification of two previously unknown firearms trafficking patterns from the U.S. into Mexico. Firearms purchased in the Phoenix area and recovered in Mexico typically make their way directly south into the Mexican border States of Sonora and Chihuahua. Firearms purchased in the Phoenix area and recovered in Mexico are now being recovered as far west as Baja California Norte and as far east as Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon.

Industry Operations

ATF Industry Operations was able to inspect virtually every FFL that had not been inspected in Arizona's Maricopa County and the Tucson area within the past 5 years. In addition, Industry Operations inspected a number of FFLs that had not been inspected in Maricopa County within the last 3 to 5 years. During the initiative, Industry Operations completed 806 inspections, reviewed 56,117 ATF Forms 4473 for accuracy and firearms trafficking indicators, and recommended 110 administrative actions (109 warning letters and warning conferences, and one recommendation for revocation). Industry Operations verified the accuracy of FFL records for 43,359 firearms and reduced the number of missing and unaccounted for firearms from 1,703 to 333. Industry Operations also uncovered 146 unreported multiple sales totaling 379 firearms and made 108 referrals for follow up action. A total of 69 FFLs surrendered their license during this period.

industry operations investigators were able to identify a number of record keeping deficiencies and educate the licensees about Federal firearms laws and regulations. Several licensees expressed their gratitude for ATF's effort to help improve their internal controls, review the firearms laws and regulations, and improve the overall efficiency of their operations.

There were a number of significant inspections conducted by Industry Operations that resulted in violations identified and referrals generated for firearms trafficking and unlicensed business activity, such as engaging in the business of dealing in firearms without a license and manufacturing firearms without the proper license. An inspection of an FFL located in Maricopa County resulted in a referral to ATF special agents for an individual who had obtained 34 firearms between September 10, 2009 and May 20, 2010. Of these firearms, 32 involved "assault-type" weapons. Another individual purchased 32 firearms, of which 23 were receivers, during the same approximate period.

During a compliance inspection of another FFL in Maricopa County, four possible firearm traffickers were identified. An e-Trace examination of crime guns from this dealer showed that

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Another inspection of an FFL in Maricopa County revealed that the licensee had failed to file 50 multiple handgun sale reports involving 150 handguns.

A number of licensees in certain outlying areas of New Mexico were found to have significant violations. Additional inspections are planned for these locations.

COLLABORATION

The Phoenix Field Division continued one of ATF's core enforcement philosophies during GRIT by collaborating with numerous Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies. Examples ranged from local police departments providing suspect information to ATF agents, to the Albuquerque Police Department pledging 20 to 30 police officers to supplement ATF's participation in GRIT activities in New Mexico.

Although numerous State and local police departments contributed to the success of the Phoenix GRIT, the Phoenix Police Department, Maricopa County Sheriff's Department, and Tucson Police Department played major roles in GRIT activities. Four of the five enforcement groups participating in GRIT reported significant collaboration with these three departments, including intelligence activities and manpower, tactical, equipment, and logistical support. Through their support, the Phoenix and Tucson police departments and the Maricopa County Sheriff's Department directly and positively impacted the GRIT results. Other law enforcement agencies that greatly contributed to the success of the Phoenix Field Division GRIT were the Mesa,

Arizona and Albuquerque, New Mexico Police Departments, the Pinal County, Arizona Sheriff's Office, the Arizona Department of Public Safety, and the Arizona Department of Revenue.

Several Federal agencies contributed to the overall success of the Phoenix Field Division GRIT, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S Marshals Service, the U.S. Secret Service, the Internal Revenue Service, and the El Paso Intelligence Center.

Examples of collaboration with other agencies during the GRIT included the following:

- ATF assigned five GRIT detailees to assist the U.S. Border Patrol, ICE, and the DEA in a
 large Title III interception-based narcotics and human trafficking investigation in an area
 outside of Tucson, Arizona known as the Vekol Valley. This area is located within the
 northern confines of the Tohono O'odham Indian Reservation and is a well known
 thoroughfare for trafficking contraband north and south across the U.S./Mexico border.
- ATF, FBI, U.S. Border Patrol, ICE, the Tohono O'odham Indian Police Department, and the Tucson Police Special Investigations Unit worked together to dismantle a narcotics and firearms trafficking ring operating on the reservation. Several individuals have been arrested on narcotics charges and the case is ongoing.
- Operation Vaquero (mentioned earlier) involved multiple agency coordination to investigate a Tucson based criminal conspiracy suspected of trafficking thousands of rounds of ammunition to a Mexican criminal enterprise. ATF has confirmed that three suspects purchased over a quarter million rounds of ammunition from FFLs and online ammunition retailers. The three suspects are unemployed, used multiple prepaid credit cards to order the ammunition, and used unusual methods to receive and transport the ammunition. One of the suspects is connected to the Sinaloa criminal enterprise. On June 3, 2010, ATF Tucson offices I and II, GRIT special agents, FBI, ICE, and Tucson Police Department officers executed three Federal search warrants in furtherance of this investigation. The three suspects were arrested and indicted on June 23, 2010, by a grand jury in the U.S. District Court District of Arizona for the smuggling of ammunition and other charges. Seven other persons identified through subsequent investigation are suspected of coordinating and facilitating the trafficking of ammunition and narcotics.
- ATF collaborated with the Government of Mexico through a representative of the Procuraduría General de la República (Mexico's attorney general) detailed to work onsite with ATF in Phoenix. The presence of an onsite representative from the Government of Mexico facilitated the sharing of timely information relating to investigations on both sides of the border.
- The ATF Special Agent in Charge of the Phoenix Field Division conducted two training sessions on ATF's Gunrunner Program to a total of 50 Mexican law enforcement officers from the Mexican States of Sinaloa and Baja California Norte. The training focused on

ATF's efforts to combat the trafficking of firearms to Mexico and on assistance that Mexico can provide to ATF in this ongoing effort.

FIREARMS TRAFFICKING METHODS AND EMERGING TRENDS

Information gathered from GRIT after-action interviews with supervisors confirmed the existence of certain firearms trafficking methods and uncovered new trafficking trends. The primary method of transporting firearms across the border is vehicles, including tractor trailers. Firearms are often concealed in hidden compartments, false panels, or the spare tire of a vehicle. Another concealment method seen during GRIT was the secreting of firearms secured by zip ties on the undercarriage of vehicles. Firearms are often stored in stash houses near the border and later transported to Mexico. Firearms cross the border in vehicles via ports of entry and also via Indian reservations. Firearms are also simply carried across the border on foot.

A primary method of communication among firearms traffickers continues to be pre-paid cell phones that are used for only a short period of time before being discarded. Often, cell phone SIM cards are swapped out for calls involving illegal activities.

Most often, cash is used to purchase firearms destined for illegal trafficking. One investigation revealed the use of pre-paid credit cards to purchase ammunition.

GRIT investigations have confirmed that individuals who recruit straw purchasers often attempt to insulate themselves from the purchasers by using them for one firearms purchase and then recruiting the purchasers' family, friends, or associates to make additional purchases.

GRIT investigations found that of the straw purchasers who were identified, approximately 75 percent are on public assistance and are between 18 and 24 years old. However, an emerging trend uncovered was the recruitment of older white males with jobs and no criminal histories to straw purchase firearms. According to a confidential informant, these individuals are being sought out in both the Phoenix and Tucson areas to purchase expensive firearms, particularly .50 caliber and belt-fed World War II replica firearms. These straw purchasers, who are valued for their perceived ability to purchase firearms without raising interest of law enforcement, are paid approximately \$700 to \$800 per firearm purchase.

During GRIT, a new pattern of recoveries in Mexico for Arizona-sourced firearms emerged. Normally, firearms purchases in the Phoenix area are recovered directly south of Arizona in the Mexican States of Sonora and Chihuahua. A new east-west trend has been identified in which firearms purchased in the Phoenix Field Division area are now being recovered as far west as Baja California Norte and as far east as Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon.

Upon detection of the firearms recoveries in Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon, the Phoenix Field Division Field Intelligence Group began researching trace data for further analysis. Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas represent territory of the Los Zetas and Gulf cartels, both of which appear to

obtain the majority of their firearms from Texas, according to recent firearms trace data. The Field Intelligence Group will report its analytical findings in an intelligence assessment.

A previously uncommon intra-U.S. firearm trafficking pattern was discovered, originating in the Phoenix area. Firearms purchased there are now being recovered in Texas. This pattern is unusual because both States have an abundance of FFLs and generally less restrictive State firearms laws and are recognized as "source" States.

OUTREACH

The Phoenix GRIT outreach campaign consisted of providing training for a number of large corporate Federal firearms license holders, including Dick's Sporting Goods, Inc. on July 8, 2010. The training at Dick's Sporting Goods, a national sporting goods chain, focused on Federal firearms laws and regulations. The training was prompted by inspections of two stores in the Phoenix area and recent high turnover of employees in local stores. Sixteen managerial employees from different Dick's stores in Arizona attended the training. Training emphasized proper execution of ATF Forms 4473 and the maintenance of acquisition and disposition records.

As part of the inspection process, industry operations investigators provided FFLs with handout materials that discuss safety and security measures to help prevent the theft or loss of firearms, and information on firearms trafficking indicators that could prevent the FFL from becoming an unwitting participant in illegal firearms transactions. Handout material included ATF Publication 3317.2, "Safety and Security Information for Federal Firearms Licensees," ATF Publication 3317.6, "Project Gunrunner: The Southwest Border Initiative," ATF Publication 5300.18, "Nonimmigrant Aliens Purchasing Firearms and Ammunition in the US," and "Don't Lie for the Other Guy" posters and flyers.

Industry operations investigators reviewed Federal firearms laws and regulations with FFLs and made recommendations for improving internal controls, which in some cases also helped to streamline the licensees' operations. A list of contact numbers for the ATF in Arizona and New Mexico was provided to the licensees to report suspicious activity.

During the Houston GRIT in 2009, there was some concern that the extensive media coverage at the inception of the GRIT may have served as a forewarning to offenders, who may have then temporarily suspended their criminal activities or moved to other areas to commit them. As a result of those concerns, no preliminary press conference was held for the Phoenix GRIT. However, at the conclusion of the operation, ATF Deputy Director Kenneth E. Melson and the United States Attorney, District of Arizona, Dennis K. Burke announced the successes of the operation at a press conference.

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¹ According to ATF's 2009 Project Gunrunner Assessment, of the 517 firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 and matched with open source seizure events associated with the Gulf cartel/Los Zetas, 80 percent were purchased in Texas.

CONCLUSION

Through a combination of flexible and experienced management; motivated and focused employees; support from outside law enforcement agencies; and large scale Industry Operations, Firearms Trafficking, and Home Invasion Initiatives, GRIT had a positive and lasting impact on violent crime and illegal firearms trafficking in the Phoenix Field Division area.


The combination of these elements and initiatives, along with the force multiplier of over 80 additional ATF personnel, led to more than 800 FFLs – one-third of all FFLs in Arizona and New Mexico combined – being inspected, 70 percent of Phoenix Field Division's backlogged NICS referrals being addressed, over 1,200 firearms and 71,000 rounds of ammunition seized from the criminal element, 66 defendants being recommended for prosecution, and 174 investigations being initiated. These statistics will increase in future weeks, months, and years, which is often the case with large scale criminal investigative initiatives. The full success and impact of the Phoenix Field Division GRIT will not be realized for some time, because pending investigations, spin-off investigations, new intelligence, ongoing trials, and additional circumstances inherent in large-scale operations often delay the true impact of an initiative.


Additional GRIT successes were achieved, including the identification of a new east-west firearms trafficking trend from Arizona into Mexico, the identification of a previously unknown firearms trafficking pattern from Arizona into Texas, the discovery of criminal enterprises employing a new type of straw purchaser in the Tucson and Phoenix area, and the identification and break-up of multiple home invasion crews connected to Mexican drug cartels. Expanded outreach to FFLs has improved their relationship with ATF and raised their awareness of what constitutes illegal firearms activity and how to deter would-be offenders. Additionally, GRIT has helped to bring into compliance FFLs that had not been inspected by ATF in a number of years.

Finally, GRIT has raised awareness along the Southwest Border region in Arizona that ATF and its Federal, State, and local counterparts are committed, focused, and determined to address violent firearms trafficking crimes along the border.




This TNW .50 caliber rifle was seized the day of the GRIT press conference as part of a continuing GRIT investigation.





A bin full of magazines (top) and 49 AK variants (bottom) were recovered in a joint home invasion investigation by the Phoenix Police Department and ATF. The four illegal aliens who were arrested admitted that the guns were headed to Mexico. The guns were brand new in their original boxes. Traces showed that all were purchased in the previous 7 to 10 days.



The above map depicts Arizona-sourced firearms recovered in Mexico during the GRIT period. The map reflects recoveries of Arizona-sourced firearms directly south of Arizona, as well as to areas east and west. The east-west recoveries are an emerging trend that was identified during the GRIT operation.



1. How many weapons have been allowed to pass to Mexico under the program known as "Fast and Furious"? Is the program still active?

Moreover, the allegation that the "Fast and Furious" investigation somehow caused a "large flow of weapons across the border to Mexico," is mistaken. "Fast and Furious" did not involve agents watching as guns crossed into Mexico. This investigation did not include any planned or attempted controlled delivery of firearms to Mexico. It was not part of the investigation to permit guns to pass through any Port of Entry into Mexico. Indeed, this investigative team was keenly aware of the difficulty in gathering evidence that is located or recovered in Mexico and the difficulty in conducting coordinated interdiction efforts south of the border. Simply put, illegal arms traffickers delivered those weapons to Mexico -- despite efforts by U.S. law enforcement to stop them.

- 4. Did ATF or the U.S. Attorney's Office in Phoenix coordinate the "Fast and Furious" program with the Department? Did the Department approve the strategy?
- 5. What changes or improvements has ATF made to its eTrace program and its ability to use intelligence to target gun trafficking organizations in general?

You have also asked for information about eTrace, an important tool in ATF's work to dismantle gun trafficking. eTrace is an Internet-based system that allows participating law enforcement agencies to submit firearm traces to the ATF National Tracing Center. Authorized users can receive firearm trace results electronically, search a database of all firearm traces submitted by their individual agency, and perform analytical functions. In the last year, eTrace has gained strong new features. eTrace now accommodates data in Spanish, gives translations, and allows users to better sort and search additional data elements and images to improve weapons tracing. In the next 24 months, planned enhancements

to eTrace will improve ATF's ability to monitor and map gun tracing data in real time and to share information with other federal agencies, as well as with state and local law enforcement.

Q&A: Mexican Trace Data Not for Public Dissemination/For Internal Use Only Public Affairs Division - Washington, DC he Frontline Against Violent Crime

Mexican Trace Data (March 15, 2011)

- Q. In October 2010 the Washington Post reported "the Mexican government often says that 90 percent of the weapons it confiscates come from the United States. In 2009 testimony before Congress, the ATF director Kenneth Melson gave that same figure. Can you account for the drastic decline?
- A. When initially reported, the percentages (90 percent) were accurate. Though now the percentages may be lower, perhaps due to a lack of critical firearms indicators on the trace requests, the sheer number US-sourced guns in Mexico is a problem.
- Q. According to the Center for Public Integrity during an ATF operation called "Fast and Furious" in Arizona ATF agents may have let as in excess of 2000 firearms "walk" across the border into Mexico, does the 2010 trace data take those firearms into account?
- A. Once recovered in Mexico and submitted to ATF, the ATF National Tracing Center, would have been asked to run a trace on all the firearms once the agents had a list or got a list from the FFL's records of all associated with the straw purchaser/firearms trafficker.

Fast and Furious is still an ongoing prosecution so I cannot talk specifically. However, I do know that of the guns associated with it, 797 of the guns were eventually recovered and traced 160 of those were recovered in Mexico and are included in the 2010 totals. It is important to note, the reporting requirement ATF proposed is proactive and can point to traffickers before a gun is used in a crime.

- Q. How do you justify 160 guns involved in an ATF investigation crossing the border into Mexico?
- A. If one gun gets away on our watch and ends up in the hands of someone who harms an innocent person it is too many. But the sheer number of firearms recovered in Mexico and traced back to a United States source is evidence there is a problem and we are doing everything we can within the law to stop firearms trafficking across the border.
- Q. In September 2010 a report by Mayors Against Illegal Guns titled Issue Brief: The Movement of Illegal Guns Across the U.S.-Mexico Border stated that the time-to-crime statistic for U.S. guns recovered in Mexico, had decreased dramatically to less than less than 3 years in 2009. Is this still the issue for U.S. gun recovered in Mexico?
- A. ATF cannot comment on the Mayors Against Illegal Guns report. However, in 2010 the average time-to-crime for U.S. guns recovered in Mexico was 11.3 years. Of the guns with a

time-to-crime of three years or less, the vast majority are the highly sought 7.62 and .223 caliber firearms, the guns of choice by Mexico's drug trafficking organizations.

- Q. In November 2010 an OIG review of ATF's Project Gunrunner cited a June 2009 Government Accountability Office report which estimated that trace data was submitted to ATF on less than a quarter of the guns seized in Mexico. In addition, the report said most trace requests that are submitted to ATF from Mexico are considered "unsuccessful" because of missing or improperly entered gun data. Has this problem been corrected so Mexico can get more accurate trace results?
- A. ATF has provided Mexican law enforcement with training in firearms identification and the use of a Spanish language version of eTrace. Overtime, the Mexican officials began to see the importance of tracing as an investigative tool.

Q. What about the disk ATF received from Mexico with serial numbers of firearms they needed traced?

A. In September 2009, the government of Mexico provided ATF with electronic files containing firearms identifiers and recovery data. The electronic files contain information that initiated over 43,000 firearm traces, excluding duplicates, with most having recovery years ranging from calendar year 2007 to 2009. Once each trace was initiated, it was organized by year of recovery. With the influx of trace data from these electronic files, the number of firearms listed as recovered in 2009 and traced has increased from earlier releases of information.

Q. What is involved in a firearms trace?

A. When a firearm is recovered at a crime scene, law enforcement officers contact the National Tracing Center with information about the firearm (make, model, caliber, serial number, and importer (if necessary). The National Tracing Center then contacts the manufacturer, wholesaler and retailer to ascertain the purchaser. At minimum, NTC can determine whether or not the firearm is sourced from the United States, meaning manufactured or imported here legally for sale.

Q. What are the firearms of choice by drug trafficking organizations in Mexico?

A. Based on the trace data of firearms recovered at crime scenes in Mexico we see more high caliber, semi-automatic firearms like the .223 and 7.62 caliber used and recovered in crimes in Mexico.

- Q. Director Melson has been quoted in the past saying ATF would not release Mexican trace stats anymore because people on both sides of the gun rights issue use the data for their own gain. Why did ATF have a change of heart?
- A. ATF is not reporting just the percentages but the actual number of firearms recovered, traced and sourced from the United States. By reporting the actual numbers, a true picture

develops of the number of U.S. sourced crime guns are being recovered in Mexico – thus showing the public the gravity of the problem.

Q. What does ATF mean by the phrase "Time-to-Crime?"

A. Time-to-Crime refers to the length of time from the initial purchase date of the firearm to the date the firearm is recovered at a crime scene. It can be a valuable piece of information for investigators, especially when looking at firearms trafficking schemes.

O. Which U.S. state is has the largest number of firearms recovered in Mexico?

A. Since 2007 trace data has shown Texas as the number one source state for firearms recovered in Mexico, followed by Arizona.

Q. Why are the number of guns traced back to the states such a small number?

A. Traces included in the Mexican trace data are those which NTC is able to identify a purchaser and the dealer where the firearm was purchased. If can't trace the firearm back to initial purchaser then we can't determine the state of origin.

Q. What is a successful trace?

A. A successful trace is one in which the firearm can be traced back to its manufacturer or importer in the U.S.

Q. What factors could contribute to an unsuccessful trace result with a firearm recovered in Mexico?

A. Some reasons for traces not identifying an individual purchaser include incomplete data on trace request, the firearms was too old to trace, the firearm serial number was invalid, incomplete out-of-business records and altered or obliterated serial numbers.

Q. Why have the statistics dropped so dramatically between 2008 and 2010?

A. While the overall number of traces has dropped between 2008 and 2010, there were 4506 rifles recovered in Mexico that ATF was able to trace back to a U.S. source. The sheer number of traces and the continued violence cannot be ignored.

Q. Are US efforts working?

A. U.S. efforts along the Southwest Border are working but we believe more can be done to stop the flow of firearms from the U.S. into Mexico. Multiple sales reporting of long guns along the Southwest Border would provide ATF with another law enforcement tool to stop the violence along the Mexico-U.S. border.

Q. Why do you need multiple sales reporting for long guns if the numbers are dropping? Do 549 .223s and 7.62s justify multiple sales reporting?

A. The Mexican trace data shows that the firearms of choice for Mexican drug trafficking organizations are long guns.

Q. Did ATF have reason to believe that suspects under investigation were trafficking guns to Mexico?

A. The number one concern for ATF is interdicting guns that are unlawfully transferred to persons in the U.S. and in Mexico who will then commit crimes with those guns. The purpose of any trafficking investigation is to locate those guns, interdict those guns and bring those responsible for their unlawful purchase, transfer, finance and use to justice.


Q. Did ATF knowingly allow guns to travel from the United States to Mexico because investigators believed suspects would traffic guns there?

A. ATF did not engage in an effort to allow guns to travel from the U.S. to Mexico. In short, the law does not permit agents to take guns away from anyone who buys 10 AKs at a time solely because they bought multiple guns. In these investigations, there may come a point over the course of an investigation where ATF believes, though it is well short of proof beyond a reasonable doubt require in criminal cases, that they can prove that a particular person only buys guns for the purpose of illegal trafficking. However, seizure of the guns at that point may not be legal because purchasing multiple long guns in Arizona is lawful, transferring them to another is lawful and even sale or barter of the guns to another is lawful unless the Unites States can prove by clear and convincing evidence that the firearm is intended to be used to commit a crime.

Q. Did ATF knowingly allow guns to travel from the United States to Mexico because investigators watched suspects trafficking guns there?

A. ATF did not knowingly allow guns to travel from the U.S. to Mexico. The number one concern for ATF is interdicting guns that are unlawfully transferred to persons in the U.S. and in Mexico who will then commit crimes with those guns. The purpose of any trafficking investigation is to locate those guns, interdict those guns and bring those responsible for their unlawful purchase, transfer, finance and use to justice.



SUBJECT: Project Gunrunner / Cartel Focused Strategy Implementation Plan

This memorandum will serve two related purposes: 1) to transmit conceptual changes to Project Gunrunner, and 2) in conjunction with the objectives of Project Gunrunner, to provide guidance regarding the submission of Cartel Focused Strategy implementation plans.

ATF initiated Project Gunrunner in 2006 to address the escalating violence and firearms trafficking associated with criminal enterprises in Mexico and along the Southwest Border (SWB) of the United States. As part of Project Gunrunner's evolution, a renewed focus on higher-level or organizational targets resulted in the development of ATF's <u>Cartel Focused Strategy</u>, which was released in September 2010. It is important to note that this strategy does not replace Project Gunrunner but merely augments it, providing the direction by which ATF resources can be more effectively utilized in identifying targets of higher value, and further disrupting efforts by transnational groups or individuals to obtain firearms for trafficking and other unlawful purposes.

In practical terms, Project Gunrunner is a component of the Bureau's National Firearms Enforcement Program, and a subset of ATF's comprehensive Southwest Border Initiative (SBI). Since ATF receives appropriated funds specifically designated for Project Gunrunner, it is necessary to clearly define and distinguish Project Gunrunner apart from other southwest border related firearms trafficking investigations. From this point forward, "Project Gunrunner" activity shall be defined as follows:

"Any investigative or regulatory action expended on matters pertaining to the cross-border, Mexico-bound trafficking of firearms or explosives, or the criminal use/violent crime related activity resulting from, or related to, the cross-border, Mexico-bound trafficking of firearms or explosives, of which the investigative

and/or regulatory activity originates in an ATF office *specifically designated and funded* under Project Gunrunner."

Re-defining Project Gunrunner in this way is necessary for improved accountability regarding the implementation and performance of Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy, thereby allowing for program-specific adjustments to the strategy as evolving conditions may dictate. In no way is this intended to discourage non-Project Gunrunner offices from initiating investigations regarding Mexico-bound, or southwest border related weapons trafficking and related violent crime as these cases are instrumental to the overall success of ATF's Southwest Border Initiative.

Investigative and/or regulatory matters originating in designated and funded Project Gunrunner offices that are not directly related to achieving the objectives of Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy should be referred to a non-Gunrunner group or office. It is understood that there will be events, for example an explosives incident or IED recovery near a remote field office (such as the newly created Sierra Vista office) that will require a local ATF response, but which fall outside the scope of the Project Gunrunner mission. In these cases the Project Gunrunner field office may handle the initial scene response, but should defer the lead role in the investigation to the office specified by the division SAC or ASAC.

Designated Project Gunrunner Locations

Currently funded Project Gunrunner offices are El Centro (Los Angeles FD), Phoenix VII, Tucson IV, Roswell (satellite), Las Cruces II, and Sierra Vista (Phoenix FD), El Paso III (Dallas FD), Houston IX, Brownsville, and McAllen III (Houston FD). International offices currently funded under Project Gunrunner are Tijuana, Ciudad Juarez, Guadalajara, and Merida. These are the only offices that ATF recognizes as Project Gunrunner field offices for statistical and funding purposes. All other ATF groups/offices actively working SWB-related investigations are recognized as contributing to ATF's overall Southwest Border Initiative. These investigations will be tracked separately from Project Gunrunner. Instructions for proper coding in NFORCE, NSPECT, and WebTA are provided in Attachment A of this memorandum.

Cartel Focused Strategy Implementation Plan

The Cartel Focused Strategy outlines in broad terms the Bureau's strategic objectives in addressing cartel-related firearms trafficking and violent crime suppression. However, the SAC's, DIO's, and ASAC's have a greater understanding of the unique cartel-related crime problems within their respective field divisions, and are therefore better equipped to develop an actionable plan towards achieving the objectives of Project Gunrunner. The resilience of the Mexican cartels in adapting their activities to counter those of law enforcement makes a "one

size fits all" strategy both impractical and unrealistic. It is essential that our strategies and tactics are capable of evolving just as quickly as those of our criminal adversaries.

Therefore, as part of ATF's efforts to refine Project Gunrunner, capture all relevant statistics and performance-related data, and to more effectively coordinate ATF's ongoing efforts related to violent crime suppression along the Southwest Border, each SAC will prepare and provide to this office a strategy document that identifies how the Cartel Focused Strategy will be implemented in their respective field division. Guidelines for preparing the implementation plans are provided in <u>Attachment B</u> of this memorandum. Implementation plans will be updated no less than annually, but especially when evolving threats or emerging trends in cartel-related firearms activity necessitate a change in ATF's response in a given Project Gunrunner area.

Special agents in charge are to provide their written strategies with relevant attachments to Project Gunrunner/Southwest Border National Coordinator (b) (7)(C) no later than May 16, 2011.



ATTACHMENT A

Coding Project Gunrunner Activity

Proper coding of Project Gunrunner activity in NFORCE, NSPECT, and WebTA is essential for accurate tracking and reporting. Therefore, ALL personnel assigned to specifically designated and funded Project Gunrunner offices listed in the transmittal memo should *only* expend investigative and/or regulatory activity on firearms/explosives trafficking directly related to Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy. This activity should be properly coded/documented in NFORCE and NSPECT as shown below. The Project Gunrunner/SWB profile <u>must</u> be utilized by all special agents and industry operations investigators assigned to Project Gunrunner funded offices. Non-Project Gunrunner offices should continue to use the Project Gunrunner profile code in NFORCE for all investigations or inspections having a Southwest Border firearms or explosives nexus.



For tracking performance of Project Gunrunner funded offices separately from that of other offices' SWB-related investigative or regulatory activity, the Office of Field Operations will periodically query Project Gunrunner/SWB cases in NFORCE or NSPECT. To guarantee data integrity, all supervisors should ensure that Project Gunrunner cases are properly coded in NFORCE and NSPECT upon the initiation of the case.

Attachment A

WebTA

Accurate data is essential for improving program performance and accountability. Therefore, personnel should document their activity in WebTA as follows:

Personnel assigned to Project Gunrunner funded offices should expend 100% of their investigative or regulatory activity on furthering the objectives of Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy. Project Gunrunner personnel <u>must</u> document investigative or regulatory activity in WebTA by using project code **G1G** for Gunrunner (Firearms), and **A2R** for Gunrunner (Explosives). Based on the specifically funded missions and objectives of the designated Project Gunrunner offices, personnel in these offices should set G1G and A2R as default project codes in WebTA.

Personnel in non-Gunrunner funded offices should, when performing investigative or regulatory activity related to SWB firearms or explosives issues, <u>always</u> use the above project codes in WebTA.

ATTACHMENT B

Cartel Focused Strategy Implementation Plans

When preparing division Cartel Focused Strategy implementation plans your responses should, at a minimum include, but not be limited to the following:

- 1. Group/office name and Org Code (e.g. Phoenix VII Field Office 785115)
- 2. Location (onsite, offsite, co-located [with whom])
- 3. Geographic service area
- 4. Date operational
- 5. Staffing scheme/distribution (Special Agents, IOI's, IRS, IA, GS/RAC, TFO's, Border Liaison Officers)
- 6. Outside agency participation (agency name, how many from that agency, their roles)
- 7. Assessment/description of primary cartel-related threats/trends regarding firearms acquisition schemes and/or cartel-related violence within the respective Gunrunner service areas (provide supporting local statistics/data).

Operation Fallen Hero – Phase 2

Objective:

In an effort to sustain the whole of government pressure on Los Zetas and to increase efforts against the transnational criminal organizations operating in Mexico, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), in partnership with Customs and Border Protection (CBP) will continue to investigate the illegal acquisition, staging, and movement of weapons from the United States to Mexico by attacking individuals and organizations engaged in the organized procurement and illicit investments to obtain weapons, explosives, and related components used to perpetuate cross-border criminal activity.

Operational Plan:

Recognizing each region along the Southwest Border is a unique operating environment with regards to the means and methods used by individuals and organizations to procure weapons, explosives, and related components, ICE and ATF Special Agents in Charge (SACs) will collaborate to design investigative operation(s) for their specific area of operation (AOR) to identify, disrupt, and dismantle individuals and organizations operating in their regions. The respective SACs will have the latitude to collaborate and subsequently implement joint operations under existing operational platforms; such as the Border Enforcement Security Task Forces (BESTs), Gun Runner Impact Teams (GRITs), Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) Strike Forces, by incorporating the individual agencies expertise in conducting controlled deliveries, undercover operations, tracing, etc. These operations can include, but not be limited to:

- Gun Show Operations
- Gang Surge Operations
- Intelligence Driven Outbound Operations with CBP
- Undercover Buy/Bust Surge Operations
- Immigration / 922(g) Operations to Target Foreign Nationals by leveraging

Cognizant that these operations will result in criminal and administrative arrests, ICE and ATF will advise their local United States Attorney's Office and ICE Chief Counsel (for immigration matters) of their operational activities.

Timeframe for Operation:

By April 1, 2011, the ICE and ATF Southwest Border SACs, in conjunction with their CBP counterparts, will submit an operational plan to the ICE, ATF, and CBP headquarters coordinators listed below and initiate their operations no later than May 1, 2011.

Metrics:

ICE and CBP personnel will report all statistics for this operation using project codes 1AY (Operation Fallen Hero) and 4DA (Firearms/Explosives Smuggling) on reports of investigation, case reports, and search, arrest, and seizure (SAS) reports.

ATF personnel will report all statistics using....

As you are all aware, ATF initiated Project Gunrunner in 2006 to address the escalating violence and firearms trafficking associated with criminal enterprises in Mexico and along the Southwest Border of the United States. As part of Project Gunrunner, and in response to continual efforts by criminal elements to unlawfully obtain firearms in the U.S., a renewed focus on higher-level or organizational targets resulted in the development of ATF's Cartel Focused Strategy, which was released in September 2010. It is important to note that this strategy does not replace Project Gunrunner but merely augments it, providing the direction by which ATF resources can be more effectively utilized in identifying targets of higher value, and further disrupting efforts by transnational groups or individuals to obtain firearms for trafficking and other unlawful purposes.

The Cartel Focused Strategy outlines in broad terms the Bureau's strategic objectives in addressing cartel-related firearms trafficking and violent crime suppression. However, we feel that the SAC's and ASAC's with responsibility for Project Gunrunner offices have a greater understanding of the unique cartel-related crime problems within their respective field divisions, and are therefore better equipped to provide an actionable plan towards achieving the objectives of Project Gunrunner. The resilience of the Mexican cartels in adapting their activities to counter those of law enforcement makes a "one size fits all" strategy both impractical and unrealistic. It is essential that our strategies and tactics are capable of evolving just as quickly as those of our criminal adversaries.

Therefore, as part of ATF's efforts to refine Project Gunrunner, capture all relevant statistics and performance-related data, and to more effectively coordinate ATF's ongoing efforts related to

Special agents in charge of field divisions having Project Gunrunner offices are to provide their written strategies with attachments as described above to Project Gunrunner/Southwest Border National Coordinator (b) (7)(C) no later than May 16, 2011.

Re-defining Project Gunrunner

In practical terms, Project Gunrunner is a component of the Bureau's National Firearms Enforcement Program, and a subset of ATF's comprehensive Southwest Border Initiative (SBI). Since ATF receives appropriated funds specifically designated for Project Gunrunner, it is necessary to define and distinguish what constitutes Project Gunrunner investigative and/or regulatory activity separate and distinct from similar activity previously captured under the NFORCE profile code "SWB."

From this point forward, "Project Gunrunner" activity shall be defined as follows:

"Any investigative or regulatory action expended on matters pertaining to the southbound, cross-border trafficking of firearms or explosives, or the criminal use/violent crime related activity resulting from, or related to, the southbound, cross-border trafficking of firearms or explosives, of which the investigative and/or regulatory activity originates in an ATF office *specifically designated and funded* under Project Gunrunner."

All other investigative and regulatory activity regarding Mexico-bound firearms or explosives trafficking originating in ATF offices not designated or funded under Project Gunrunner will be tracked and coded under the "SWB" project code.

Re-defining Project Gunrunner in this way is necessary for improved accountability regarding the implementation and performance of Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy, thereby allowing for program-specific adjustments to the strategy as evolving conditions may dictate. To reiterate, in no way is this intended to discourage non-Project Gunrunner offices from initiating investigations regarding Mexico-bound, or southwest border related weapons trafficking and related violent crime as these cases are instrumental to the overall success of ATF's Southwest Border Initiative.

Coding Project Gunrunner Activity

Proper coding of Project Gunrunner activity in NFORCE, NSPECT, UFMS, and WebTA is essential for accurate tracking and reporting. Therefore, ALL personnel assigned to specifically designated and funded Project Gunrunner offices – including personnel assigned to the Mexico Country Office (MCO) - should *only* expend investigative and/or regulatory activity on firearms/explosives trafficking directly related to Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy. This activity should be properly coded/documented in NFORCE and NSPECT as well as WebTA. The Project Gunrunner/SWB profile code is available in NFORCE and NSPECT, and <u>must</u> be utilized by all special agents and industry operations investigators assigned to Project Gunrunner funded offices. For tracking performance of Project Gunrunner funded offices separately from that of other offices' SWB-related investigative or regulatory activity, the Office of Field Operations will periodically query Project Gunrunner/SWB cases by field office Org Code, in NFORCE or NSPECT. To guarantee data integrity, however, supervisors should ensure that Project Gunrunner cases are properly coded in NFORCE and NSPECT upon the initiation of the case.

Investigative and/or regulatory matters originating in designated and funded Project Gunrunner offices that are not directly related to achieving the objectives of Project Gunrunner and the Cartel Focused Strategy should be referred to a non-Gunrunner group or office. It is understood that there will be events, for example a post-blast incident or IED recovery, which may occur near remote field offices (such as the newly created Sierra Vista office) that will require a local ATF response, but which fall outside the scope of the Project Gunrunner mission. In these cases, the Project Gunrunner field office should handle the initial scene response but will defer the lead role in the investigation, to the appropriate office specified by the SAC or ASAC within the field division.

Sorry for the delay on this. I still have not finalized it, but I thought the meat of the issue was in here. I just wanted to get the broad strokes to you before too much longer.

In essence we have too many leads and not enough manpower. By working collectively with DPS we hope to start placing some of the cases into the State system for prosecution thereby preventing those straws from repeating their crime. The State also has a much broader seizure authority and it will help to get the assets out of the hands of the FTOs. Currently, we have the commitment of the Regional DPS Commander and they have assigned one DPS investigator to work with us part time. I feel that as we show good results the commitment will become multiple investigators on a full time basis. Also, a couple of the local jurisdictions have expressed interest in joining ATF/DPS in this venture. The more the merrier!

Let me know if you want/need something more complete or formalized and I will work on it as time permits. It is very very busy down here. Three ops this week with the hopes of us ripping about 100k from one of the cartels. Good times!

SYNOPSIS:

Agents with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives – McAllen Group III met with officials from the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) to discuss the possibilities to conduct cooperative investigations into Firearms Trafficking occurring in the Southern District of Texas.

BACKGROUND:

Firearms' trafficking in the Southern District of Texas is pervasive and there continues to be a high number of Firearms Trafficking Organizations (FTO) operating in the areas of Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr Counties. Currently, the United States Attorney's Office in McAllen and Brownsville are inundated with a high number of cases involving FTOs and DTOs, as are those law enforcement agencies responsible for their investigation are also struggling for manpower and resources.

OBJECTIVES:

In order to better utilize Federal resources, and provide relief from the numerous simplistic straw purchasing cases, a discussion was initiated with DPS and the Hidalgo County District Attorney's Office. As part of this discussion, ATF explained; the anatomy of a straw purchase, the intelligence which ATF accumulates on a daily basis and the current Texas State Statutes dealing with firearms trafficking. The desired outcome of this project will be the creation of cooperative intelligence and investigative groups who will assist with the prosecution of FTOs will all available Federal, State and local resources.

By working cooperatively with our Federal State and Local partners we will be able to share intelligence in a real time manner which will result in the initiation of cases that ATF would not otherwise have the resource to investigate. For those cases which are simple, by number of defendants or number of firearms, a referral for prosecution will be submitted to the Hidalgo County State's Attorney's Office. If, as these cases are investigated, it becomes apparent that they are a part of a large organized FTO they criminal organization may be referred to ATF to assist in the completion of the complex case investigation, and prepare them for referral to the United States Attorney's Office.

All cases will be worked in a cooperative manner and intelligence derived from both Federal and State investigations will be shared with all members of the Firearms Trafficking Work Group.

The following is an excerpt from Texas State Statute dealing firearms trafficking:

Sec. 46.14. FIREARM SMUGGLING.

- (a) A person commits an offense if the person knowingly engages in the business of transporting or transferring a firearm that the person knows was acquired in violation of the laws of any state or of the United States. For purposes of this subsection, a person is considered to engage in the business of transporting or transferring a firearm if the person engages in that conduct:
 - (1) on more than one occasion; or
 - (2) for profit or any other form of remuneration.
- (b) An offense under this section is a felony of the third degree, unless it is shown on the trial of the offense that the offense was committed with respect to three or more firearms in a single criminal episode, in which event the offense is a felony of the second degree.

An additional benefit to utilizing the Texas State Statute for firearms smuggling is the seizure authority which is granted to State and local law enforcement. The seizure authority is much broader than that given to ATF and will allow for the seizure of money and motor vehicles on a much larger scale, therefore depriving the FTO of the assets they need to operate.

CONCLUSION:

Typically "straw purchasing" cases are relatively easy to prove in the Rio Grande Valley (RGV) area of Texas. These suspects, evident by their selection as a "straw purchaser", have no criminal history and often have never had encounters with law enforcement. Physiologically, these suspects are caught off guard when approached by law enforcement and often admit to all violations surrounding the "straw purchase" of the firearms.

On occasion the "Straw Purchaser" will be able to provide additional information about others involved in the FTO. In these instances, ATF has had success in reconstructing the organizational structure of the FTO and has been able to discover those involved with straw purchasing, recruiting, transporters, bulk cash smuggling, and other links to DTOs and Mexican Drug Cartels.

In instances where the "straw purchaser" has limited to no knowledge of the structure of the FTO the case can be prosecuted at the State level.

This will accomplish several things:

- 1. Reduce the amount of intelligence which ATF would need to review before determining the merit for Federal prosecution.
- 2. Reduce the amount of simplistic straw purchasing cases in Federal Court.
- 3. Increase the number of complex investigations managed by ATF.
- 4. Reduce the number of suspects that are not able to be investigated.
- 5. Place more "straw purchasers" into the judicial system, therefore prohibiting them from repeating their crimes.
- 6. There will be an integration of Federal, State and local law enforcement partners working in concert to stop firearms trafficking. (The State and local partners will start to have a vested interested in the successful investigation and prosecution of firearms trafficking. Thus, leading to additional manpower available to ATF to investigate firearms trafficking.)




The attached affidavit is being prepared in cooperation with the United States Attorney's Office, who will vet this version through the DOJ Office of Enforcement Operations (OEO). Once the affidavit has been approved by Justice they will seek the ATF Agency approval memorandum to complete the approval process.

BACKGROUND AND SCOPE OF INVESTIGATION

The states of Texas, California, Arizona and New Mexico supply 75% of all firearms illegally trafficked into the Republic of Mexico. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) has identified the Phoenix, Arizona area as being one of the top five metropolitan areas where firearms and ammunition are obtained for this purpose. The drug violence in Mexico has escalated with the expansion of the cartels' arsenals.

In October 2009, ATF Phoenix Field Division (PFD) Phoenix Group VII Strike Force initiated investigations involving approximately five possible straw purchasers of firearms pursuant to ATF's Southwest Border/Operation Gunrunner Initiative. ATF Special Agents (Agents) received information (b) (7)(C)

(b) (7)(C) is believed to be in Agua Prieta, Mexico, and has been intercepted orchestrating different amounts of US currency being illegally brought into the US for the purpose of purchasing firearms via the Phoenix DEA/GPD FEO targets. Those targets were intercepted making arrangements with telephone numbers utilized by (b) (7)(C) to obtain the firearms for (b) (7)(C). On December 21, 2009, an intercepted telephone call between (b) (7)(C) and an FEO target revealed that firearms recently purchased in Phoenix were going to be driven to El Paso, TX and trafficked into Mexico.


ATF agents believe that a Phoenix-based firearm trafficking group is actively purchasing firearms through straw purchasers using bulk narcotics proceeds. The firearms are then being trafficked into Mexico using non-factory compartments in various vehicles through various Ports of Entry (POE's) in Arizona and Texas.

Since the ATF case was initiated, ATF agents have identified approximately seventeen straw purchasers who have purchased a large amount of AK-47 style rifles and pistols from various FFL's in the Phoenix Metropolitan area and Prescott, AZ, since September 2009. There have been four firearms seizures in Arizona that were purchased by the identified straw purchasers including the above mentioned Douglas, AZ seizure. There have been two firearms seizures in El Paso, Texas, on January 13, 2010, involving firearms purchased by (b) (7)(C)

There have been five firearms seizures in Mexico involving firearms purchased by identified straw purchasers including the above mentioned Naco Seizure; a November 25, 2009, Agua Prieta, Sonora, seizure; a December 9, 2009, Mexicali, Baja California,

- The map of firearm recoveries includes only recovered firearms purchased by a specified targets reference the Fast & Furious investigation and entered into the Suspect Gun Program database. Of the 372 US seized firearms 37 of them (Tohono O'Odom Indian Reservation recovery) were ripped. The total number of firearms recovered in the US 372. The total number of firearms recovered in Mexico 195.
- · In addition to the firearms represented on the map 230 were recovered on street stops (rip).
- We brought in numerous agents from out-of-town (and out-of-state) to assist in surveillance during this case prior the arrival of the GRIT detail, approximately March 14, 2010 May 3, 2010. These agents worked exclusive surveillance for 7 weeks, 7 days a week, totaling over 3,920 "man hours" of surveillance. This does not include the surveillance worked by Group VII prior to their arrival or surveillance worked after their departure when the GRIT detail was in town. During these literally thousands of hours of surveillance, never in one instance did we "walk" guns to Mexico. These 7 weeks of surveillance cost the ATF over \$100,000.00 in travel funds (which we secured in advance through OCDETF funding.)
- We made numerous efforts to minimize potential future actions by the end user of these firearms

by the end user.

• We spent (unknown but conservatively in excess of \$100,000.00) in SLOT to reimburse the Phoenix

Police Department for their assistance in this investigation. We utilized the Phoenix Police Department Air Wing on numerous occasions to aid us in conducting aerial surveillance. They never conducted surveillance of any person, vehicle or guns to Mexico. Frankly they never had the need to leave Maricopa County.

Arrest & Search Warrants for (b)(7)(C) Firearms Trafficking Group (SWB)

This serves to summarize recent events involving the straw purchasing and suspected smuggling .223 & $7.62 \times 39 \, \mathrm{mm}$ styled assault rifles to Mexico from the Fort Worth, TX Tarrant Country area.

Toward the end of October, 2010, Agents with the Fort Worth Field Office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) received information from an FF1 that a group of individuals were suspiciously purchasing .223 & 7.62x39mm callber assault styled rifles. The individuals primarily used cash currency, particularly \$20.00 denominations, for the purchased firearms.

This group was identified through information revealed by ATF 4473's as the following individuals: (b)(7)(C)
(b)(7)(C)

The group continued purchasing 1 to 2 firearms each on different dates from this FFL. By the end of January 2011, through the review of FFL'S extensive ATF 4473's, Agents learned that 38 firearms had been purchased by individuals in this group. During this time, Agents attempted to infiltrate the group via undercover operations with negative results.

During the course of this investigation, Agents utilized investigative techniques such as (b) (7)(E)

Intelligence was steadily gathered through the middle of February 2011, whereupon, firearms purchasing activity by the group ceased. (b) (7)(C)

Prior to March 1, 2011, there was no intelligence indicating that any of the purchased firearms had been recovered domestically or internationally. In the initial stages of the investigation, all purchased firearms were entered in the ATF Suspect Gun database as well as the suspects being flagged by FBI NICs for future firearms purchases. These databases were continually monitored throughout the course of the investigation.

On March 17, 2011 Agents with ATF received information that on or about March 2, 2011, Mexican Naval Infantry personnel were involved in a confrontation against an unidentified armed group leaving eight (8) gunmen, none of which were law enforcement personnel, dead in Valle Hermoso, Tamaulipas, MX. Authorities seized 8 AK-47 type rifles, 4 AR-15 type rifles, 1 grenade launcher, 55 magazines, 2,073 rounds of assorted ammunition, and several uniforms. One of the recovered rifles was traced back (b)(3)(P.L.111-117),(b)(7)(C)

Agents have remained in constant contact with ATF Mexico

(b) (3) (P.L. 111-117), (b) (7)(C) Agents have remained in constant contact with ATF Mexico Attachés in order to gather additional intelligence on the weapon recovered and any other intelligence that could be used to strengthen our ongoing investigation.

Based upon the recovery of the aforementioned firearm, criminal complaints were immediately requested from the Northern District of Texas United States Attorney's Office, Fort Worth, Texas, charging (b) (7)(C) with Conspiracy to Engage in the Business of Dealing in Firearms without a License in violation of 18 USC 922(a)(1)(A). On March 21, 2011, 3 Federal search warrants and 4 Federal arrest warrants were obtained.

On March 23, 2011, the aformentioned warrants were executed as a result of the culmination of the investigation perfected by ATF, ICE, and the Fort Worth Police Department. The joint Federal and State operation resulted in the arrest of (b)(7)(C) n charges of 18 USC 922(a)(1)(A).

Cffice ATF and ICE Agents as the two re-entered the United States from Mexico without incident. Subjects (b) (7)(C) were arrested by Fort Worth, TX ATF 1958 ICE Agents with assistance from the Fort Worth Police Department without incident.

During the execution of the three (3) Federal search warrants, the following items were found in the support of the future prosecution of this case:

- . \$800.00 US Currency.
- . One (1) Firearm.
- . Seven (7) new hard firearms cases.
- . Numerous rounds of 9mm & .38 caliber ammunition.
- . Approximately twenty seven (27) 7.82x39mm \bar{a} .223 caliber high capacity magazines.
- . Numerous receipts of firearms purchases from various FFL'S.
- . One (1) Dewalt hand grinder with metal cutting blade for use in obliteration of serial numbers.

Suspects (b) (7)(C) were transported to ATF Fort Worth Field Office for further questioning. Both(b) (7)(C) admitted to the illegal purchasing and trafficking of firearms to Mexico. Upon completion of the questioning, the arrested persons were transported to the Tarrant County Jail in Fort Worth, TX. The subjects were transferred to the custody of the United States Marshals Service for their initial appearance on 03/24/2011.

Suspects (b) (7)(C) rere subsequently questioned by ATF and ICE Agents from McAllen, TX. Both (b) (7)(C) admitted to the illegal trafficking of firearms. Upon completion of the questioning, the arrested persons were transported to the Cameron County Jail in Brownsville, TX. The subjects were transferred to the custody of the United States Marshals Service for their initial appearance on 03/24/2011.

On 03/25/2011, at approximately 12:30 PM, a multi-agency task force conducted a buy/bust operation near Las Cruces New Mexico as the culmination of the firearms trafficking side of Operation line Breaker, an OCDETF investigation led by the FBI's Cross Border Violence Squad.

Today's operation involved two ATE U/C Agents meeting with (b) (7)(C) to deliver a truck loaded with 20 fully automatic AK-47 rifles, 10 .308 caliber rifles, and 10 Berretta 9mm pistols (All fully functioning ATE Prop Firearms). This truck was to be taken to a stash house in El Paso and the firearms later trafficked into Mexico. (b) (7)(C) had already paid \$73,000.00 (US) in cash for these firearms.

1. What is the total number of weapons ATF permitted be purchased by suspected straw buyers during operation Fast and Furious between October 2009 and February 2011? A March 2010 case file notations identifies 1,500. We have an interview that the number reached more than 2,400 by last October and are hearing the final number was around 3,000. Can you get us an exact number?

Comment: We need to correct this question if he says "ATF permitted" purchases. See background information below. The identified straw purchasers were non-prohibited persons who went to gun stores and completed the federally required forms, went through NICS checks, ctc. Some of these people had purchased a number of guns before we ever identified them, much less suspect them as a straw purchaser/trafficker, and even longer before we had sufficient evidence to more than simply contact them for an interview. As the investigation progressed, due to the number of suspects, the number of other similar investigations, and our limited resources, these persons were able to make purchases at times/locations that we could not get to real time to initiate surveillances and/or stops.

The opening report states that the agents began their case on or about November 10 – there were 233 guns purchases by subsequently identified suspects prior to November 10, 2009 (11.6% of the total 1,998 attributed to this gang). Fifteen (15) additional guns were purchased on November 10, 2009.

Background: ATF has an open criminal investigation involving a large, illegal firearms trafficking organization associated with Mexican based drug traffickers. As part of the investigative process, ATF identified numerous purchasers and other persons potentially and/or suspected of being engaged in the criminal activity. During the course of the investigation, non-prohibited individuals being investigated as suspected straw purchasers continued to periodically purchase firearms from federally licensed firearms dealers. Some of these purchases became known to ATF through reported multiple sales, information from licensed dealers, information from cooperating individuals, surveillances conducted by ATF, interdictions and/or gun traces by other US law enforcement agencies, and in some cases, gun recoveries and/or traces in Mexico.

ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation to Mexico. All of these purchases involve non-prohibited persons following the federal firearms procedures. The fact that such persons may make numerous purchases, including purchases of firearms identifiable as "weapons of choice" in Mexico or purchases involving multiple firearms, does not in itself establish a federal violation. Even if the individuals subsequently sold these firearms to another person, or if some of the firearms were recovered in crimes in the US or Mexico, additional evidence would be required to establish a violation. ATF used every available tool and every effort was made to interdict firearms in this case going south to Mexico. The number of seizures made by ATF and other US law enforcement officials reflect that.

ATF in Phoenix, prior to, during and after the GRIT operation that initiated in May 2010, conducted extensive surveillance on source FFL locations, suspect purchasers and other

trafficking suspects. ATF detailed numerous agents from out-of-town and out-of-state to assist in surveillances during this case prior to the arrival of the GRIT participants, from approximately March 14 to May 3, 2010. These detailed agents worked exclusive surveillance for 7 weeks, 7 days a week, for nearly 4,000 hours of surveillance. In addition, the Phoenix Group VII personnel also conducted numerous surveillance operations prior to the arrival and after the departure of these detailees, including during the GRIT operations. ATF Phoenix developed and maintained a detailed surveillance assignment list. In addition to physical, mobile surveillance, ATF utilized a variety of electronic surveillance methods, including but not limited to pole cameras and Title III interceptions. Also, the Phoenix Police Department Air Wing was utilized on numerous occasions to conduct aerial surveillance. During all of these surveillance operations, at no time did ATF knowingly conduct surveillance of any person or vehicles in which firearms "walked" into Mexico. Also, referrals were made to other US law enforcement agencies operating along the border and in Mexico.

As should be noted, even with the detailees and the additional manpower derived from the GRIT operation, ATF Phoenix could not surveil every "suspected" residence, purchaser and dealer premises on a non-stop, 24/7 basis. This was not, and is not today, the only firearms trafficking case we are working in the Phoenix area. We utilized personnel and other tools as much as possible, but when a "suspected straw purchaser" goes into their home with firearms and nothing happens for days, we must make judgments as to how to best proceed with the investigation. In this case, we were dealing with in excess of 40 "suspected straw" purchasers and other suspects. This ATF office has at least that many (40 or so) active cases. In addition, even if we were to approach a suspected straw purchaser, we have no ability to force the person to tell us where or to whom the guns may be going. If such interviews are conducted and lead to legally acceptable responses, we must continue our investigative efforts, despite having alerted the suspect to our efforts.

2. How many of the weapons came back after their straw purchase in e-traces from Mexico? How many were seized by U.S. authorities on this side of the border? (We're hearing the latter number is 190.)

A total of 372 firearms (including 37 recovered in the Tohono O'Odom Indian Reservation) entered into the suspect gun database were recovered/seized in the US.

A total of 195 firearms were recovered in Mexico.

In addition, through ATF surveillances and enforcement operations, another 230 firearms were recovered prior to being entered into the database.

Therefore, 602 firearms were recovered/interdicted in the US, and 195 were recovered in Mexico, for a total of 797 firearms recovered.

3. Were Mexican authorities apprised of the Fast and Furious operation? Who? Did they express concerns?

A representative of the PGR CENAPI (Intelligence) has been working within our Phoenix office for over 2 years. This Mexican official was briefed on the Fast & Furious investigation at its beginning and periodically throughout its course, along with numerous other US/Mexico firearms trafficking investigations, by the ATF managers, including SAC Newell. We all share concerns regarding trafficking of firearms from the US to Mexico.

- The map of firearm recoveries includes only recovered firearms purchased by a specified targets reference the Fast & Furious investigation and entered into the Suspect Gun Program database. Of the 372 US seized firearms 37 of them (Tohono O'Odom Indian Reservation recovery) were ripped. The total number of firearms recovered in the US 372. The total number of firearms recovered in Mexico 195.
- · In addition to the firearms represented on the map 230 were recovered on street stops (rip).
- We brought in numerous agents from out-of-town (and out-of-state) to assist in surveillance during this case prior the arrival of the GRIT detail, approximately March 14, 2010 May 3, 2010. These agents worked exclusive surveillance for 7 weeks, 7 days a week, totaling over 3,920 "man hours" of surveillance. This does not include the surveillance worked by Group VII prior to their arrival or surveillance worked after their departure when the GRIT detail was in town. During these literally thousands of hours of surveillance, never in one instance did we "walk" guns to Mexico. These 7 weeks of surveillance cost the ATF over \$100,000.00 in travel funds (which we secured in advance through OCDETF funding.)
- We made numerous efforts to minimize potential future actions by the end user of these firearms by altering the internal firing components at the FFL level so as to make the firearm ultimately inoperable by the end user.
- We spent (unknown but conservatively in excess of \$100,000.00) in SLOT to reimburse the Phoenix

Police Department for their assistance in this investigation. We utilized the Phoenix Police Department Air Wing on numerous occasions to aid us in conducting aerial surveillance. They never conducted surveillance of any person, vehicle or guns to Mexico. Frankly they never had the need to leave Maricopa County.

I know this dates back almost 6 years but as I recall this case involved our letting guns go into Mexico or our providing info to Mexico so the guns could be recovered there – I may be mixing things up due to the passage of time and my advanced age. This is the only reference to the case I can find.

Douglas, Arizona November 2005: In just the past few weeks ATF has been involved in the arrest of seven individuals suspected of trafficking firearms from Arizona into Mexico, where they were sold for twice their market value here in the United States. ATF has documented that at least 84 firearms, including AK-47 rifles were purchased and smuggled into Mexico. The investigation began when Mexican law enforcement officials arrested two Mexican citizens for firearms trafficking in the State of Senora, which is contiguous with Douglas, Arizona. This case is demonstrative of the cooperative effort between ATF and Mexican law enforcement authorities.

Mexican Trace Data (March 15, 2011)

- Q. In October 2010 the Washington Post reported "the Mexican government often says that 90 percent of the weapons it confiscates come from the United States. In 2009 testimony before Congress, the ATF director Kenneth Melson gave that same figure. Can you account for the drastic decline?
- A. When initially reported, the percentages (90 percent) were accurate. Though now the percentages may be lower, perhaps due to a lack of critical firearms indicators on the trace requests, the sheer number US-sourced guns in Mexico is a problem.
- Q. According to the Center for Public Integrity during an ATF operation called "Fast and Furious" in Arizona ATF agents may have let as in excess of 2000 firearms "walk" across the border into Mexico, does the 2010 trace data take those firearms into account?
- A. Once recovered in Mexico and submitted to ATF, the ATF National Tracing Center, would have been asked to run a trace on all the firearms once the agents had a list or got a list from the FFL's records of all associated with the straw purchaser/firearms trafficker.

Fast and Furious is still an ongoing prosecution so I cannot talk specifically. However, I do know that of the guns associated with it, 797 of the guns were eventually recovered and traced 160 of those were recovered in Mexico and are included in the 2010 totals. It is important to note, the reporting requirement ATF proposed is proactive and can point to traffickers before a gun is used in a crime.

Q. How do you justify 160 guns involved in an ATF investigation crossing the border into Mexico?

- A. If one gun gets away on our watch and ends up in the hands of someone who harms an innocent person it is too many. But the sheer number of firearms recovered in Mexico and traced back to a United States source is evidence there is a problem and we are doing everything we can within the law to stop firearms trafficking across the border.
- Q. In September 2010 a report by Mayors Against Illegal Guns titled *Issue Brief: The Movement of Illegal Guns Across the U.S.-Mexico Border* stated that the time-to-crime statistic for U.S. guns recovered in Mexico, had decreased dramatically to less than less than 3 years in 2009. Is this still the issue for U.S. gun recovered in Mexico?
- A. ATF cannot comment on the Mayors Against Illegal Guns report. However, in 2010 the average time-to-crime for U.S. guns recovered in Mexico was 11.3 years. Of the guns with a

time-to-crime of three years or less, the vast majority are the highly sought 7.62 and .223 caliber firearms, the guns of choice by Mexico's drug trafficking organizations.

- Q. In November 2010 an OIG review of ATF's Project Gunrunner cited a June 2009 Government Accountability Office report which estimated that trace data was submitted to ATF on less than a quarter of the guns seized in Mexico. In addition, the report said most trace requests that are submitted to ATF from Mexico are considered "unsuccessful" because of missing or improperly entered gun data. Has this problem been corrected so Mexico can get more accurate trace results?
- A. ATF has provided Mexican law enforcement with training in firearms identification and the use of a Spanish language version of eTrace. Overtime, the Mexican officials began to see the importance of tracing as an investigative tool.

Q. What about the disk ATF received from Mexico with serial numbers of firearms they needed traced?

A. In September 2009, the government of Mexico provided ATF with electronic files containing firearms identifiers and recovery data. The electronic files contain information that initiated over 43,000 firearm traces, excluding duplicates, with most having recovery years ranging from calendar year 2007 to 2009. Once each trace was initiated, it was organized by year of recovery. With the influx of trace data from these electronic files, the number of firearms listed as recovered in 2009 and traced has increased from earlier releases of information.

Q. What is involved in a firearms trace?

A. When a firearm is recovered at a crime scene, law enforcement officers contact the National Tracing Center with information about the firearm (make, model, caliber, serial number, and importer (if necessary). The National Tracing Center then contacts the manufacturer, wholesaler and retailer to ascertain the purchaser. At minimum, NTC can determine whether or not the firearm is sourced from the United States, meaning manufactured or imported here legally for sale.

Q. What are the firearms of choice by drug trafficking organizations in Mexico?

A. Based on the trace data of firearms recovered at crime scenes in Mexico we see more high caliber, semi-automatic firearms like the .223 and 7.62 caliber used and recovered in crimes in Mexico.

- Q. Director Melson has been quoted in the past saying ATF would not release Mexican trace stats anymore because people on both sides of the gun rights issue use the data for their own gain. Why did ATF have a change of heart?
- A. ATF is not reporting just the percentages but the actual number of firearms recovered, traced and sourced from the United States. By reporting the actual numbers, a true picture

develops of the number of U.S. sourced crime guns are being recovered in Mexico – thus showing the public the gravity of the problem.

Q. What does ATF mean by the phrase "Time-to-Crime?"

A. Time-to-Crime refers to the length of time from the initial purchase date of the firearm to the date the firearm is recovered at a crime scene. It can be a valuable piece of information for investigators, especially when looking at firearms trafficking schemes.

O. Which U.S. state is has the largest number of firearms recovered in Mexico?

A. Since 2007 trace data has shown Texas as the number one source state for firearms recovered in Mexico, followed by Arizona.

Q. Why are the number of guns traced back to the states such a small number?

A. Traces included in the Mexican trace data are those which NTC is able to identify a purchaser and the dealer where the firearm was purchased. If can't trace the firearm back to initial purchaser then we can't determine the state of origin.

Q. What is a successful trace?

A. A successful trace is one in which the firearm can be traced back to its manufacturer or importer in the U.S.

Q. What factors could contribute to an unsuccessful trace result with a firearm recovered in Mexico?

A. Some reasons for traces not identifying an individual purchaser include incomplete data on trace request, the firearms was too old to trace, the firearm serial number was invalid, incomplete out-of-business records and altered or obliterated serial numbers.

Q. Why have the statistics dropped so dramatically between 2008 and 2010?

A. While the overall number of traces has dropped between 2008 and 2010, there were 4506 rifles recovered in Mexico that ATF was able to trace back to a U.S. source. The sheer number of traces and the continued violence cannot be ignored.

Q. Are US efforts working?

A. U.S. efforts along the Southwest Border are working but we believe more can be done to stop the flow of firearms from the U.S. into Mexico. Multiple sales reporting of long guns along the Southwest Border would provide ATF with another law enforcement tool to stop the violence along the Mexico-U.S. border.

Q. Why do you need multiple sales reporting for long guns if the numbers are dropping? Do 549 .223s and 7.62s justify multiple sales reporting?

A. The Mexican trace data shows that the firearms of choice for Mexican drug trafficking organizations are long guns.

Q. Did ATF have reason to believe that suspects under investigation were trafficking guns to Mexico?

A. The number one concern for ATF is interdicting guns that are unlawfully transferred to persons in the U.S. and in Mexico who will then commit crimes with those guns. The purpose of any trafficking investigation is to locate those guns, interdict those guns and bring those responsible for their unlawful purchase, transfer, finance and use to justice.


Q. Did ATF knowingly allow guns to travel from the United States to Mexico because investigators believed suspects would traffic guns there?

A. ATF did not engage in an effort to allow guns to travel from the U.S. to Mexico. In short, the law does not permit agents to take guns away from anyone who buys 10 AKs at a time solely because they bought multiple guns. In these investigations, there may come a point over the course of an investigation where ATF believes, though it is well short of proof beyond a reasonable doubt require in criminal cases, that they can prove that a particular person only buys guns for the purpose of illegal trafficking. However, seizure of the guns at that point may not be legal because purchasing multiple long guns in Arizona is lawful, transferring them to another is lawful and even sale or barter of the guns to another is lawful unless the Unites States can prove by clear and convincing evidence that the firearm is intended to be used to commit a crime.

Q. Did ATF knowingly allow guns to travel from the United States to Mexico because investigators watched suspects trafficking guns there?

A. ATF did not knowingly allow guns to travel from the U.S. to Mexico. The number one concern for ATF is interdicting guns that are unlawfully transferred to persons in the U.S. and in Mexico who will then commit crimes with those guns. The purpose of any trafficking investigation is to locate those guns, interdict those guns and bring those responsible for their unlawful purchase, transfer, finance and use to justice.



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



According to a news release, the agents discovered footprints and found a large duffel bag hidden in the

brush.

Inside the bag agents found eight AK-47 assault rifles, two AR-15 assault rifles, two grenades, nearly 350 rounds of ammunition of varying calibers, several 30-round magazines and a 40 mm grenade launcher.

The McAllen Police Department's Bomb Squad was called to detonate the grenades.

"The seizure of these weapons near the river indicates that weapons smugglers are having a hard time getting their contraband into Mexico via the normal points of entry," a border patrol spokesman said. "Therefore, they are taking more desperate measures and trying to get them across the river through various other methods."

The weapons and ammunition were turned over to the ATF.

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ATTORNEY WORK PRODUCT PRIVILEGED DOCUMENT ATTORNEY-CUENT PRIVILEGED COMMUNICATION

This is to reiterate the Attorney General's recent statement with respect to firearms trafficking. It is the position of the Department of Justice that Federal law enforcement agencies "should not design or conduct undercover operations which include guns crossing the border. If we have any knowledge that guns are about to cross the border, we must take immediate action to stop the firearms from crossing the border, even if that prematurely terminates or otherwise jeopardizes an investigation."

As a reminder, in September 2010, ATF disseminated to all field divisions a policy document entitled "Project Gunrunner – A Cartel Focused Strategy." As noted therein, there are practical considerations that may require bringing investigations to a conclusion or dictate a change in investigative tactics prior to the identification of persons directly affiliated with Drug Trafficking Organizations. Examples include high volume trafficking investigations in which numerous diverted firearms identifiable with one or more purchasers are being used in violent crimes and recovered by law enforcement, and high volume trafficking investigations in which over an extended period ATF cannot reasonably determine where or to whom such firearms are being trafficked. You are reminded that SACs must closely monitor and approve such investigations, assessing the risks associated with prolonged investigation with limited or delayed interdiction. In some instances, the best answer may be to provide actionable intelligence to other law enforcement agencies and/or the Government of Mexico.

Field divisions should continue to coordinate with the U.S. Attorney's Offices for the districts in which they conduct operations to ensure a mutual understanding of the criteria for both prosecutions and seizures.



After looking into the shows we found that there are numerous shows in the SWB region just about every weekend. As you and I discussed the other day, it is better for the SWB SAC's to discuss options at the field level and to not have our respective HQ's try and dictate operations related to potentially working the shows. Some shows can be more problematic than others and have greater chance of encountering illegal weapons purchases. I do not have the needed knowledge to pick which shows would be best and therefore would recommend we rely on the(4) ATF SAC"S in Houston, Dallas, Phoenix and LA to plan any operations. I would propose that we recognize this operational element from the HQ level and then ask the respective Field Supervisors to work together to plan for any operations as they see fit. That would include coordinating with CBP so they are aware of the shows and any operations that may be planned in the short time. ATF routinely works the shows as part of our overall gun trafficking efforts and I do not want to get in the middle of any plans they have from here in HQ. Lets agree to alert our respective SAC's to discuss and plan as they see fit and we recognize it as one of the ongoing efforts as an inter-agency in dealing with the cartels.







Interesting article – A take away is that with all the efforts, personnel and equipment at the disposal of DHS/CBP along the SWB, they report seizing 107 outbound firearms in FY2009 and 279 in FY2010. We personally seized 230 in F&F, there were another 372 in US LE seizures with varying involvement of ATF, and 195 seized in Mexico related to F&F. As stated below, ATF seized nearly 2,633 in 2009 in the SWB states. And our numbers are based on seizures in which we do not have lawful authority to search every vehicle that we see.

U.S. Push Not Halting Guns to Mexico

ROWNSVILLE, Texas -- Federal agents are barely able to slow the river of American guns flowing into Mexico. In two years, a new effort to increase inspections of travelers crossing the border has netted just 386 guns -- an almost infinitesimal amount given that an estimated 2,000 slip across each day.

The problem came into sharp focus again last month when a U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agent was killed on a northern Mexican highway with a gun that was purchased in a town outside Fort Worth, Texas. Stopping the flow of American guns, bullets and cash has long bedeviled authorities on both sides of the border. At a White House news conference in March 2009, Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano joined President Barack Obama in announcing plans to better help Mexico cope with a brutal drug war that has now killed more than 34,000 people since 2006.

"You've got to interdict the arms. You've got to stop them from going into Mexico," Napolitano said at the time. Since then, Customs and Border Protection officers -- who usually spend their days checking people and cars coming into the U.S. -- have teamed up with Border Patrol agents and, sometimes, sheriff's deputies in border communities to scrutinize travelers leaving American soil.

They have made little progress.

In fiscal year 2009, Customs and Border Protection agents at all border crossings separating the 2,000-mile border, from Brownsville on Texas' Gulf Coast to San Diego, seized 107 guns.

The next fiscal year, ending Sept. 30, they seized 279. Those are the most-recent, border-wide figures available. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives reported seizing 2,633 guns in 2009 at its offices in the four southwestern border states, the most recent figures available, but those were captured before making it into border traffic -- and even if they had, they would have amounted to a little more than a day's worth that get through.

A November 2008 study by The Brookings Institution, a Washington-based think tank, stated that 2,000 American guns are smuggled into Mexico each day. Compiled by a commission including ex-Mexican President Ernesto Zedillo and Thomas Pickering, a former U.S. ambassador to Russia and a senior State Department official during the administration of President Bill Clinton, the report was the last comprehensive estimate on the subject, though it did not include information on how that figure was reached.

Efforts to halt ammunition have been more successful. Outbound border inspections seized 93,141 rounds in the last fiscal year, more than four times the amount seized during the previous year.

Seizures of cash headed into Mexico fell from more than \$37 million in fiscal year 2009 to about \$27.4 million last year.

The ATF is now facing criticism after both CBS News and the non-profit Center for Public Integrity reported that federal agents investigating gun-running by drug cartels allowed hundreds of guns purchased in the U.S. to go into Mexico.

The agency and prosecutors let the guns cross the border as they were building cases against traffickers, the

center reported.

The ATF's work on the border highlights the tension between short-term operations aimed at arresting low-level straw buyers -- legal U.S. residents with clean records who buy weapons -- and long-term ones designed to identify who is directing the gun buys.

From September 2009 to July 31 of last year alone, the Mexican <u>government</u> seized more than 32,000 illegal weapons, even though purchasing guns in Mexico requires permission from the country's defense department, and even then buyers are limited to pistols of .38-caliber or less.

Not all those guns came from the United States -- Mexican authorities have investigated reports that some were supplied by arms dealers in <u>Israel</u> and Belgium.

Many guns used to kill in Mexico never have their origins traced. Still, ATF has long estimated that of the weapons discovered at Mexican crime scenes which authorities do choose to trace, nearly 90 percent are eventually found to have been purchased in the U.S.

That was the case with the handgun found at the scene of the Feb. 15 drug cartel ambush that killed ICE Special Agent Jaime Zapata on a highway in Mexico's San Luis Potosi state. His partner was shot twice in the leg. Authorities say the 7.62 mm pistol was purchased in Joshua, Texas. Three Dallas-area men -- one accused of buying the gun, his brother and their neighbor -- are facing federal weapons charges, although none related to Zapata's death. Investigators believe the trio on another occasion tried to sell dozens of weapons to the violent Zetas drug cartel, which recently saw one of its alleged bosses arrested in connection with Zapata's death. "When a U.S. agent is killed by an illegally obtained U.S. gun, it really underscores the irony of our current policy," said David Shirk, director of the University of San Diego's Trans-Border Institute.

"We're not trying hard enough to stop the bad guys from using our weapons against us," he said.

Just how much money and manpower has been spent to detect so few southbound guns, bullets and bundles of

However, Customs and Border Protection Commissioner Alan Bersin promised last April that at least \$72.6 million would be allocated in fiscal year 2010 to hire 115 additional Customs officers and 144 new Border Patrol agents

to bolster outbound operations.

The money would also have gone to improving southbound license plate-reading equipment and inspection technology.

Agency spokeswoman Kelly Ivahnenko said there were no figures on whether those staffing additions had been made, however, due in part to normal employment turnover. She said seizure numbers give only part of the picture and that stepped-up inspections have forced "smugglers to change their tactics, sometimes exposing them to other law enforcement agencies."

Complicating agents' hunt at the border is that most weapons and bullets are smuggled using "hormiga" or "ant" techniques, in which items are carried across in smaller amounts. Larger caches, stashed in 18-wheelers, are easier to find with X-ray equipment or sniffer dogs.

A recent visit to the Gateway Bridge border crossing in palm tree-lined Brownsville, the nation's top spot for

smuggling ammunition into Mexico, showed the daunting task facing agents: Thousands of cars and trucks and countless places to stash items.

Officers rummaged through bags of groceries and boxes of auto parts, felt around children's seats and behind glove compartments, and poked flashlights into air conditioning vents, engine blocks and wheel-wells.

A fiber-optic scope let them peer inside gas tanks, and they checked that door handles had not been tampered with.

U.S. authorities screen certain types of Mexico-bound vehicles more than others, but won't say which ones. Two teenagers in matching Ferrari leather jackets had their white pickup poked and prodded for nearly 10 minutes to no avail, while a woman in a Lexus sedan breezed through without looking up from texting.

At one point, a black GMC pickup on its way to Mexico attracted the attention of a federal agent.

A locked silver metal box the size of a small microwave was tucked discreetly between a cooler and a roller-suitcase in the bed. It looked like a gun case, but when opened, there were no weapons or bullets to be found. Inside? Just an accordion.

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

There are two different aspects to the contractor question.

- The statement in the letter is correct: we do not allow contractors, consultants, etc. to keep, store, or retain ATF documents outside of the ATF network or premises (which is what I believe the letter intended to state; we should probably clarify). This is for security purposes, obviously, but it also means that we do not need to reach outside of the ATF network and premises for discovery purposes. (We can declare our search for responsive documents complete without querying contractors and consultants separately.)
- 2. Your question about access to the responsive documents is different. HP has been intimately involved in the discovery process and, as systems administrators, definitively have access to the responsive documents within the ATF network. Specifically, they helped establish the file structure for the collected documentation, they operate the eVault archiving capability, and they stood up the search software for the collected documents. In addition, outside of the specific repository of responsive documents we've created, you should assume that various contractors would have likely had access to (and potentially created) responsive documents: ballistic intelligence analysts. NTC contractors, asset forfeiture support contractors, among others. However, any/all access to responsive documents should have occurred only within the ATF network and premises, and therefore a search of our network and premises should have revealed any such documentation. You are also correct that in order to process the responsive documents for production to Congress, we will need to use the services of a support contractor.

All ATF activities are coordinated thought the ATF office in Mexico City....

DANGER PAY FOR MEXICO

Question. Violence in Mexico, particularly towards law enforcement personnel, has steadily intensified over the past several years. The very real and present danger faced by U.S. personnel working in Mexico is evident in light of the recent deaths of U.S. consulate employees and ICE agent in Mexico. While the DEA and FBI receive danger pay for their personnel in Mexico due to prior authorizations passed in 1990 and 2002, the Marshals Service and ATF do not have this same authorization language. USMS and ATF personnel face the same risks as their DEA and FBI counterparts in Mexico and should be equally compensated.

Why does the President's budget not provide for danger pay increases to U.S. Marshals Service and ATF law enforcement personnel working in Mexico?

1. Why does the President's budget not provide for danger pay increases to U.S. Marshals and ATF personnel working in Mexico?

The Drug Enforcement Administration is authorized to receive danger pay in Mexico pursuant to Section 151 of the Foreign Relations Authorization Act, Fiscal Years 1990 and 1991 (P.L. 101-246). Absent specific legislation to support danger pay for ATF and Marshals Service personnel assigned to Mexico, the agencies must utilize the danger pay rates as authorized by the U.S. Department of State. Presently, the U.S. Department of State only authorizes danger pay for Ciudad Juarez (20%), Monterrey (20%), and Tijuana (15%). Other cities where ATF and the Marshals Service have a presence in Mexico, such as Mexico City and Guadalajara, are not authorized for danger pay. Although ATF and Marshals Service criminal investigators are stationed in Mexico City, they very often must travel throughout Mexico for criminal investigations and to further investigate and assist the Government of Mexico in the location and apprehension of dangerous fugitives. The present missions of the ATF and Marshals Service in Mexico require criminal investigators to experience the same dangerous environments and these law enforcement personnel deserve the same danger pay that our Department of Justice partners currently receive.

the fact the FBI and DEA already provide danger pay for their employees in Mexico, that the Marshals Service and ATF should receive the same sort of compensation. When can we expect to see a proposed legislative to remedy this issue from the Department?

2. Given the rise in violence due to the Mexican drug wars, targeted attacks against U.S. law enforcement, and the fact FBI and DEA have danger pay in Mexico, shouldn't the Marshals and ATF should receive the same sort of compensation?

The Marshals Service has authority to conduct investigations for DEA fugitives referred for apprehension and both agencies often work side by side in Mexico and along the Southwest Border to develop critical information related to high value targets. As such, it would be inconsistent to continue to deny danger pay to Marshals Service personnel stationed in Mexico. Also, enactment of legislation that would authorize danger pay for Marshals Service personnel permanently assigned in Mexico is critical to the future recruitment of criminal investigators to serve in these very dangerous areas.

3. When can we expect to see a proposed legislative to remedy this issue from the Department?

On April 13, 2011, the Border Security Enforcement Act of 2011 (S. 803) was introduced and contains a provision authorizing danger pay for the Marshals Service and ATF law enforcement personnel working in Mexico. 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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

(U//LES) This report is an assessment of armaments illegally acquired and trafficked to Mexico in 2009, focusing on the drug trafficking organizations (DTOs), through the examination of the illegal acquisition, transportation, distribution, and recovery of these arms. The primary objective of this assessment is to provide information in support of Southwest border trafficking investigations and/or to assist operational planning and support initiatives. It was developed by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), Southwest Border–Field Intelligence Support Team, El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC), International Affairs Office (IAO), and the Violent Crime Analysis Branch, with assistance from the Field Operations Division and the National Tracing Center.

(U//LES) The Cartel Controlled Landscape and Firearms Trafficking portion section in this report provides an overview of the DTOs' ongoing confrontations for control of territory in Mexico throughout 2009. The turf wars are still active as of the writing of this report, with ongoing violence especially in the Mexican border cities of Reynosa, Nuevo Laredo, Ciudad Juarez and Tijuana. There are drastic changes in DTO alliances in 2010. The Gulf and the Sinaloa cartels have aligned themselves with La Familia Michoacána to form the New Federation to fight Los Zetas.

(U//LES) ATF's Office of Strategic Intelligence and Information will be compiling a 2010 Executive Summary of the changes to the DTOs' structure and firearms trafficking methodology to immediately follow this report.

MEXICAN ORGANIZED CRIME - FIREARMS TRAFFICKING METHODOLOGY

- (U) The Mexican cartels are multifaceted criminal enterprises that are engaged in narcotics trafficking, firearms trafficking, money laundering and various other types of criminal activity. The Mexican cartels operate worldwide as transnational criminal enterprises. There are scores of Mexican drug trafficking organizations (DTOs), all of which have various degrees of affiliation to a cartel. The U.S.-Mexico transportation methodology utilized by the cartels is the result of decades of countering enforcement operations through effective intelligence collection. As a result, they have established systems of layered compartmentalized organizations with limited operational knowledge to form acquisition, supply and transportation networks. These networks are highly successful and extremely resilient. The identification, interdiction and prosecution of these networks are extremely arduous.
- (U) The cartels maintain a supply of firearms through a process similar to the practice known as the Pull System. Under this process the financing, acquisition, storage and transportation (supply chain) are performed by compartmentalized components in line with one another to minimize detection, disruption and prosecution. This is a demand-based process wherein ranking DTO leaders in Mexico acquire the needed firearms, explosives and other equipment by controlling


the entire process through strict orders and oversight of the supply chain. The communications throughout the supply chain are of vital importance in maintaining control and give the leadership the ability to protect their interest and deflect or minimize any risks. In the event that one of the components (links) of the supply chain is compromised, that component can be replaced with minimal disruption to the rest of the chain because of the component's limited operational knowledge.

- (U) The firearms supply chain contains two distinct component types that are tactically used in varying degrees. The first component type is directly managed and operated by DTO members. This type is mainly utilized in the financing, transportation, storage and distribution of firearms components in Mexico. The second component type is the outsourcing of services by the DTOs to independent operators. The straw purchaser component in any supply chain is comprised almost entirely by independent operators. The DTOs utilize independent operators within the United States to avoid risk to DTO members or when their resources are limited.
- (U) The DTOs' demand for firearms soars when they encounter heavy military and law enforcement offensives against them and/or a spike in internal and territorial conflicts. In the quest to identify and dismantle the supply chain components, it is essential to know the cartel landscape, the territorial conflicts and the operational environment in Mexico. The assessment of the acquisition and trafficking of firearms by the Mexican DTOs is a very challenging task due to the ever changing alliances that make up the structure of each drug cartel.



- (U) The average penalty for firearms trafficking ranges from approximately 12 to 30 months. A person that confines their criminal activities to being a low-volume straw purchaser would have a good chance of receiving probation. There is a willing pool of firearms traffickers and straw purchasers because there is minimal risk of lengthy incarceration.
- (U//LES) In examining just the magnitude of the weapons being recovered in Mexico, it gives the impression that identifying and stemming the flow would be easy. The volume of weapons does not equate to large shipments of weapons crossing the border. With all of the advanced detection equipment and highly trained personnel, we have not produced a pattern of massive seizures that the volume suggests, to substantiate this methodology. Furthermore, the vast majority of the seized weapons in Mexico do not come from seizures at the border. They are recovered when confronting DTOs and by raiding DTO hideouts and stash houses. Illicit weapons are confiscated at other crime scenes and checkpoints where the possessors are not

related to a DTO. Based on this, it appears that the "ant trafficking" methodology is more likely the cross-border firearms transportation scenario.



DTO SUPPLY CHAIN MODEL:

(U//LES) Beginning in September 2009, Arizona emerged as the source State for what appears to be DTO managed and operated supply chains affiliated with the Sinaloa cartel. The DTO solicited several straw purchasers in the Phoenix, Arizona, area. They began purchasing firearms in large quantities, several times in a month for DTOs. These independent operators would

along with magazines and ammunition, were recovered while in transit or in stash houses along the border in Arizona and in El Paso, Texas. The location of these seizures is compatible with the Sinaloa's territorial control along the border in Mexico. The rest of the firearms were recovered in the Mexican States of Baja California Norte and Sur, Sonora, Chihuahua, Sinaloa, Guerrero and Durango. A full range of investigative avenues, techniques and resources have been implemented in order to identify the DTO operatives throughout the supply chain(s). Valuable information has been ascertained from this investigation. From the base storage locations in Phoenix, several border stash houses and multiple supply routes were identified.

(b) (7)(A)

DTO OUT-SOURCING MODEL:

(U//LES) In November 2009, a significant firearms trafficking target was arrested following a 1,400-mile mobile surveillance by ATF from Minnesota to a Laredo, Texas, border crossing. Seized from his vehicle were nine FN 5.7mm rifles and pistols, and five Ruger and Berreta .380 caliber pistols. The target's criminal activity came to light in February 2009 while the SWB-FIST team was matching Mexican seizure events in 2008 to the corresponding firearms traces from NTC. The target purchased a single Ruger pistol that was recovered in southern Mexico in January 2008. Further research on the National Tracing Center records (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

(U//LES) The target pleaded guilty and provided information as to his illegal firearms trafficking activities. He admitted that he was an independent operator that solicited the services of other straw purchasers, transported the firearms to southern Mexico and delivered them to the Mexican buyer. The buyer and two additional recipients of the firearms were identified. Based on information provided by ATF, the Mexican Secretariat of Public Safety (SSP) executed a search warrant and arrest warrant for the Mexican buyer that resulted in the recovery of 12 additional firearms. This case highlights the outsourcing firearms supply chain model.

MEXICO FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES SEIZURE EVENTS

(U//LES) The U.S. Government's ability to inspect the firearms and explosives seized throughout Mexico is limited. ATF and the Mexican military created the Combined Explosives Investigative Team (CEIT) to respond to major explosives seizure locations throughout Mexico. One of the main CEIT functions is to collect evidence for laboratory examinations. Currently there is not a similar joint unit to respond and collect evidence and conduct firearms examinations. In Mexico, all seized firearms must be turned over to the military within the short time period mandated by law. A formal request must be submitted to inspect the firearms once in military storage. All explosives are turned over to the military. There is a very limited amount of U.S. personnel available to respond to the location of the evidence. As a result, U.S. authorities must rely on Mexican authorities for this information.

(U//LES) The Government of Mexico (GOM) does not have a system in place to provide the United States Government with real-time official Government <u>seizure event information</u> that provides the <u>recovery of all</u> firearms and explosives in Mexico, the <u>affiliation to organized</u> <u>crime groups</u> and <u>all the markings</u> needed to trace these weapons. In the regularly scheduled

GC Armas meetings in Mexico City, Mexican authorities provide U.S. authorities with a hard copy list of some of these seizure events. In most firearms and explosives seizures events, the Mexican authorities provide written press releases to media outlets throughout Mexico. In the larger seizure events, the authorities hold live press conferences and display the seized items and the people detained.

(U//LES) Since the inception of Project Gunrunner, ATF has compensated for the lack of official GOM seizure event information by collecting Mexican Government press releases and the open source reporting of firearms and explosive seizure events throughout Mexico. The information is collected and disseminated daily to our U.S. and Mexican law enforcement and military partners. It is essential to determine the identity of the DTO for each reported seizure event. Armed with this information, ATF would be able to effectively trace the weapons, analyze the data, and provide effective tactical and strategic intelligence that would severely disrupt U.S. commercial-sourced firearms trafficking to Mexico.

SOUTHWEST BORDER (SWB) FIREARMS TRAFFICKING INVESTIGATIONS


(U//LES) There were 2,410 intelligence and criminal cases opened in N-Force in CY 2009 with the investigative profile, Project Gunrunner (SWB-Southwest Border Project). The field divisions and the Mexico Country Office (MCO) opened 517 criminal cases. There are several SWB Gunrunner investigations that were opened as Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) cases in 2009, and others were carried over from previous years.

(U//LES) The Houston Gun Runner Impact Team (GRIT) generated a significant number of cases in 2009. The MCO and the New Orleans Field Division each opened three SWB criminal cases. The Atlanta, Detroit, Kansas City, Nashville, Seattle and St. Paul Field Divisions all opened one SWB criminal case. The Detroit Field Division was the only one to open a SWB intelligence case.

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(U) 2009 Project Gunrunner Assessment

(U//LES) The below chart is a listing of the criminal and intelligence SWB files opened by the top 6 field divisions in CY 2009



(U//LES) ATF OSII, along with the IAO Mexico Country Office (MCO) and border liaison agents, opened 1,508 criminal intelligence cases relating to the firearms and explosives seizures events in Mexico in 2009. The seizure events were collected, entered, and maintained under the N-Force Southwest Border (SWB) case numbers 164020-09-0001 and 162080-09 or 10-0001. Each N-Force seizure event contains the following information: all open source information pertaining to the event to include the weapons seized and persons detained; official Mexican and U.S. Government agency reports; information about the weapons seized; the firearms trace information; and any supporting documentation in connection with the seizure event.

(U//LES) In the majority of the SWB investigations, the identification, arrest and indictments were limited to the perpetrators, within the United States, that were part of the purchase and/or transportation components of the supply chains. There is valuable intelligence derived during the course of these investigations. The DTO intelligence and information are usually retained at the agent, field office or divisional level.

(U//LES) Firearms trafficking investigations should encompass the full scope of criminal activities associated with DTO weapons, especially acts of violence and intimidation. All parties in a firearms trafficking organization (supply chain) are supplying firearms that are used in furtherance of the organization's violent criminal activities in both the United States and Mexico. Under Project Gunrunner, OSII and the MCO have been collecting information from the violent events occurring in Mexico, the perpetrators, the firearms recovered and the affiliation to a criminal organization. This is challenging because the DTOs are constantly changing alliances. If the information is fully developed, the end user's violent actions and their affiliation to a DTO would provide essential evidence to broaden the scope of the prosecution against firearms

traffickers. By merging this evidence into the prosecution of a DTO firearms supply chain, the parties could be exposed to Federal organized crime charges (RICO, CCE, VICAR) and the maximum penalties allowable by law.

(U//LES) ATF OSII is monitoring and collecting information from the major ATF SWB investigations. OSII has established points of contacts and has personnel supporting Project Gunrunner investigations that are assigned to other U.S. Federal agencies at their headquarters level. OSII is merging case information with all available unclassified and classified information from all our U.S. and international partners.

(U//LES) ANALYTICAL CRITERIA USED TO COMPILE THE STATISTICS CONTAINED IN THIS REPORT

Please be advised that a significant number of Mexico traces are currently being entered into the Firearms Traving System (FTS); therefore, the Mexico recovered and traced data (especially CY 2009) will continue to change.

All of the following statistics have the following selection criteria in common:

- Traces with a recovery country of Mexico were included.
- Traces with a recovery date between January 1, 2009, and December 31, 2009, were selected; the statistics
 are based on a query of the FTS on June 15, 2010.
- Traces with a recovery date between January 1, 2008, and December 31, 2009, were selected; the statistics
 are based on a query of the FTS on March 9, 2010.
- Duplicate, Gun Buyback, Firearm Turned-in, and Firearm Not Recovered traces were not included.

MEXICO FIREARMS TRACING

(U//LES) It has been the stance of the GOM that the United States is solely responsible for the weapons being trafficked into Mexico. The Mexican media has fueled discussions that Mexico has a shared responsibility to confront the weapons trafficking into Mexico as well. The GOM rarely submits consistent requests for traces to ATF's National Tracing Center for the firearms recovered in Mexico. In the past several years, Mexican authorities have submitted requests, through eTrace, for less than 10 percent of all firearms recovered in Mexico. Furthermore, Mexican authorities do not provide ATF with the firearms data from those recoveries in a timely manner. In order for ATF to facilitate the tracing of these firearms, ATF obtains the firearms data from the Mexican authorities, other U.S. authorities or personally inspects the weapons.

(U//LES) Each year, ATF receives trace data from GC Armas reports, urgent requests for tracing, and CD(s) with data from thousands of recovered firearms. ATF started receiving a CD with several thousand firearms, and over the last few years the data on the CDs grew to more than 10,000 firearms. Finally, in August 2009, the Mexican military provided a CD containing an inventory of 64,227 entries for seized firearms, grenade launchers and ammunition being stored from recoveries from CY 2005 to August 2009. There were more than 62,000 firearms data entries, of which almost 18,500 or 30 percent were found to have been previously traced.

The additional firearms data substantially changed the statistical information for that time period and the analysis of the 2008 Project Gunrunner Assessment.

(U//LES) The PGR's Center of Information, Analysis, and Planning to Fight Crime (CENAPI) was provided 10 computers and additional eTrace accounts in October 2009. They were given additional accounts, boosting them to 10. In March 2010, the Mexican Attorney General announced that he wanted all Mexican State law enforcement agencies to have eTrace access. The Mexican Federal Police (SSP) and some State governments have requested hundreds of accounts. The PGR has severely limited the dissemination of the accounts. The PGR/CENAPI maintains that they are capable of tracing all firearms seized in Mexico and therefore must assert its control of the eTrace system. The PGR reports that the GOM confiscated more than 83,000 weapons since December 2006. As previously stated, the PGR has an extremely poor record of tracing those weapons in eTrace during this time period. The PGR's current personnel levels and structure make it very highly unlikely to fulfill the task. It is imperative that to effectively stem the flow of firearms, eTrace must be utilized in a timely and efficient manner by entering the firearms data at the crime scene or shortly thereafter. The GOM should ensure that the proper personnel are dedicated to collecting the firearms data and submitting the traces in eTrace.

(U//LES) From CY 2007 to CY 2009, almost of firearms were recovered in Mexico and submitted to ATF's National Tracing Center for tracing. Of those, almost (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) were traced to the first retail purchaser. The top 5 acquisition States (source States) were Texas (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) The "source States" are basically consistent each calendar year. The percentages of firearm recoveries per State for each of the calendar years (CY 2007 – CY 2009) are within a half percent. The total number of firearms traced to the first retail purchaser is consistently (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) of the total number of firearms recovered and traced in each of the calendar years (CY 2007 – CY 2009).

(U//LES) It is important to note that when analyzed by date of purchase in relation to date of recovery (i.e. "time to crime"), the data yields a different picture of significant "source States." For example, overall California was the second highest "source State" for firearms recovered in Mexico in CY 2009. However, there were only (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) of the total firearms recovered in Mexico in CY 2009, purchased in California, that had a time-to-crime (TTC) of 1 year or less. Furthermore, there were (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) recovered in Mexico in CY 2009 and traced to California with a TTC of 5 years or less. This data highlights that California's significance as a "source State" to Mexico is most likely dated and will likely diminish as the existing, dated source pool of firearms runs out. The California firearms registration and gun show laws, along with their strict enforcement, appear to have a severe impact on the straw purchasing of firearms.

(U//LES) Additionally, the type of firearm and the intended user are important to determine in order to differentiate between firearms trafficking to a DTO or other users. Of the races (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

(U) It is important to adopt these principles to determine the current DTO firearms trafficking trends and patterns.

2009 Mexico Firearms Tracing


(U//LES) As of June 25, 2010, the National Tracing Center processed for tracing that were recovered in Mexico during calendar year 2009. This is down from the approximately friearms recovered and traced in 2008. Using open source reporting as an indicator, there were most likely several thousand more firearms recovered in Mexico in 2009. It should be noted that the CD tendered in August 2009 only had information of firearms seized until July 2009. Since then, the Mexican authorities have gone back to their practice of not providing ATF with all their recovered firearms data in a timely manner.

(U//LES) Of the (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) were traced to the first retail purchaser. Of those, the top 5 acquisition States (source States) were (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

(b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) The other top source States were States surrounding the (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) ... Within the continental United States, only (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) ... did not have any firearms traced back to individual purchasers. The average TTC for 2009 (C.L. 111-117) years.

(U//LES) A total firearms recovered in Mexico were identified as having been sold from an FFL at a gun show. This represents percent of all firearms recovered and traced from transactions by FFLs at gun shows nationwide in CY 2009. This percentage is slightly higher in (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) respectively. Firearms recovered in Mexico were identified as having been stolen from an FFL; this number, while minimal, is still slightly higher than the previous 2 years. (It is important to note that these statistics only deal with FFL transactions at gun shows; private sales at gun shows are unregulated at the Federal level and no comprehensive data set exists for private firearms sales.)

CARTEL-CONTROLLED LANDSCAPE AND FIREARMS TRAFFICKING



(U) The above map fairly depicts the majority command and control by the Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO)/Cartels in areas throughout Mexico at the end of 2008.

(U//LES) Entering 2009, the DTO supply chains were faced with additional demands for firearms and ammunition in three areas. The Sinaloa cartel exerted their power in the State of Baja California against the Tijuana cartel and in the State of Chihuahua against the Juarez cartel, in a bid to gain control of these crucial cross-border transportation territories. This aggression, along with the military and law enforcement response, fueled additional demands for firearms, ammunition, explosives and other equipment. Their supply chains had to adapt to the increased demands and the transportation routes to the battleground areas. A major contributing factor for their success is that they meet the demand for manpower and firepower to overpower their rivals.


(U//LES) In 2006, La Familia Michoacána severed their alliance with the Gulf, Los Zetas and Beltran-Leyva cartels. They established their own firearms supply chains to gain power and facilitate the needs for their expansion. In 2009, they gained the majority control in their home State of Michoacán.

(U//LES) The Gulf cartel and Los Zetas suffered the loss of hundreds of firearms and explosives as a result of Mexican Government operations targeting them in mid 2008 and throughout 2009. Los Zetas suffered additional losses in Guatemala and Honduras.

(U//LES) By mid 2008, the Beltran-Leyva Organization's (BLO) battles with the Sinaloa cartel began to subside, and they secured their own areas of control in the coastal areas of southern Mexico and made inroads into the State of Sonora. La Familia had launched a campaign to take control of the State of Michoacán.

2009 Mexican Organized Crime Related Gun Seizure Events

(U//LES) The Southwest Border Field Intelligence Support Team and EPIC have identified 329 Mexican seizure events in 2009 that were linked to specific DTOs based upon the reporting from open source and Mexican Governmental agencies. From the DTO-related seizure events, 126 events were matched to (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) recovered and submitted for tracing. Of the firearms, (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) was the top acquisition State in 2009 with the purchase of (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)



(U) The above map fairly depicts the majority command and control by the Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO)/Cartels in areas throughout Mexico at the end of 2009.

GULF CARTEL/LOS ZETAS

(U//LES) Throughout 2009, Los Zetas and the Gulf cartel faced mounting opposition from the Mexican military and law enforcement authorities. Their rivals, the Sinaloa cartel and La Familia Michoacána, escalated the attacks against them. Their organizational tensions began to threaten their longstanding relationship. In spite of the enormous amount of aggression from every entity around them, they maintained control of all of their previous areas and expanded their control into portions of the State of Chiapas, Mexico, and the bordering nation of Guatemala. The U.S. Department of Justice and several Federal, State and local law enforcement agencies are vigorously pursuing arrest and prosecution of the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas hierarchy and key operatives.

(U//LES) From April 29, 2009, to August 28, 2009, ATF's Gun Runner Impact Team (GRIT) in the Houston Field Division conducted a successful firearms trafficking offensive in the south

Texas area. The Houston GRIT was a supplemental initiative to ATF's Project Gunrunner. Extensive community outreach was conducted in conjunction with the Houston GRIT, including press releases, press conferences, and interviews with national or international news media. This intelligence-driven initiative focused on investigating a large number of firearms trafficking leads based on trace information from firearms recovered in Mexico. They aggressively targeted firearms traffickers supplying criminal organizations in Mexico. The GRIT identified several firearms supply chain components, the majority of which were linked to the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas.

(U//LES) The most significant impact was on the acquisition (straw purchasing) component of these firearms supply chains. ATF industry operations investigators completed nearly 1,100 inspections of Federal firearms licensees (FFL), issued more than 440 violations, and recommended 78 adverse actions. These regulatory actions helped to identify and correct the neglectful compliance by the FFLs that straw purchasers had been exploiting. ATF partnered with the FFLs and provided training in identifying and dealing with illegal purchasers (straw) and firearms traffickers. The Houston GRIT successfully investigated more than 700 existing leads and more than 400 new leads that were developed during the operation. There were 276 new criminal and intelligence cases opened involving 189 suspects, and 644 firearms were identified as being trafficked to Mexico. The Houston GRIT seized 443 firearms, 141,442 rounds of ammunition and 3 blasting caps. They provided information to Federal, State, and local law enforcement partners that resulted in the seizure of an additional 171 firearms, bringing the total to 614 seized firearms.

(U//LES) The Houston GRIT's preventative tactics, criminal investigations and firearms seizures definitely affected the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas' ability to acquire firearms in a "business as usual approach." These efforts also effectively brought law enforcement's attention, at all levels, on the FFLs that were regularly utilized by the straw purchasing rings on behalf of the DTOs. All of these factors had an impact on the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas at a time when they were facing major offensives from the Mexican authorities and their rivals, as well as while experiencing internal turmoil.

Los Zetas/Gulf Cartel - 2009 Firearms Data:

(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified involvement of the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas in 117 Mexican seizure events in which they were named separately (Zetas 70%, Gulf 30%) and together. The top seizure event States in Mexico are: 24 (21%) in Nuevo Leon; 16 (14%) in Tamaulipas; 15 (13%) in Jalisco; 9 (8%) in Chiapas; and 8 (7%) in Veracruz. According to the open source reporting, there were 892 firearms and 782 grenades recovered in 21 Mexican States, with 19 or 20 percent occurring in the State of Nuevo Leon.

(U//LES) The analysis of the data from all firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 was compared to the open source seizure events in order to match the firearms trace data to the

Significant Investigation:

(U//LES) In 2007, an investigation involving an FFL was opened in Houston, Texas, that led to the identification of a large-scale firearms trafficking organization. The investigation uncovered more than 23 participants involved in illegally acquiring and trafficking firearms. After numerous interviews with straw purchasers, three individuals residing in the Houston area were ultimately identified as the leaders of this trafficking ring. The investigation revealed that a high-ranking member of the Los Zetas organization provided the financing to one of the leaders for the firearms.

(U//LES) Throughout 2009, 16 individuals have been charged with firearms trafficking violations in the case. Several individuals have cooperated in this investigation and provided intelligence as to the workings of this trafficking organization. Approximately 336 various firearms, to include Bushmaster AR-15 rifles, Beretta 9mm pistols and FN 5.7 pistols, were purchased by this firearms trafficking organization. To date, 88 of these firearms have been recovered in Mexico, and 4 have been recovered in Guatemala. The firearms have been traced to 51 separate incidents in Mexico, in which 18 law enforcement officers and civilians have died, along with 37 DTO gunmen.

SINALOA CARTEL

(U//LES) Continuing throughout 2009, the aggressive actions of the Sinaloa cartel raged fiercely in and around the areas of Tijuana, Baja California, and Juarez, Chihuahua. The Beltran-Leyva expanded their presence in the State of Sinaloa and established a greater presence along the coast of the State of Sonora. The Sinaloa cartel gained the majority control in the State of Chihuahua and the eastern portion of the State of Sonora. They provided the additional manpower and resources to focus on the remaining forces of the Juarez cartel and gang associates. Also, they prepared for a confrontation with Beltran-Leyva in Sonora. All of these factors led to an extremely high demand to quickly obtain firearms, ammunition and equipment. This tasked the rival cartel members in charge of the firearm supply chains to obtain and transport record numbers of firearms to these hotspots.

<u>Sinaloa Cartel – 2009 Firearms Data:</u>

(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified the Sinaloa cartel's involvement in 45 seizure events in Mexico. The top seizure event States in Mexico are: 20 (44%) in the State of Chihuahua; 11 (24%) in Sinaloa; and 5 (11%) in Jalisco. According to

the open source reporting, there were 578 firearms and 60 grenades recovered in 9 Mexican States.

(U//LES) The analysis of the data from all firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 was compared to the open source seizure events in order to match the firearms trace data to the events. From the matching trace data the Sinaloa cartel had recoveries (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) States in Mexico. There were (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) Interest processed and traced that matched the open source seizure events. Of (c) (P.L. 111-117) Interest purchases occurred in Arizona.

JUAREZ CARTEL

(U//LES) The Mexican military and law enforcement authorities were not successful in stopping the drug war in the State of Chihuahua. For more than 2 years, violent confrontations have raged between the Juarez and Sinaloa cartels. The cartel battles coupled with the intervention by the Mexican authorities have caused the loss of thousands of lives. The besieged Juarez cartel and their enforcement arm, La Linea, turned to the U.S.-Mexican gang, Barrio Azteca, to help them fend off the Sinaloa cartel. The Sinaloa cartel's control of the State of Chihuahua places the Juarez cartel under siege within portions of the city of Juarez. Their drug supply chains are cut off. Their firearms cross-border supply routes are restricted to the El Paso-Ciudad Juarez area where the Sinaloa cartel is gaining almost complete control. Without a breakthrough, the Juarez cartel will be dismantled or exterminated.

Juarez Cartel - La Linea - Barrio Azteca - 2009 Firearms Data:

(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified the Juarez cartel, La Linea and Barrio Azteca's involvement in 24 seizure events in Mexico. All of the seizure events occurred in the State of Chihuahua. According to the open source reporting, there were 64 firearms and 6 grenades recovered in these seizure events.

(U//LES) The open source reporting of seizure events in the State of Chihuahua lacks the reference to DTO affiliation and firearms information that prevents the matching of the data from the firearms recovered and traced in this State.


(U//LES) The analysis of the data from all firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 was compared to the open source seizure events in order to match the firearms trace data to the events. There were only 2 (8.3%) seizure events that matched the aforementioned 24 open source seizure events. There were a total of 181 seizure events in the State of Chihuahua in 2009, and from those there were 109 seizure events in Ciudad Juarez. The 24 Juarez cartel open source seizure events only account for 13 percent of the total 2009 seizure events. The Sinaloa cartel was confronting the Juarez cartel in the State during this time, and they only account for 20 seizure events or 11 percent of the total open source seizure events. These 44 events account for

only 24 percent of the total open source seizure events and leave 137 seizure events not identified as being associated with a DTO.

(U//LES) Insufficient information was submitted to ATF's National Tracing Center for almost all of the firearms recovered and traced in the State of Chihuahua in 2009. The insufficient information prevented the matching of the trace data to the corresponding seizure events.

(U//LES) In 2009, the Mexican authorities in Chihuahua did not provide written official or open source reports on firearms recovered, and this precluded OSII from matching the firearms trace data to the seizure events. Rarely will the firearms trace data from a recovery in Mexico provide any information pertaining to the firearm's affiliation to a drug trafficking organization. The firearms recovered and traced information can only be matched to the analyzed open source reporting by having sufficient possessor, date and location information from the trace data.

(U//LES) There were firearms submitted to ATF's National Tracing Center for firearms recovered and traced from the State of Chihuahua in 2009. This information is almost entirely nonexistent as evidenced by the fact that there were only 10 firearms identified in the 2 seizure events that matched Juarez cartel open source reporting. None were identified as matching La Linea and Barrio Azteca. Furthermore, there were only 5 of the 20 Sinaloa open source seizure events that matched firearms recovered and traced in Chihuahua the same year. These firearms only account (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) of the total firearms submitted for tracing in 2009.



TIJUANA CARTEL

(U//LES) The fighting between the two factions of the Tijuana cartel continued throughout 2009. The fighting since February 2009 and the Mexican Government's intervention caused high demands for firearms and ammunitions. Their supply chains along the entire west coast and in Phoenix met these demands. According to Mexican authorities, the Sinaloa cartel and La Familia are also present in Baja California. The Sinaloa cartel is transporting bulk loads of drugs into Baja California for shipment to the United States. Mexican authorities have recovered large amounts of drugs, firearms, ammunition and cash from the Sinaloa in this area.

Tijuana Cartel/EL TEO – 2009 Firearms Data:

(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified involvement of the Tijuana cartel and the El Teo DTO in 34 seizure events in Mexico. According to the open source reporting, there were 259 firearms and 4 grenades all recovered in Baja California.

(U//LES) The analysis of the data from all firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 was compared to the open source seizure events in order to match the firearms trace data to the events. From the matching trace data the Tijuana cartel and El Teo DTO had recoveries in Baja California. There were (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

LA FAMILIA MICHOACANA

(U//LES) While La Familia Michoacána was establishing majority control in the State of Michoacán, they were also restructuring and expanding. They sent organizational members from Mexico and positioned them throughout the United States. These leaders had direct control of their retail distribution and supply chains within these areas. In doing so, they gained a substantial amount of profits from the U.S. retail market and greatly increased their drug trafficking abilities, which in turn elevated their organization to cartel status. All of these factors caused a greater demand for firearms and ammunition on their supply chains to protect their interests in Mexico.

(U//LES) In October 2009, the U.S. Department of Justice's Project Coronado dealt a devastating blow to La Familia's U.S. operations that severely impacted the entire organization. The 44-month investigation led to the arrest of more than 1,186 people and the seizure of approximately \$33 million, 7.5 metric tons of marijuana, 2 metric tons of cocaine, 13 kilograms of heroin, 1,240 kilograms of methamphetamine and 389 firearms. This once-emerging organization is now in the position of having to make alliances with other organizations to maintain their current status.

La Familia Michoacána – 2009 Firearms Data:

(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified La Familia's involvement in 53 seizure events in Mexico. The top seizure event States in Mexico are: 25 (47%) in Michoacán; 13 (24%) in Mexico State; 7 (13%) in Guanajuato; and 6 (11%) in Guerrero. According to the open source reporting, there were 339 firearms and 68 grenades recovered in 5 Mexican States.

(U//LES) The analysis of the data from all firearms recovered and traced in Mexico in 2009 was compared to the open source seizure events in order to match the firearms trace data to the events. From the matching trace data the La Familia had recoveries in the same five States in Mexico as in open source reporting. There were (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117) reported) firearms recovered and traced that matched the open source seizure events. Of the (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117)

Significant Investigation:

(U//LES) In September 2008, ATF targeted an individual that paid cash in a multiple sale purchase of 20 AK-47 type rifles in Fort Worth, Texas. The investigation revealed that the target oversaw the purchases by numerous straw purchasers. The majority of the firearms purchased were AK-47 assault-style rifles and .50 caliber sniper rifles. It was determined that La Familia organization members from Mexico were in the United States and were part of this investigation. Hundreds of firearms were being transported to organization members in the State of Michoacán, Mexico.

(U//LES) Agents determined that some of these perpetrators were targets in a major Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) investigation involving the La Familia DTO at which time a joint OCDETF investigation was initiated. Intelligence gleaned indicated that a high-ranking La Familia cartel member, who resided in Mexico, would contact buyers positioned throughout the United States for the acquisition of firearms to be transported into Mexico. Through numerous interviews and debriefs, investigators learned that the weapons were used primarily to protect the organization's narcotic manufacturing sites and to engage in drug war battles with other cartel organizations. On October 21, 2009, ATF executed six search warrants, recovering 15 firearms and arresting 10 defendants while participating in the take-down of the Department of Justice's Project Coronado.

BELTRAN-LEYVA ORGANIZATION

(U//LES) The Beltran-Leyva Organization (BLO) lost majority control of the State of Michoacán to La Familia. They maintained control of their remaining southern coastal States, the coast of Sonora and costal portions of Sinaloa. The BLO maintained a strong relationship with Los Zetas in 2009. The BLO has arrangements with the Los Zetas to use their cross-border trafficking routes in Mexico along the south Texas border. The impending confrontation in the State of Sonora between the Sinaloa and Beltran-Leyva cartels came to a halt in mid December 2009, after the death of the BLO leader, Arturo Beltran Leyva, and the arrest of his brother, Carlos Beltran Leyva. This allowed the Sinaloa cartel to forge all the way to the U.S. border without any significant opposition.

Beltran-Leyva Organization – 2009 Firearms Data:

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(U//LES) During CY 2009, OSII's collection of open source reporting identified the Beltran-Leyva Organization's involvement in 30 seizure events in Mexico. According to the open source reporting, there were 349 firearms and 78 grenades recovered in 9 Mexican States. The top seizure event States in Mexico are: 7 (23%) in Guerrero; 7 (23%) in Morales; and 4 (13%) in Nuevo Leon.



2010 Updates



(U) The above map fairly depicts the majority command and control by the Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTOs)/Cartels in areas throughout Mexico around May of 2010.

(U) The battling by the two factions of the Tijuana cartel ended without a clear winner after the arrest of the leader of the challenging faction.

(U//LES) In 2009, the mounting tensions between the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas began to take its toll on their longstanding relationship. A shooting incident in February 2010 sparked major ongoing hostilities in the States of Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas. The Sinaloa cartel and La Familia have aligned themselves with the Gulf cartel members in this area.

UNCLASSIFIED//LAW ENFORCEMENT SENSITIVE

(U) 2009 Project Gunrunner Assessment

(U//LES) From 2009 into 2010, the Sinaloa cartel continued to expand and gain territorial control in Mexico. They gained control up to the Mexico side of the U.S. border from the eastern half of Arizona to east of El Paso, Texas. As a result, they have set up new cross-border firearms trafficking routes as far east as El Paso. They are now able to route firearms to disputed areas adjacent to the territory controlled by the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas. This provides the Sinaloa cartel a greater advantage to deliver firearms to the region at a time that the Gulf cartel and Los Zetas are engaged in a battle.

CONCLUSION

- (U) ATF remains at the forefront of the battle to eliminate the flow of firearms and munitions to Mexican DTOs. The demand by these organizations for U.S.-sourced firearms has never been greater. They have amassed enormous arsenals of semiautomatic and automatic assault rifles, machine guns, grenades and explosives. With these arsenals of weapons, they have handily confronted every level of Mexican law enforcement and the military. The territorial conflicts, internal battles and criminal violence have spiraled to unprecedented levels. These conflicts have risen to a level that some outside entities believe may even challenge Mexico's national security.
- (U) ATF's Project Gunrunner is a huge undertaking that is expanding and adapting to meet the intelligence, investigative, and prosecutorial needs of international firearms trafficking cases. ATF is working in close collaboration with its domestic and international law enforcement partners to halt the violence along the Southwest border and throughout Mexico by denying the cartels the firearms, ammunition, and explosives that are essential for them to maintain power and control. However, OSII expects that the amount of violence, the number of seizure events and the number of firearms recovered will continue to increase throughout Mexico in FY 2010.

ATF PROJECT GUNRUNNER INTELLIGENCE COLLECTION PLAN

PROJECT OVERVIEW

GOAL:

The purpose of the Southwest Border Intelligence Collection Plan (SWBICP) is to improve the collection, analysis, and dissemination of actionable intelligence in support of Project Gunrunner. This will be accomplished by identifying intelligence gaps relevant to southwest border firearms trafficking and directing ATF collection efforts in all field divisions towards filling those gaps. The outcome will be the provision of improved, finished intelligence that can be used by ATF leadership to deploy investigative resources in a more efficient and effective manner.

WHY (Needs):

- 1. Enhance information sharing between ATF field offices and ATF headquarters.
- 2. Standardize procedures for the collection and analysis of information.
- 3. Improve analytical capabilities in HQ and the field.
- 4. Fulfill the need for actionable intelligence products useful for both decision makers as well as case agents.

HOW:

- 1. Develop a concept of operations (CONOPS) for the SWBICP.
- 2. Identify Priority Intelligence Requirements (PIRs) and Intelligence Requirements (IRs).
- 3. Identify office and position-specific duties.
- 4. Deliver mission-specific taskings to relevant personnel.
- 5. Work with other Bureau offices and outside resources to identify and provide for training needs to professionalize and enhance the capabilities of the intelligence apparatus within ATF.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES:

- 1. Standardized collection processes, improved analysis, and enhanced intelligence sharing throughout ATF.
- 2. Ongoing actionable intelligence products.
- 3. Improved intelligence for more informed decision making.
- 4. Enhanced prosecutions.

Concept of Operations

Firearms Trafficking Intelligence, Information, and Knowledge Management – SWB Intelligence Collection Plan

Introduction

The Southwest border of the United States is one of today's most prominent political and social issues. The battle for supremacy between the Mexican government and Mexican drug trafficking organizations (DTO's) is creating a condition of instability that threatens security interests on both sides of the border. The rapid and disturbing escalation of violence within both Mexico and the United States can be directly linked to the persistent trafficking of drugs, humans, and firearms by Mexican DTO's. Police officers and political figures in Mexico are being assassinated at an increasing rate, and the lives of U.S. law enforcement officers stationed along or near the border have likewise been threatened.

One of the key elements fueling this issue is the widespread availability of firearms in the United States. ATF tracing data indicates that Mexican-bound gun traffickers have routinely exploited this abundant supply particularly with those FFL's and gun shows in close proximity to the border or located in population centers within the southwestern states. The subsequent surge in firearms trafficking into Mexico has put massive numbers of firearms into the hands of criminal organizations, who are then using them to attack government officials and civilians alike in furtherance of their drug trafficking enterprise. Firearms violence in Mexico is increasing in both frequency and ferocity. The Government of Mexico states that in the last 18 months more than 4000 persons have been killed as a result of drug-related violence, including 450 police officers, soldiers, and prosecutors.

In response, ATF leveraged its considerable investigative, intelligence, and technical resources in a dedicated effort to identify, disrupt and dismantle organizations and individuals engaging in the unlawful trafficking of firearms to Mexico. The result was "Project Gunrunner", initiated in April 2006. This project has already enjoyed much operational success, and has received favorable comment by Members of Congress.

As Project Gunrunner continued to evolve, several coordination meetings between Field Operations and OSII were held in El Paso and Houston. The SACs of the Los Angeles, Phoenix, Dallas, and Houston field divisions in particular requested that the investigative efforts of their respective divisions be better coordinated at the strategic level. A key component of this request was the development of a standardized methodology for the collection and dissemination of actionable intelligence both at the field and HQ levels.

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Building on the success of Project Gunrunner, the Office of Strategic Intelligence and Information (OSII), in conjunction with the Office of Field Operations (FO), is further refining the initiative and is developing a Bureau-wide Southwest Border *Intelligence Collection Plan* (SWBICP) to maximize its information and intelligence management processes. This effort will significantly enhance the collection, analysis, and dissemination of actionable intelligence for use by management and field personnel alike.

This document outlines the Concept of Operations (CONOPS) for the development of the SWBICP in support of Project Gunrunner.

Background

Firearms trafficking from the U.S. to Mexico is not a new phenomenon. ATF has actively been involved in the investigation and prosecution of organizations and individuals engaged in cross-border trafficking activities since the inception of the Gun Control Act of 1968. Although many successful investigations have been perfected over the years, they were – and often continue to be – limited in their scope. In essence, Mexican firearms trafficking cases have generally been approached with the archetypical "one felon, one gun" mindset. This means that once the purchasers or transporters (traffickers) have been identified, arrests are made and the case is concluded without pursuing further avenues which would expand the scope of the investigation. A more comprehensive approach to intelligence collection and coordination is an important way to both improve the quality of ATF's southbound trafficking interdiction efforts, and improve the intelligence processes integral to their success.

In 2005, ATF Field Operations tasked the special agents in charge of the Los Angeles, Phoenix, Dallas, and Houston Field Divisions with developing individual operational enforcement strategies specific to countering firearms trafficking to Mexico. While these strategies proved effective at identifying and arresting individual traffickers, the limitation of this approach was the division specificity of the plans. This approach did not lend itself to coordinated intelligence collection or analysis. As a result, the criminal information beneficial to multiple field divisions was often stove-piped within each division and therefore could not facilitate the objective of identifying multi-divisional, complex trafficking operations under the direction of a specific DTO or other criminal organization.

The SWBICP is designed to broaden ATF's approach by implementing a border-wide collection strategy. OSII and FO recognize that such a plan requires coordination spanning division jurisdictional boundaries, supported by a unified or standardized protocol for collecting information and linking leads previously not analyzed. This will better enable the identification – and therefore the disruption and dismantling of –

trafficking schemes at the organizational level. To accomplish this objective, OSII assesses the need for the development of a standardized SWBICP that crosses divisional lines and harnesses the vast pool of information that is gathered daily by special agents, industry operations investigators (IOI's), and intelligence officers in the course of their duties.

Notwithstanding the numbers of arrests, with some notable exceptions there are still many investigations found in NForce where arrests of southbound traffickers were made and the case file fails to identify many of the critical details necessary to dismantling a trafficking organization. These details include but are not limited to:

- identifying the transportation methodology
- identifying primary and secondary routes
- repackaging and concealment methodology
- location of stash houses
- transshipment locations
- location of safe houses
- location/use of tunnels
- points of contact in the U.S.
- level of FFL involvement (if any)
- the source of funds
- who the firearms are being delivered to
- and perhaps most importantly, connection to one or more of the designated DTO's.

Each of these elements can be described as "links" in a trafficking chain; and each link can be separately targeted for disruption activities which will in turn disrupt the overall trafficking scheme. Gathering detailed information regarding these and other related elements enables ATF intelligence analysts to perform more in-depth studies which encompass a broader view of trends and patterns, resulting in a higher quality of intelligence product which can then be translated into action in the field.

Intelligence Collection Plan CONOPS

Overview

Intelligence is more than just the collection of facts and statistics; intelligence is the processing of information to formulate a product that can be acted upon or used to drive the decision making process. The term "processing" includes the collation of raw data into related items, evaluation to determine reliability and relevance, analysis to establish significance and implications, integration to identify patterns and collateral information,

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and finally, the interpretation of the data to assess its overall significance so that an actionable product can be disseminated.

ATF O 3700.2a (Criminal Enforcement Intelligence Program) sets forth the objective of integrating ATF's intelligence capabilities with those of Field Operations under the concept of intelligence-led operations. The order states "It is the goal of FO to fully aspire to the concept of intelligence-led policing in order to better address the emerging criminal threats facing ATF. To that extent, FO is implementing minimum mandatory staffing levels, training initiatives, personnel selection criteria, and reporting procedures to maximize the effectiveness of field intelligence personnel to help meet the Bureau's strategic goals of enforcing Federal criminal laws, protecting America against the threat of terrorism, and reducing crime and violence by assisting State, local, and community based-programs".

Project Gunrunner provides an opportunity to accomplish the stated objectives of ATF O 3700.2a by fully consolidating ATF's investigative expertise and proprietary technical resources with a focused and dedicated intelligence collection and analytical effort. This plan will leverage the best ATF resources in the most organized manner to effectively combat arms trafficking to Mexico.

The Office of Strategic Intelligence and Information is committed to providing the utmost support to the mission of ATF and Project Gunrunner, and will dedicate the necessary resources to ensure the success of this important initiative. The following mission statement has been set forth:

ATF Office of Strategic Intelligence and Information (OSII), Project Gunrunner Mission Statement: To effectively employ strategic and operational intelligence in support of Field Operations in order to eliminate the diversion of firearms from the lawful marketplace by Mexican Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTOs) and others engaged in trafficking firearms to Mexico, thereby reducing firearms-related acts of violence perpetrated by DTOs in support of their narcotics trafficking enterprises.

Working with its domestic and international law enforcement partners, ATF will deny the "tools of the trade" to the firearms-trafficking infrastructure of the criminal organizations operating in Mexico through proactive enforcement of its jurisdictional areas in the affected border States on the domestic front, as well as through assistance and cooperative interaction with the Mexican authorities in their fight to effectively combat the increase in violent crime. Working together, the expected strategic outcome will be the suppression of the firearms and explosives-related violence occurring on both sides of the border through effective law-enforcement collaboration involving focused intelligence sharing, training, and utilization of investigative techniques to interdict the illicit trafficking and the illegal use of firearms, explosives, and ammunition.

Directing Resources

In order to develop the most comprehensive and thorough approach to providing proactive intelligence support to Project Gunrunner, intelligence gaps must be filled. This is accomplished through the establishment of Priority Intelligence Requirements (PIRs) and Intelligence Requirements (IRs). The IRs can either support PIRs or be stand alone requirements of a lesser priority than PIRs. Both PIRs and IRs serve as the basis for collection and analysis efforts. Based on the input obtained at the El Paso and Houston SAC meetings, the PIR's and IR's proposed for the SWBICP are shown below:

Priority Intelligence Requirements (PIRs)

- 1. How is the DTO acquiring guns?
- 2. Who are the Mexican citizens organizing weapons acquisitions and shipments?
- 3. Who are the U.S. citizens organizing weapons acquisitions and shipments?
- 4. Where are the guns and ammunition being stored (before going to Mexico/in Mexico)?
- 5. How are the guns and ammunition being transported to Mexico?
- 6. When and where are the guns and ammunition being brought into the Mexico?
- 7. What types of concealment methods are being used?
- 8. Identify sources of supply for weapons trafficking.
- 9. Identify the armorer being employed to maintain and modify weaponry.
- 10. Determine the black market cost of the firearms and ammunition
- 11. Determine the stocks of ammunition available.
- 12. Determine the location of weapons caches in the United States and Mexico.
- 13. Determine the level of training that the cartels receive on the use of those weapons.
- 14. How are transport, storage locations, and security locations obtained?
- 15. How do DTOs acquire police uniforms, ballistic vests, and other special equipment?
- 16. Identify the various means by which trafficking organizations pass on information to facilitate their illicit operations.

Intelligence Requirements (IRs)

- 1. What cell phone/landline/internet systems are used? (Include e-mail addresses, Web pages and social networking user names and passwords)
- 2. What types of encryption systems are being used?
- 3. Are computer systems, such as Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP), being used?
- 4. Traditional radio communications (i.e. VHF)?

- 5. What type of communicating systems do firearms trafficking organizations utilize?
- 6. Are there "fixed" communications/command and control/intelligence collection sites maintained? Where are they located?
- 7. Do firearms trafficking organizations have intercept capability to counter U.S./Mexico law enforcement?
- 8. What transport means are favored/employed?
 - Maritime (shark-boats, shrimp-boats, container ships, etc.)
 - Air (commercial and private aviation)
 - Land (trucking, busses, privately owned vehicles, foot traffic)
 - Tunnels (includes use of drainage systems and levees)
 - Rail (exploitation of U.S. and Mexican rail systems)
 - Decoy/clone vehicles
 - a. How are stolen vehicles and tags obtained and used?
 - b. Are there established "SOPs" for crossing the border? What requirements are established, notifications (if any) that must be made prior to crossing the border?
- 9. Who presides over the financial transactions?
- 10. What is the percentage amount kept by transporters of firearms?

Project Gunrunner Intelligence Support

The intelligence collection plan for Project Gunrunner relies on several different offices and positions within ATF, both within HQ-based Intelligence (OSII) and the Field Operations assets and components such as the field intelligence groups and Mexico Country Office.

The ATF OSII SWB Unit, located at the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC) will act as a "fusion center" for the collection and analysis of information regarding firearms trafficking to Mexico. As such, it will serve as the primary hub for the inflow and outflow of all information regarding firearms trafficking to Mexico. The SWB Unit will identify relevant firearms, ammunition, and explosives seizures through official Mexican Government Web sites, the news media, reporting from the ATF Mexico Country Office (MCO) and field intelligence groups where appropriate. Whenever possible, Mexico's Center for Planning Analysis and Information Combating Organized Crime (CENAPI) Trace Request Reports and Central Administration for the Fiscal and Customs Inspection (ACIFA) Seizure/Trace Request Reports will be collected and processed to further identify each seizure.

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Each intelligence component will have specified reporting requirements and procedures that will be fully outlined in a SWB Intelligence Collection Plan Standard Operating Procedures (SWBICP-SOP) document that is currently under development by OSII and Field Operations.

In order to maximize the effectiveness of Project Gunrunner's intelligence requirements, it is imperative that all components adhere to the collection process requirements and the reporting requirements outlined in ATF O 3700.2, Criminal Intelligence Enforcement Program Standard Operating Policies and Procedures. Utilizing N-Force as ATF's intelligence database is the cornerstone for developing an efficient and effective real-time, actionable intelligence gathering operation. In addition to using N-Force to document, share and warehouse intelligence, it will also be used to prepare strategic intelligence reports and assessments, as well as to provide actionable leads for future investigations.

SUBJECT: Project Gunrunner

In support of Project Gunrunner, ATF's violent crime initiative along the border between the United States and Mexico, the current code has been renamed to more accurately reflect this project in N-FORCE. This code, "PROJECT GUNRUNNER (SWB-Southwest Border Project)" is located in the Investigative Profiles section of N-FORCE, and allows for a more comprehensive tracking and analysis of investigations of data related to Project Gunrunner. All special agents should continue to utilize this code. Furthermore, cases opened under either of the previous codes – "SWB Project" or "SOUTHWEST BORDER PROJECT (GUNRUNNER)" – need not be amended by field division offices. This project code name change will apply automatically in N-FORCE.

The "PROJECT GUNRUNNER (SWB-Southwest Border Project)" code should be interpreted broadly, and should be selected for any investigation associated with the southwest border or with Mexico. In addition, the following steps will allow thorough analysis of Project Gunrunner cases:

- Once a criminal link to the southwest border or Mexico is identified in an investigation, the
 case agent should select the "PROJECT GUNRUNNER (SWB-Southwest Border Project)"
 code in N-FORCE. This code is located in the Investigative Profile section, found on the
 Violent Crime/Investigative Profile tab of the General Case Information folder.
- In the Report of Investigation, special agents should place "PROJECT GUNRUNNER" as the first entry in the "Summary of Event" section.

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All Special Agents in Charge

- Special agents should complete all identifying information on each person, suspect and defendant entered into N-FORCE. Special agents should attempt to establish if an individual has a previous arrest, and enter the State/FBI Identification Number(s). This will assist analysts in providing special agents with complete and current information on the individual.
- To facilitate inquiries on foreign-born nationals, it is critical that the date of birth and
 nationality of the individual is established. Information on family members, to include dates
 of birth and addresses, is also extremely helpful. This data enhances the ability of the Office
 of Strategic Intelligence and Information (OSII) to query information and track the
 movements of individuals and commodities.
- When generating the Significant Information Report (SIR), special agents should enter the
 words "PROJECT GUNRUNNER" as the first line entry of the "Narrative of Incident/
 Activity" field.
- FIREARM TRACES: the National Tracing Center requests that the special agents select the Trace Project Code "PROJECT GUNRUNNER (SW BORDER)" on the Trace Information tab for all firearms seized under this project.



On March 21, 2011, the Acting Inspector General (IG) for the Department of Justice advised Acting Director Melson that the IG's Oversight and Review Division recently initiated a review of certain ATF firearms trafficking investigations. In a March 21 memo, the Assistant IG for the Oversight and Review Division stated that the review would cover the matter known as Operation Fast and Furious, and other investigations with similar objectives, methods, and strategies. On March 25, 2011, Acting Director Melson received the attached request for documents and information relating to the IG review of certain firearms trafficking investigations.

On March 28, 2011, AD Stinnett sent each of you instructions on how to respond to the March 25, 2011 document request. She also sent each of you a document preservation request relative to Operation Fast and Furious.

On March 31, 2011 the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform (HCOGR) issued a subpoena for documents related to Operation Fast and Furious and the FBI investigation into the death of Border Patrol Agent Brian Terry.

While the IG document request and the HCOGR subpoena are generally directed at the same investigation, they are distinctly different in their scope. To minimize the impact of these two document requests, facilitate production of responsive documents, and ensure the confidentiality of responses, we will combine them into one request and secure them electronically. (Accordingly, to the extent that AD Stinnett's March 28, 2011 asked for you to produce hard copy documents to her office, you can disregard that portion of her guidance). The due date for the electronic production of responsive documents and certification of search is close of business Monday, April 11, 2011.

Regardless of any prior production of responsive documents to any entity inside or outside of ATF, everyone is required to produce any responsive documents, e-mails, etc. at this time. All responsive documents anywhere in the organization must be produced. Further, all documents must be fully produced. There is no authority for ATF to withhold records, or redact portions of records because we believe they are sensitive or confidential or privileged. The IG has statutory authority to obtain any and all records related to this review.

ACTION ITEM FOR EACH AD AND EMPLOYEES IN EACH DIRECTORATE

Please carefully review both the attached OIG request for documents and the attached HCOGR request and forward to each office within your area of responsibility. These documents should be forwarded to each employee in every office under your supervision. While it is likely that most of the requested records will be housed at the Phoenix Field Division or Bureau headquarters, it is nonetheless critical that each SAC and HQ Official ensure a thorough search is conducted at each field and headquarters division and any responsive record is forwarded as instructed. Please err on the side of caution and be over inclusive in producing documents or information.

Also attached is a revised verification certification that covers document production for the OIG and the HCOGR which needs to be signed and dated by each SAC and HQ Official. If your division does not have responsive materials, please note "no responsive records found" on the certification and provide a copy of the signed document as instructed below. NForce, which contains a wide variety of data that be useful, contains an "events" folder for each investigation, which is basically a listing of reported investigative events, such as "Surveillance of John Doe on 04/20/11." If you "select" the event from the list, then double click on the big yellow field below the event summary (synopsis caption in report), the report narrative (whether a draft or final version has been prepared) will open up for reading or printing. In this format, the assigned "ROI number" does NOT appear, even if finalized. To see a Report of Investigation (ROI) in final form, you must access Forms Explorer (on top line tool bar) within the specific case, which will display an outline of all forms created by type in folders, including ROIs. When you expand the ROI folder, this list will display all finalized ROIs, including the ROI number, synopsis caption (like mentioned above), who created the form and when it was finalized. Printing from this section takes a little bit longer since it includes the form package and the narrative, but it's best because it's a "final form" document with the ROI number included. Note that review/approval signatures and dates are not included in NForce.



Please refer to the attached documents and the below email from the Department regarding the above cited review. In July 2009, former Special Agent (b) (7)(C) Attorney (b) (7)(C) and Ms. (b) (7)(C) were involved in preparing ATF's response to the open recommendations. The Department is requesting an informal status update via email on the 6 open recommendations. A response concerning specific actions taken or completed regarding the six open recommendations must be forwarded to Audit Liaison, (b) (7)(C) (b) (7)(C) by April 22, 2011, for a timely status update to the Department.

Recommendation Number 1) The U.S. Attorney General should prepare a report to Congress on approaches to address the challenges law enforcement officials raised in this report regarding the constraints on the collection of data that inhibit the ability of law enforcement to conduct timely investigations.

Recommendation Number 2) To further enhance interagency collaboration in combating arms trafficking to Mexico and help ensure integrated policy and program direction, the U.S. Attorney General and the Secretary of Homeland Security should finalize the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between ATF and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and develop processes for periodically monitoring its implementation and making any needed adjustments.

Recommendation Number 3) To help identify where efforts should be targeted to combat illicit arms trafficking to Mexico, and to improve the gathering and reporting of data related to such efforts, the U.S. Attorney General should direct the ATF Director to regularly update ATF's reporting on aggregate firearms trafficking data and trends.

Recommendation Number 4) To help identify where efforts should be targeted to combat illicit arms trafficking to Mexico, and to improve the gathering and reporting of data related to such efforts, the U.S. Attorney General and the Secretary of Homeland Security should, in light of Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) recent efforts to assess southbound weapons smuggling trends, direct ATF and ICE to

ensure they share comprehensive data and leverage each other's expertise and analysis on future assessments relevant to the issue.

Recommendation Number 5) To help identify where efforts should be targeted to combat illicit arms trafficking to Mexico, and to improve the gathering and reporting of data related to such efforts, the U.S. Attorney General and the Secretary of Homeland Security should ensure the systematic gathering and reporting of data related to results of these efforts, including firearms seizures, investigations and prosecutions.

Recommendation Number 6) To improve the scope and completeness of data on firearms trafficked to Mexico and to facilitate investigations to disrupt illicit arms trafficking networks, the U.S. Attorney General and the Secretary of State should work with the Government of Mexico to expedite the dissemination of eTrace in Spanish across Mexico to the relevant Government of Mexico officials, provide these officials the proper training on the use of eTrace, and ensure more complete input of information on seized arms into eTrace.

It looks like ODAG (Ed Siskel) met with the Bureaus involved, but ATF (b) (7)(C) ATF) and (b) (7)(C) (CRM)) did the majority of the consolidation for the "Department's" response. Because of that, I think ATF is ultimately going to be responsible for responding to the recommendations. Fortunately, I think it will be fairly simple to close these recommendations. This is what I suggest:

Recommendation 1. We did not concur with this recommendation. Unless the existing constraints on the collection of data relevant to firearms trafficking was removed in the last 2 years, there is nothing more that we can do. I will stick to our original argument and suggest GAO close the recommendation.

Recommendation 2. Was the MOU between ATF and ICE ever finalized? If not, we need to give an update on its status. If it was, we will need to have it approved so that we can send it to GAO for closure of this recommendation.

Recommendation 3: Has ATF published certain aggregate-level firearms trace data and studies per the GAO's recommendation? If so, we can provide copies that will serve as supporting documentation that we implemented the recommendation.

Recommendation 4: Thelieve this recommendation should be closed based on the response. Unless GAO needs a copy of the MOU.

Recommendation 5: Same response as #4

Recommendation 6: Has ATF completed its Spanish version of e-trace? If so, we need to provide GAO with supporting documentation to close the recommendation.





In November 2007, (b) (3) (P.L. 111-117), (b) (7)(C)

That same Ruger was recovered in Mexico in January 2008. The circumstances of the recovery are still unknown. Since June 2007, (b) (7)(C) has had over 15 border crossings into Mexico from the U.S. and purchased over 100 firearms. Between the dates (b) (7)(C) purchased the Ruger firearm and the time it was recovered, (b) (7)(C) had three border crossings back into the U.S. ATF OSII has a high degree of confidence that (b) (7)(C) is directly or indirectly associated with the LOS ZETAS cartel as a supplier of firearms. It is estimated that (b) (7)(C) has paid over \$45,000 for firearms in that same time and the vast majority of the purchases have been in cash. Since January 2007, (b) (7)(C) has had over \$61,000 wired to his Wells Fargo Bank account from six different Mexican Banks/Accounts, none of which is claimed on his income taxes. During July, August, October, and November 2009, agents conducted a (b) (7)(C), (b) (7)(E)

On November 15, 2009, following a 1,400 mile mobile surveillance by ATF from Minnesota to Laredo, TX, (b) (7)(C) was taken into custody by CBP at the Laredo

POE. The following firearms were recovered: 4 FN Herstal 57 5.7mm pistols, 4 FN Herstal PS90 assault rifles, 1 FN Herstal 57 5.7mm assault rifle, 3 Ruger LCP .380 pistols and 2 Berreta .380 pistols.

On June 1, 2010, the Mexican Secretariat of Public Safetly (SSP) executed a search warrant and arrest warrant for (b) (7)(C)

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


